He married Martha, daughter of Thomas Plott, Gent., of Upton, Co. Berks., by whom he had two sons, Henry (*d.* 1683, aged 14) and Bennet (? *d.* 1735, aged 54) and two daughters, Mary (*d.* 1678, aged 4) and Elizabeth. From inscriptions on other ledger stones it appears that Martha was firstly the second wife of Bennett Hobbs, Esquire, (1604-1666).

He was the son of John Clarke of Ardington by his wife Dorothy, daughter of Richard Smith of Nether Winchington, Co. Bucks; according to the Visitation of 1665-66 he married as his first wife Mary, second daughter of Edmond Wiseman (*d.* 1605) of Steventon (see Steventon No. 4; *B.A.J.*, Vol. 35, p. 135) by whom he appears to have had no issue. He married secondly Susan, daughter of Sir Thomas Temple, Bt., of Stowe, Co. Bucks, by whom he had, with one other son and three daughters, John (*d.* 1644) through whom the descent continued; he married thirdly Mary (1579-1646), daughter of Edmund Dunch, Esquire, of Little Wittenham, and the widow of William Winchcombe (*d.* 1614), (see Little Wittenham No. 29; *B.A.J.*, Vol. 35: p. 140). He was knighted as High Sheriff of the County by Charles I. in 1626.

The hatchment of William Wiseman Clarke (1767-1826). He was the son of William Wiseman Clarke (b. 1727) by his wife and first cousin Dorothy, daughter of Richard Clarke of Reading, and was tenth in descent from John Clark of Basildon who married an heiress Elizabeth Champeney and eighth in descent from John Clarke of Ardington who married Alice Pikeman, an heiress of Basildon; his grandfather Edward Clarke (d. 1733) married Mary (d. 1740) only daughter and heir of William Wiseman (d. 1713) and the arms of Blyant, Bresworth, Rokele, Hawkins and Bayley are brought in by this alliance. He matriculated at Christ Church, Oxford, in 1777 aged 17, was Sheriff of the County in 1811 and married, as his second wife, Elizabeth (d. 1825), daughter of John Kerr, Esquire, by his wife Mary, sister and heir of Richard Walter Nelson, Esquire, of Chaddleworth, Co. Berks. His son by this marriage was William Nelson Clarke (1799-1855), the Antiquary and author of "The Hundred of Wanting," who sold the Manor of Ardington to Robert Vernon (see No. 30 below).

The coat is here inscribed below the shield as "Corbet of Hadley." A similar coat is to be found in the east window of Denchworth Church (No. 17).; Clarke (*Hundred of Wanting*, p. 90) states that these arms were borne by de Bosco or Boys and that William de Boys was patron of Denchworth Church in 1299; the family of Corbet, subsequently holding estates in Denchworth, may have inherited from the de Bosco family, as deeds of the former have seals bearing these arms; Clarke also states that the arms here found in Ardington Church and probably made in the 15th century, are by mistake assigned to Corbet.

He was of humble origin and making a fortune in supplying horses to the British Army in the Napoleonic Wars he collected, between 1820 and 1847, some 200 pictures by native artists of which he presented 157 to the Trustees of the National Gallery in 1847. He became Lord of the Manor of Ardington *c.* 1833 and was a F.S.A. ; he died at his house in Pall Mall. He gave by his will £1,666 consols, the dividends on which were to be devoted to the poor of the parish.

He was for some time a Fellow of Corpus Christi College, Oxford, and Rector of Childrey, 1722-1731. The monument was erected by his wife Elizabeth who married William Meadows of London in 1734.

He was a Fellow of Corpus Christi College, Oxford, and Rector of Childrey for 23 years, 1731-1754.

FETTIPLACE.

John Kingston of Childrey, Warminster, Co. Wilts, and Foxcote, Co. Somerset, married Susan, daughter of Richard Fettiplace (*d.c.* 1511) of East Shefford and Bessels Leigh by his wife Elizabeth daughter and heir of William Bessels; Susan was the niece of William Fettiplace (*d.* 1528; see No. 30 below) and after her husband's death became a vouess at the Syon Monastery at which were also her sisters Eleanor and Elizabeth; she was buried in Shalstone Church, Co. Bucks, where there exists a brass effigy in her memory. He appears to have inherited the manor of Frethornes with that of South Fawley from his grandfather Thomas Kingston (*d.* 1507) whose grandmother was Elizabeth Childrey (*d.* 1462) and who married firstly John Kingston and secondly William Finderne (see No. 7 below). On John Kingston's death the manors passed to his brother Nicholas (*d.* 1515).

He was a Knight of the Shire *temp.* Henry VI. and married Elizabeth, daughter and co-heir of Thomas Chelrey (*d.* 1407) of Childrey and widow of Sir John Kingston, Kt. His wife inherited the manor of Frethornes and South Fawley on her second marriage with William who held Frethornes in her right in 1428; after his death in 1444 it reverted to Elizabeth and on her death it passed to her grandson Thomas Kingston (*d.* 1507) who was the grandfather of John Kingston (*d.* 1514; see No. 4 above).

He appears to have held the manor of Rampayns in Childrey, together with Lynt in Coleshill in 1428; he married Elizabeth who is recorded as being in possession of these manors in 1437 and their son Thomas (*d.* 1480; see Nos. 15-18 below) was in possession in 1439.

