7.0 GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Gin Gang

Normally of circular plan form in Northumberland. Animals, normally horses, are harnessed to a rig which they turn. The vertical movement is then geared to horizontal shafts to drive machinery.

Jamb Stones

Dressed stone detail forming a window or door surround.

String Course

A decorative, usually projecting, thin horizontal course of brick or stone.

Tooling

Or 'batting': Surfacing a stone with a batting tool, producing a regular pattern of fluted cuts in the stone face.

Quoin

An outer corner of a wall but generally refers to a brick or larger stone set within a corner, usually with an alternative header facing front and side.

Voussoirs

An arch-stone in a stone arch or an arch-brick in a brick arch.
