KP200 Agdash

During trenching operations, a large pottery vessel was observed on the pipe side of the trench at KP200 (8702296 4488893).

The area is part of the Agdash plain an area of flat ground covered by semi desert and dissected by large numbers of irrigation ditches.

The vessel had been damaged by the work of the Cleveland trencher. Access was not permitted until the pipe was lowered and the first layer of backfill was laid. Members of the IoAE conducted the examination of the remains on 20th May 2004. At the time of the discovery, there were reports that human bones had been retrieved. The object is thought to be of the Antique period. There are no other records for this site.

KP204 Agdash

During trenching a number of items were located in this area. All are found within 500m along the pipeline and appear very similar in form and date. This probably represents the location of settlement, presumably of Antique period date. The area is part of the Agdash Plain with a semi-desert environment crossed by numerous irrigation ditches at a height of around 12.5m above sea level

- 1. 8701612, 4492621. A large storage jar was observed near the base of the pipe trench on the south side, meaning that the vessel's base was approximately 2m deep. Following machine excavation of the area, it was found that the vessel was a large storage jar approximately 1m in diameter. The vessel had been empty but had collapsed with the weight of material above it in antiquity, so that only the lower half of the vessel was intact. There were land snail shells present in the jar, which had moved in while the interior was open. There was no apparent change in the soil layers above this buried feature to account for the depth at which it was found.
- 2. 8701610,4492640; 8701612,4492643. On the pipe side of the trench to the west of 1 were two rectangular flat-bottomed basins with steep sides cut by the pipe trench. Both were very similar in appearance and contained similar fills. The basins were approximately 1.5m by at least 2m long and were 0.2m deep. The basins were filled by deposits of fired clay and fine charcoal that were deposited in alternating, horizontal layers with some signs of lamination. There were no artefacts associated with the pits, so it is possible that they represent a different period to the other features in the area. The deposits appear to be associated with heating and water. It is suggested that a number of activities might have given rise to these basins or pits, such as salt making or processing crops.
- 3. <u>8701602</u>, <u>4492850 (is this correct?)</u>. Two large jars and a number of other jars containing human bone were identified on the subsoil side of the trench at a depth of approximately 2.5m below the surface. There is a thin dark soil horizon to the east of the jars about 1m below the surface. This may represent a buried soil.
- 4. To the west of 3 across a 3m deep canal was a large burial group found in the side of the trench. This burial was also located at a depth of approximately 3m below present day ground level. The burial was a human in a crouched position accompanied by a copper or bronze bowl and approximately 5 pottery bowls and jugs. There may have been a larger number, prior to disturbance by the pipeline.