He was the only surviving son of the Rev. John Nelson, M.A., and Catherine his wife, eldest daughter and co-heir of Richard Heydon Esquire, of Banbury, Co. Oxon; he was a Demy of Magdalen College, Oxford. It would appear that his sister (and eventually heir) Elizabeth Agnes (*d.* 1849) married, in 1839, Henry Hippisley (1808-1896) Esquire, of Lambourn Place. The tablet also records the death of two other children of the Rev. John Nelson, Catherine and John de Preston, who died in infancy.

She was the daughter of Thomas Walrond (*d.* 1480; see Nos. 15-18 above) and married firstly Thomas Waring, the son of Walter Waring of Erleigh Bartholomew; she married secondly Robert Strangbou of Shinfield and Wokingham who *d.s.p.* Elizabeth, her daughter by the first marriage, is mentioned in Nos. 31-34 below.

He was the fourth son of John Fettiplace (*d.* 1464), Squire of King Henry VI., of East Shefford, by his wife Joan, daughter of Edward Fabian and widow of Robert Horne, Alderman of London. In 1526, in addition to almshouses in the village, he founded a chantry in St. Catherine's aisle (the south transept) and gave to the Provost and Scholars of the Queen's College, Oxford, half of the manor of Letcombe Basset and other estates in fifteen neighbouring parishes and elsewhere, on condition that the College kept the aisle in repair ; out of this benefaction was to be paid 23s. 4d. towards refection in the College Hall, 6s. 8d. for an annual sermon in Childrey Church and eight marks for the supervision of the chantry ; the College now continue to pay for the sermon, maintain almsmen and contribute to the village education. He married Elizabeth, daughter and heir of Thomas Waring of Erleigh Bartholomew in Sonning, by Joan, daughter and heir of Thomas Walrond (see Nos. 19-29 above) ; her first husband was John Kentwood of Kentwood, Co. Berks, who *d.s.p.* On his wife's death William Fettiplace inherited the manor of Rampayns, together with the manors of Erleigh Bartholomew and Pauntons, Earley, which in 1515 had been settled upon himself and wife with remainder to the heirs of his brother Anthony. Morley (*Monumental Brasses of Berks*, p. 79) gives the coats at present concealed as (1) Dexter : Fettiplace an annulet for difference, and (2) Sinister : Quarterly of 4 as Nos. 31-34. His arms, impaling Nos. 31, 32 and 34 of his wife, are to be seen in a window in the library of the Queen's College, Oxford.

57. Per pale ermine and azure two lions combatant the dexter gules the sinister argent on a chief or a horse's head couped proper between two mullets of the third.

He was the grandson of Edward Shippery who purchased the manor of Mautravers in Childrey in 1766. William left Childrey in 1832 and died at Worthing ; by his will he gave £1,177 consols for the benefit of the poor and for education in the parish.

He was the son of William Hyde (*d.* 1557; see No. 7 below) by his wife Margery (*d.* 1562) daughter of John Cater of Letcombe; his grandfather was Oliver Hyde (*d.* 1516; see No. 14 below). He married Alice, second daughter of Sir Thomas Essex Kt. of Lambourn by his wife Margaret, second daughter of Lord Sandes, and the issue of the marriage was five sons and five daughters; of the sons William (*d.* 1598), the eldest, was the father of Sir George Hyde (*d.* 1623; see Sparsholt No. 11) and Arthur (1548-1600) the second son, of Hardwell in Uffington was the ancestor of Captain Henry Barry Hyde (see No. 18 below.)

He was the son of Oliver Hyde (*d.* 1516; see No. 14 below) and married Margery, eldest daughter of John Cater, gent., of Letcombe Regis by his wife Margaret, daughter of John Awdlett, Esq., of Woburn, Co. Bucks. In a confirmation of the Cater arms by William Harvey, Clarenceux, in 1559, to Margery she is described as the daughter and heir of John Cater, although her brother William, of Uffington, who married Dorothy Hooe apparently had sons and a grandson. The issue was William (*d.* 1567; see No. 1 above) and six other sons and six daughters surviving; the brass shows the figures of 12 sons and 8 daughters.

Rowland Edward Cotton, Lieut. 4th Regt. of Foot; died in Jamaica in 1825, aged 28. Robert Salusbury Cotton, Royal

Artillery; *d.* at Combermere Abbey 1824, aged 24. The sons of Henry Calveley Cotton, Esquire.

Henry Calveley Cotton was the son of Sir Lynch Salusbury Cotton of Combermere, Co. Chester, a descendant of the younger branch of Cotton of Cotton, by his wife Elizabeth Abigail, second daughter of Roland Cotton (*d.* 1753). This tablet was erected to the memory of his brothers by the Rev. Richard Lynch Cotton, D.D., Provost of Worcester College, Oxford, 1839-81.

According to the pedigree mentioned by the late Rev. Prebendary H. B. Hyde in correspondence with the writer, Oliver Hyde was the son of John Hyde (*d.* 1487) of South Denchworth, by Alice (*d.* 1478), daughter of John Lidiard of Glympton; the pedigree given in the Visitation of 1623 (*Hart. Soc.* LVI. 98) and in *Oxf. Rec. Soc.* XIV. p. xcvi, however, gives him as the son of John (*d.* 1487) and grandson of John Hyde who married Alice Lidiard. Oliver married Agnes, daughter and heir of Thomas Lovingcott of Lovedays in Elmington, Co. Oxon, the issue being William (*d.* 1557; see No. 7 above), Thomas of Culham, Co. Oxon, John, Margaret, Alice (see Buckland, No. 12) and Anne.

