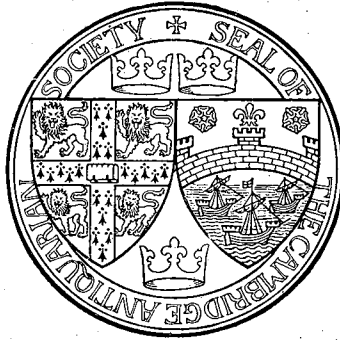

Monday, 25 May, 1925.

The Rev. A. H. F. BOUGHEY, President, in the Chair.

Dr T. J. ARNE, of Stockholm, read a paper, with lantern illustrations, on THE GOTHS IN SOUTH RUSSIA IN THE VTH AND VITH CENTURIES, A.D., of which the following is an abstract:

The cemeteries throughout the Ukraine are probably connected both with the Goths and with Germanic tribes; these cemeteries yield mostly cremation urns, but some skeletons with dolichocephalic skulls, the grave goods suggesting the La Tène II period. The Goths seem to have adopted cloisonné jewellery from Persia. There are traces of Gothic influence in South Russia down to the IXth century.