William de Boys was patron of the Church in 1299. Certain deeds, *temp.* Edward III., executed by the family of Corbet, conveying property in South Denchworth to William de la Hyde (*d.c.* 1361) carried seals with these arms; Clarke (*Hundred of Wanting*, p. 90) states that it was not improbable that the Corbets, who possessed property in Denchworth, inherited from the de Boys family. (See also Ardington, No. 20).

Captain Henry Barry Hyde (1785-1831) of the 96th Regt. was a Judge of the High Court of Admiralty and Acting-Governor of Sierra Leone; he married in 1816 Amelia (*d.* 1847), daughter of Major Robert Cole, of Newport, Isle of Wight. His only son Henry Barry Hyde (1820-1906) married in 1852 Mary Anne (1823-1889), daughter of Golding Bird of Londonderry. The window containing the arms, Hyde impaling Bird, was dedicated by the Rev. kept (some of them chained) in a room built by him in 1693 over the porch of the Church for the use of the Vicar; the room disappeared at the restoration of the Church in 1852 and some of the books are now kept in the Vicarage; a copy of Cranmer's Bible dated 1541 is still preserved in the South Transept and an edition of the "Golden Legend" printed by Caxton in 1483 is in the Bodleian Library. Clarke (*Hundred of Wanting*: 1824, p. 90) states that the books were, in his time, well preserved from damp and did not appear to have suffered by use or abuse.

Berks (who was a gentleman pensioner to Henry VIII. and train-bearer to Queen Anne Boleyn) by his wife Catherine daughter of Sir Robert Cheyne (1488-1552) of Chesham Bois, Co. Bucks; his great grandfather, John Lytcot of Ruscombe and Twyford, Co. Berks, married Alice, daughter and sole heir of Henry Burley of Wokingham, Co. Berks. He was knighted at Rouen in 1591 by King Henry IV. of France and Navarre and was Sheriff of Berkshire in 1585 and 1596 and married firstly, Jane, widow of Thomas Essex, Esquire of Beckett House in Shrevenham Co. Berks, and secondly Catherine (*d.* 1630) widow of William Younge, Esquire of Basildon, Co. Berks, and daughter of William Barker of Sonning, Co. Berks. He died *s.p.* at Basildon.

Bennett Dewe (*d.* 1713) was the son of Henry Dewe (*d.* 1687, aged 57) by his wife Martha (*bur.* in Ardington Church), daughter of Thomas Plott of Upton in Blewbury, Co. Berks, and widow of Bennett Hobbs (*d.* 1666 and *bur.* in Ardington Church); his elder brother, Henry, died in the lifetime of his father in 1683, aged 15, and was also buried in Ardington Church. The manor of Erles Court in Hanney passed to Henry Dewe on his marriage with Martha, having previously been in possession of her first husband, Bennett Hobbs, and which remained in the family until it was sold after the death in 1816 of Charles Dewe, the grandson of Bennett.

* For most of the genealogical notes in connexion with East Hendred the writer has relied upon Mr. A. L. Humphrey's material in "*East Hendred : a Berkshire Parish*"; 1923.

He was the son and heir of John Eyston (*d.c.* 1545) by his wife Maud, daughter of Humphrey Tyrell of Warley, Co. Essex. His ancestor Richard Turberville of East Hendred left a daughter and heir Amy, who married William Arches whose great-grandson Rawlin had a daughter Maud who married John Stowe of Burford; Isabell the daughter and heir of John Stowe married John Eyston (*d.c.* 1492), the founder of the family at East Hendred from whom the John here mentioned was fourth in descent. He married firstly, Joan Clifford and secondly Jane, daughter of John Yate of Lyford, Co. Berks and widow of Oliver Wellesborne (*d.* 1554) West Hanney; by these marriages he had no issue. He married thirdly Jane, daughter and heir of Thomas Berington of Streatley, Co. Berks, by whom he had William (*d.* 1649) eldest son (who married Mary, daughter and co-heir of Thomas Thatcher of Priesthawes in Westham, Co. Sussex), John (*d.* 1663) (who married Elizabeth daughter of Robert Bretton of Titon, Co. Northants), Thomas (who married Mary, daughter of Thomas Yate of Lyford), Robert, a priest, and Margaret (*d.* 1641 and who married Francis Perkins of Ufton, Co. Berks).

William Eyston (1611-1670) was the eldest son and heir of William Eyston (1584-1649) of Catmore, Co. Berks by his wife Mary, daughter and co-heir of James Thatcher of Priesthawes, in Westham, Co. Sussex; he married firstly Eleanor, daughter of George Smith, Esquire, of Esh, Co. Durham and secondly Anne (*d.s.p.*) daughter of La Taura, a merchant of Genoa. By his first wife he had issue John, George (1636-91) his heir, who married Anne Dormer (see No. 14 below), two other sons and one daughter. He appears in the list of those summoned to, and entered in, the visitation of 1665 and is reported to have suffered much during the Civil War "by reason of his Religion and Loyalty." William Eyston (1660-1718) and mentioned on the same stone was the eldest son of John Eyston (*d.c.* 1686) by Mary (of Battle, Co. Sussex) daughter of William Coldham of Midhurst, Co. Sussex; he was in the army of King James II. in France and Ireland and was imprisoned in 1694 by Sir Robert Pye, (*d.* 1701) a Parliamentarian.

He was the eldest son of George Eyston (*d.* 1691; see No. 12 above) by his wife Anne (*d.* 1712; see No. 14 above) daughter of the Hon. Robert Dormer of Peterley, Co. Bucks; he married Winifred Dorothy (*d.* 1753), daughter of Basil Fitzherbert, Esquire of Swinnerton, Co. Stafford, and of Norbury, Co. Derby. The issue was Charles the eldest son (*d.* 1747; see No. 20 below), Thomas-John to whom the estates descended, two other sons and six daughters. Charles Eyston known as "the antiquary" was a friend of Thomas Hearne who made reference to him in his *Diary*, 1711-1721; "he was a man of sweet temper and was an excellent scholar" and his library contained rare and valuable volumes; he wrote several books of antiquarian interest, including a history of the Chapel of St. Amand at East Hendred. Under the Act of 1715 he entered the annual value of his estate for the purpose of being doubly taxed as a Recusant at £567.

The Eyston family was connected with the Thatcher family by the marriage in 1610 of Mary, daughter and coheir of James Thatcher (Thetcher), Esquire of Priesthawes in Westham, near Pevensy, Co. Sussex, with William Eyston (1584-1649), eldest son and heir of John Eyston (*d.* 1589; see No. 1 above); Thomas Thatcher, second son of John Thatcher of Ringmer Co. Sussex, married Joan, daughter of Nicholas Lewknor of Broadwater and Kingston-by-Sea, and was possibly the grandfather of the above mentioned James Thatcher who married Mary, daughter of Sir Edward Gage, Kt.

Gos, (1688-1693) and of Compton Bassett, Co. Wilts, (1693) being instituted as Rector of East Hendred in 1710 where he remained until his death. He was an author of many works including "Miscellaneous Tracts" published in 1702-6, and a friend of Anthony Wood and Thomas Hearne; he built a Charity School at East Hendred and left money for the poor.

Hallam (*History of Parish of East Lockinge*: 1900) records that the shield bore the arms of Wymondesold. Possibly argent a chevron between three martlets sable.

He was descended from the Wymondesold family of Putney and had three sons (in addition to Matthew mentioned in the inscription), Francis, *d.s.p.* 1759; William, *d.s.p.* 1779 and Charles, *d.s.p.* 1776; the latter was Sheriff of the County in 1760, and married firstly a daughter of Robert Knight, Esquire, (M.P. for Castle Rising and afterwards Earl of Castlereagh) and secondly Sarah (*d.* 1808) who afterwards married (before 1790) John Pollexfen Bastard, Esquire. About 1718-20 Matthew, who was fortunate in his dealings in the South Sea Company, purchased the manor of East Lockinge from the heirs of the Keate family and built a house, *c.* 1740, near the Church; he also acquired the moiety of the manor of West Bockhampton in Lambourn in 1721, the manor of Long Hanney in 1722, property in Furzwick in Wantage in 1724 and also the manors of Baldwins and Weeks in Wantage. The estates were held by his three sons in turn and eventually passed through Sarah, the widow of Charles Wymondesold, (*d.* 1776) to her second husband, J. P. Bastard.

WISEMAN.

She was the only surviving daughter and heir of Edward Keat (*d.* 1679) of Lockinge by his wife Cecilia, eldest daughter and coheir of Sir John Darell (*d.* 1657) Bt. of Barton Court in Kintbury, Co. Berks; she married Edmund Wiseman (*d.* 1694), Sheriff of the County in 1685, third son and heir of Edmund Wiseman (*d.* 1689; see Steventon No. 8, where, however, delete "Sir" in front of "Edmund Wiseman") of Sparsholt's Court in West Hendred; their only son and heir Edmund died in 1681. On the death of her father she inherited the manor of East Lockinge which on her death reverted to five sisters, the co-heirs of her Aunt Frances (daughter of Francis Keate, *d.* 1649, and sister of Edward Keate, *d.* 1679) who had married Joseph Prowse of Crediton, Co. Devon.

He was the third son of William Keate, Gent, of East Hagbourne, Co. Berks, and in 1565 married Joan, eldest daughter and coheir of John Doe (*d.* 1557) of Lockinge through whom he possessed the manor of East Lockinge. The issue was four sons and seven daughters; the third son Francis (*d.* 1649) succeeded to the manor and married Frances, daughter of Sir John Hungerford of Cadenham, Co. Wilts, by whom he had, with one other son, Francis, and two daughters, Edward (1619-1679); the latter was a Commissioner of the Land Tax in 1656 and a Justice of the Peace for the County and married in 1647 Cecilia, eldest daughter and coheir of Sir John Darell, Bt., and was the father of Anne mentioned in No. 2 above. Edward (*d.* 1679) and his father Francis (*d.* 1649) do not appear to have taken any noteworthy part in the Civil War, but Edward was probably a Royalist as, at the Restoration, he received recognition.

He was the sixth son of William Gerard (*d.* 1583), Esquire of Flamberds (= Flambards), Harrow-on-the-Hill, Co. Middlesex, by his wife Dorothy, daughter of William Page of Sudbury Court; his father was Counsellor of the Duchy of Lancaster to Queen Elizabeth and Prince James and the family was a branch of the Gerards of Bryn, Co. Lancs. James Gerard matriculated at Christ Church, Oxford, in 1608, received his M.A. degree in 1615 and was admitted to Gray's Inn in 1610; he also became a Student of Christ Church. His nephew Gilbert (eldest son of William, his eldest brother) was created first Baronet of Flambardes in 1620 and died 1669; his twin brother John, who was at Oxford with him, placed the monument in his memory.

She was the daughter of Edward Needham, Esquire of Iiston, Co. Leicester, by his wife Ann, daughter of Thomas Shawe of Repingall (? Rippingale) Co. Lincs, and married the Rev. John Grace, who was Vicar of Aldworth from 1619 to 1658. Her sister Mary is mentioned in No. 19 below.

They were the sons of the Rev. John Ferdinando Collins (*d.* 1889; see No. 13 below). The Rev. John Ferdinando Collins (*d.* 1910) was born at Alconbury, Co. Hunts, matriculated at Corpus Christi College, Oxford, in 1855, M.A. 1863, and became Vicar of Charlton, Co. Wilts, 1876; he married, in 1887 at Cheltenham, Co. Glos, Elizabeth, daughter of John Raby Hicks and widow of George Alexander of Highworth, Co. Wilts; he apparently had no issue. Henry Collins (*d.* 1914), the second son, was born at Cambridge, became a Solicitor in 1861 and Registrar of County Court of Berkshire in 1863; he lived at Leopold House, Reading, and married in 1865 at Putney, Co. Surrey, Emily Justina (1841-1893) daughter of Charles Bischoff of Wimbledon, Co. Surrey, by whom he had eight sons and three daughters through whom the present line has descended.

Charles Collins, the third son, was born at Betterton and became a Solicitor; he married in 1872, Caroline Louisa (*b.* 1843) daughter of Edwin Martin-Atkins (*d.* 1859; see Sparsholt No. 14) of Kingston Lisle, Co. Berks, by whom he had two sons and one daughter. He lived and was buried at Tilehurst, Co. Berks.

Sir Robert Hawthorn Collins, the fourth son, was born at Betterton in Lockinge; of Balliol and Lincoln Colleges, Oxford, M.A. 1867; called to the Bar 1866; Tutor to H.R.H. Duke of Albany, 1867-74; Comptroller of the Household of H.R.H. the Duchess of Albany, 1884; he became a K.C.B. in 1884 and K.C.V.O. in 1904 and married, in 1875, Mary Elizabeth (*b.* 1842), daughter of the Rev. Henry Wightwick, Rector of Codford St. Peter, Co. Wilts. He lived at Broom Hill, Co. Surrey.

Arthur Collins, the fifth son, was born at Betterton and received a Commission in the 57th Regiment; he served in South Africa in 1879 and retired as Hon. Lieutenant-Colonel in 1885; he was Comptroller and Equerry to H.R.H. Princess Louise, Marchioness of Lorne 1880-1900, a Gentleman-at-Arms in 1889 and Usher to Queen Victoria in 1892 and to the King; he was a C.B. and M.V.O., a J.P. for Hampshire and died unmarried.

She was the eldest daughter of John Head, Esquire, of Hodcott (Hodcutt) in West Ilsley, Co. Berks and married, as his first wife, Charles Collins (b. 1666) Esquire, of Betterton. The issue was six children, four sons and two daughters, the latter only surviving their father. Her husband, Charles Collins, was the son of John Collins (b. 1640) of Betterton by his first wife, Anne (b. 1640) eldest daughter of Charles Fettiplace (c. 1595-1674) of Earls Court (or Rooksnest), Lambourn; he was at Pembroke College, Oxford, and Middle Temple; he married secondly Elizabeth Coghill of Bletchington (? Bletchingdon, Co. Oxon) who *d.s.p.*; he married thirdly Anne, eldest daughter of Ferdinando White of Fryers Court, Co. Berks, by whom he had an only son Ferdinando Collins, the grandfather of the Rev. John Ferdinando Collins (d. 1889; see No. 13 below). Charles Collins, while at Oxford, seems to have behaved with "little discretion" in certain "frolicks" at Abingdon and to have provoked his father John Collins (to whom a grant of arms by Edward Bysshe, Clarenceux, was made in 1672) to write to him in May 1682 a letter of admonition in which he makes good use of the allegory of the family coat of arms expressing sentiments suitable, then as now, to the younger generation; "The field vert, signifys husbandry, the Gryphon, in authors, is an emblem of watchfulness, his being passant signifys diligence and industry, his colour, or, denotes riches, the cheif, ermin, signifys honour in cheif, w^{ch} put together resolves into this, y^t, by diligence and industry in our calling, we attain to riches, the foundation and way to honour, where the Gryphon is not rampant, as whereby a man should attain to riches and honour by rapacity and ambition, but by honesty and humility, all w^{ch} is aptly enpressed in this Mottoe; per Callem, Collem . . ." (Macleane: *Hist. of Pembroke College, Oxford*, 1897). The Collins family occupied the manor of Betterton in 1494 by grant from Poughley Priory and remained there until 1889 when, on the death of the Rev. John Ferdinando Collins (see No. 13 below), who had purchased the property in 1876, it was sold to Lord Wantage.

He was the son of the Rev. John Collins (1753-1826) of Betterton, Vicar of Cheshunt, Co. Herts, by his wife Martha (d. 1841), daughter of James Smith of Hammersmith, London, and Rotterdam; he was born at Lockinge, was at Winchester College, and matriculated at University College, Oxford, in 1830; B.A. 1834, a student of Lincoln's Inn 1834; he was Curate of Lockinge from 1846 to 1861, a Justice of the Peace for the County and for thirty years was Chairman of the County Bench for Wantage; he was also Chairman of the Wantage Board of Guardians for twenty-five years. He married, in 1836, Sarah (1809-1906), daughter of John Hawthorn of Glenluce, Co. Wigton and of Jamaica; the issue was six sons (see No. 10 above) and two daughters.

She was the younger daughter of Charles Collins (b. 1666) by his first wife Anne (d. 1707; see No. 12 above), eldest daughter of John Head of Hodcutt and married Richard Harland, Esquire of Sutton, Co. Yorks; the issue was four sons, two of which survived their mother (who died at Bath), Richard and Charles, Rector of Luddesdown, Co. Kent, who erected the monument. Her elder sister Charlotte, married John Saunders of Woolstone, Co. Berks, as her second husband. Clarke (*Hundred of Wanting*: p. 161) gives the arms, as appearing in 1824, as Argent on a bend sable three bucks' heads caboshed or; Harland, impaling: Collins.

The manor of East Lockinge was in possession of the Abbey of Abingdon from 868 until the Dissolution when it passed to the King until 1546 when it was sold to John Winchcombe (d. 1557) of Newbury. The Abbey also held the manor of West Ginge from 956 to 1538 when it passed with that of East Lockinge.

Ledger Stone.

Christopher Minshull, d. 1681, aged 45.

He was of the family of Minshull of Sussex and matriculated from New College, Oxford, in 1657; he was an Esquire Bedell of Divinity and received his B.A. in 1661 and M.A. in 1664; the inscription on the ledger stone records that on his travels near Lockinge he was thrown from his horse thus ending his journey and his life; Wood records that he was going to Lockinge to see "Esq. Wiseman" and that "on June 23, Wed. early in the morn St. Mary's (Oxford) bell rang out for Christopher Minshull esq." Francis, his brother, placed the stone in his memory.

He was of a family of Lupton, Co. Devon, in which county he was born, and became a Fellow of Oriel College in 1653 and of All Souls College, Oxford, in 1654, and was a brother of Ambrose Upton, Canon of Christ Church; he succeeded Edward Green, Rector from 1663 to 1672, at Lockinge; he left a wife Dorothy and was succeeded by John Aldworth as Rector.

He was son of Edwin Martin Atkins by Ellen Frances (*d.* 1831), daughter of William Halhed, Esquire ; his father took the additional name of Atkins at the request of his maternal uncle Abraham who was the son of Abraham Atkins of Kingston Lisle ; the latter was fortunate in his dealings with the South Sea Company and purchased the manor of Kingston Lisle, *c.* 1746-9, from John Hyde. Atkins Edwin Martin Atkins, a magistrate, High Sheriff of the County 1793 and a D.C.L. (1793) of Oxford University, married Ann, younger daughter of William Cook, Esquire, of Hothorpe ; the issue was four sons, Edwin (see No. 14 below), William Hastings (*b.* 1811 ; of Farley Castle, Co. Berks), George (*b.* 1815) and Henry (1818-1842, *d. unm.*) and five daughters.

John Fettiplace of Uffington, Co. Berks, was the second son of Anthony Fettiplace (*d.* 1546) of North Denchworth, Co. Berks, by his wife Bridget, daughter of Robert Skerne of London, citizen and stock-fishmonger; he married Margaret (only daughter of Thomas Braybrooke of Abingdon by his wife Katherine, daughter of William Barker), widow of William Androwes (Andrews) of Sutton Courtenay.

He was made Rector in 1312 by Sir Robert Achard and during his tenure, in 1342, the advowson passed to the Queen's College, Oxford, as part of its endowment made by Robert de Eglesfield, the Founder. William rebuilt the chancel of the church about 1327. Keyser (*B.A.J.* Vol. XI., p. 83) suggested that, as the arms of Achard appear in the first quarter of the coat on the brass, he was a member of that family, possibly the brother of Sir Robert Achard who, it is thought, built the south transept in 1330. On his death, the sum of twenty marks was certified by the Archdeacon of Berkshire as payable for dilapidations to Queen's College by his executor Richard de Woolston; the College had difficulty in substantiating the appointment of his successor to the Rectory for Peter Achard nominated Ralph de Notyngham who occupied the Church in March 1354 by forcible means but subsequently disappeared and the College eventually maintained the right of presentation, which the Provost and Scholars hold to the present day.

He was probably the son of Thomas Pleydell (*d.* 1527) of Coleshill, Co. Berks; Clarke (*Hundred of Wanting*: 166) records that John Pleydell, Gent, bought lands, etc., in Sparsholt and Westcot from Henry Brounker who had held them in 1549 from the Crown; the properties had belonged to the Abbey of Abingdon until the Dissolution. His issue was seven sons and six daughters of which only one son, Robert, survived; the Manor of Westcot descended to the latter's great grand-daughter, Charlotte Louisa, who married in 1724 John Dawnay (*b.* 1686; *d.v.p.* 1740), eldest son of the 2nd Viscount Downe; Henry Pleydell Dawnay (*b.* 1727, *d.unm.* 1760), son of John Dawnay and Charlotte Louisa Pleydell became 3rd Viscount Downe and in 1748 owned the manor which he after-

wards sold to Abraham Atkins. John Pleydell also came into possession of the manor of West Ilsley, Co. Berks, in 1565 which in 1541 was owned by his brother William; this manor descended to the 3rd Viscount Downe who sold it in 1755. The monument was placed originally in the north transept on the destruction of which in 1787 it was removed to its present position.

He was the son of William Hyde (*d.* 1598), Esquire of South Denchworth (see Denchworth, No. 1) by his wife Catherine, daughter of George Gill, Esquire of Wydiall (? Widiiall) Co. Hertford. He married Katherine, daughter of Sir Humphrey Ferrers, Kt., of Tamworth, Co. Warwick. The issue was four sons and one daughter according to the Pedigree signed by Humphrey Hyde in 1665-6, but in the inscription on the monument three children are mentioned; Humphrey (1595-1673) the eldest son and a Justice of the Peace for the County, married Anne, eldest daughter of Sir Lawrence Hyde, Kt., of Salisbury Close. Sir George held the manor of Kingston Lisle with that of South Denchworth; the former descended to his great-grandson John (*d.* 1703) and then to the latter's brother Frederick (*d.* 1713), the widow of whose son John (living 1720) sold the manor in 1749 to Abraham Atkins. Sir George was made a Knight of the Bath by King James I. "at his coronation of England," being probably one of the two hundred and thirty-seven gentlemen who received the honour of Knighthood during the King's progress from Edinburgh to London on his accession.

He was the eldest son and heir of Atkins Edwin Martin Atkins (*d.* 1825, see No. 1 above) and married Caroline, eldest daughter of Thomas Duffield, Esquire, M.P., (of Marcham, Co. Berks, who married as his first wife, Emily only child of George Elwes, Esquire of Marcham Park). The issue was five sons and four daughters ; Edwin (1838-1875) his heir, had a son, Edwin (1870-1883) by his second wife Amy, second daughter of Charles Hutton, Esquire, of Bath.

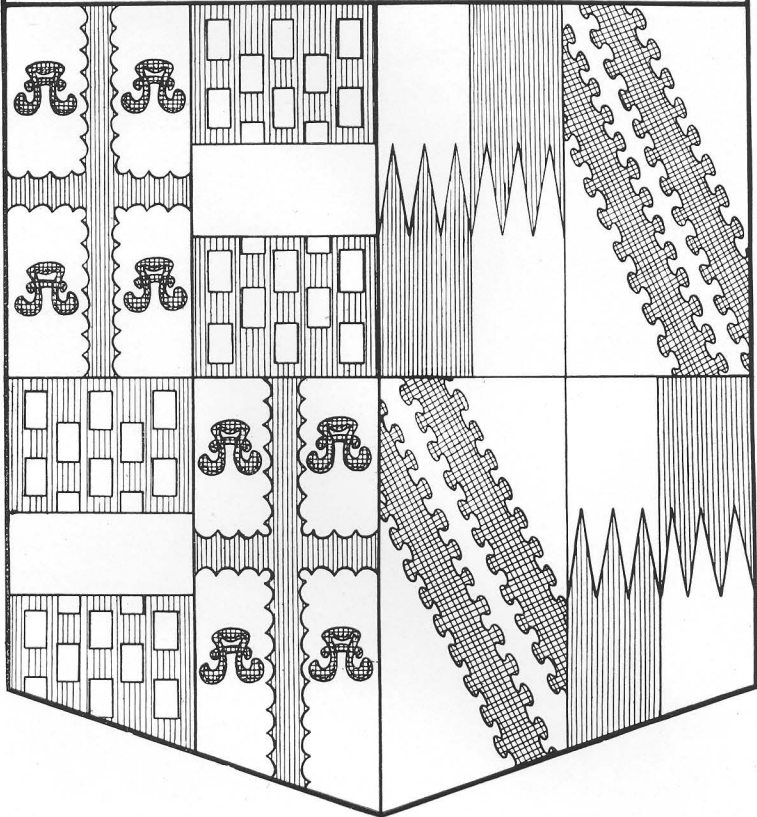
The South Chapel was restored in 1895 in memory of the Very Rev. William John Butler, D.D. (1818–1894), Vicar of Wantage, 1846 to 1880, Honorary Canon of Christ Church, Oxford, and afterwards successively Canon of Worcester (1880) and Dean of Lincoln (1885); he restored the Church in 1857 and in 1850 established an Anglican sisterhood of St. Mary in Wantage.

On the death of Fulk Fitz Warin in 1421, the Barony and the manor of Wantage passed to his sister Elizabeth who was the first wife of Sir Richard Hankford, Kt., by whom she had two daughters Thomasina and Elizabeth (*d.unm.* 1433). Sir Richard held Wantage manor for one Knight's fee in 1428 and, surviving his wife, died in 1430; he married secondly Anne, by whom he had a daughter and heir Anne, who married Thomas Ormond, who granted the manor of Eastbury in Lambourn to Fulk Bourchier (*d.* 1479), the son of his wife's half sister Thomasina. The manor of Wantage passed to Thomasina, sole heir, who married Sir William Bourchier, who was summoned to Parliament in 1449 in his wife's right; their son Fulk Bourchier died in 1479, the manor descending to his son John who was created Earl of Bath in 1537.

Somerset, by whom it appears he had no issue ; he married secondly Mary, daughter of Edward Hungerford of Cadenham, Co. Wilts, by whom he had a son George who died young ; he married thirdly Mary (*d.* 1728), daughter of Richard Jervoise, Esquire, of Herriard, Co. Hants. He inherited the manor of Uplambourn, purchased by his grandfather William Wilmot (*d.* 1618 ; see No. 24 below), and which was to pass, should he leave no male issue, to the daughters of William Daniel (who had married his aunt Frances Wilmot) with remainder to his cousin Thomas, son of Thomas Garrard (who had married his aunt Cicely). On the death of his widow Mary in 1728 the manor of Uplambourn and probably that of Wantage passed to the above mentioned cousin Thomas.

He was merchant and banker of Finchley, Co. Middlesex, his family being originally of Pembrokeshire; he married an Irish lady, Henrietta (*d.* 1884, aged 91), daughter of Captain Robert Patrick. His eldest son was William John Butler, D.D., Dean of Lincoln, (see No. 6 above), who married in 1843, Emma, daughter of George Henry Barnett, Esquire, of Glympton Park, Co. Oxon.

He married Cicely, daughter of Hugh Hyde Esquire, of Letcombe Regis, who was probably fifth son of William Hyde (*d.* 1557; see Denchworth, No. 7) Esquire. The issue was two sons, Hugh and George, and four daughters, Frances (who married William Daniel of St. Margarets near Marlborough, Co. Wilts), Cicely (who married Thomas Garrard (*d.* 1656) of Lambourn), Bridget (who married Thomas Mores of Coxwell, Co. Berks) and Martha (who married Thomas Tempest of Whaddon, Co. Cambridge). Of the sons George (*b.* 1601) was knighted and served as Sheriff in 1627, in which year he received from Sir William Segar, Kt., Garter, a grant of arms; during the Civil War he gave hospitality in 1643 and 1644 to Charles I. at his manor at Charlton which in 1630 he had purchased from Walter (*d.* 1644) and Samuel Dunch. The sons-in-law of William, Thomas Garrard and Thomas Tempest erected the brass in his memory. He purchased the manor of Uplambourn from the trustees of William Essex in 1609.

Henry Cook was at one time Headmaster of King Alfred's Grammar School, Wantage, and married Jane Elizabeth, daughter of John Robbins. Their son Theodore Andrea Cook was at the Wantage Grammar School, Radley and Wadham College, Oxford, and was knighted in 1916; he married in 1898 Elizabeth Wilhelmina, daughter of Pastor Link; he was Editor-in-Chief of the *Field* for many years, an oarsman and the author of numerous books.

The family is said to have been descended from Guarine de Meez (de Meer), of the House of Lorraine, who accompanied William I. at the Conquest; the manor of Wantage appears to have come into the possession of the family by the enfeoffment in 1224 by William Marshall, Earl of Pembroke and Marshall of England, to the third Fulk Fitz Warin; for some seven generations the family held the manor until about 1421 and from 1294 were summoned to Parliament as Lords Fitz Warin. In 1421 the manor and barony passed to Elizabeth, the sister and heir of Fulk Fitz Warin (who died a minor in that year); she married Sir Richard Hankford, Kt., who held the manor in 1428; their daughter and heir Thomasina married Sir William Bourchier whose son was Fulk Bourchier (*d.* 1479) Lord of Wantage; the latter's son, Lord John Fitz Warin, was created Earl of Bath in 1537. Anne, daughter and co-heir of Edward, 4th Earl of Bath, married in 1653 Sir Chichester Wrey (*d.* 1668) 3rd Bt. as her second husband; the Earldom became extinct in 1654 and Wrey, Baronet, now quarters, with other coats, those of Fitz Warin, Hankford and Bourchier. The manor of Wantage was sold by Sir Bourchier Wrey, 5th Bt. in 1707. There are two members of the family of Fitz Warin commemorated in Wantage Church; against the north wall of the chancel are two alabaster effigies which possibly represent Sir William Fitz Warin (*d.* 1361) and his wife Amice; he was 47th Knight of the Garter and before 1351 was in possession of the manor of Briens in Wantage and obtained a licence to found a Chantry in the Church. His son Sir Ivo Fitz Warin (commemorated by a brass on the north-east side of the north-west pier of the tower) died in 1414 and, by his will, founded the chantry which his father probably had failed to do on obtaining the licence; Sir Ivo served with Thomas of Woodstock, Duke of Gloucester and sixth son of Edward III., at the siege of Nantes in 1380 and married Maud Dargentein of Herefordshire by whom he had two daughters, Eleanor (who survived her father and became heir having married firstly Sir John Chidioke and secondly Ralph Bush) and Alice; the latter married Richard Whittington (*d.s.p.* being third son of Sir William Whittington of Pauntley, Co. Glos) "thrice Lord Mayor of London" in 1397, 1398 and 1406.
