ART. VIII.—Heraldry at Rydal Hall. By R. S. BOUMPHREY, M.A.

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Introduction.

THE heraldry at Rydal Hall is an interesting and decorative attempt to display the quarterings of the Fleming family which, though entirely honest in intent and execution, nevertheless results in an incorrect record owing to a mistaken interpretation of the quarterings derived from a marriage with an heiress. Hugh Fleming, of Rydal (d. 1557), married Joan, daughter of Sir Richard Hudleston, of Millom (d. 1483), and sister and coheir of Richard Hudleston. and the shields displayed shew this Hudleston heiress as bringing in quarterings for Fenwick, Stapleton, Fauconberg, Fitz Alan, Maltravers, Ingham, de la Pole, and Chaucer. The pedigree of the Hudleston family in CW2 xxiv 201, however, shews that Joan Hudleston's mother was Margaret Neville, natural daughter of the Earl of Warwick, "the Kingmaker"; it was her uncle, Sir John Hudleston, Sheriff of Cumberland 1505/6, who married Johanna, daughter and coheir of Sir Miles Stapleton, and Joan Hudleston's descendants were only entitled to the Fenwick quartering and not to the Stapleton quarterings brought into the Hudleston family by this marriage.

I am once again indebted to Mr C. Roy Hudleston for his help in recording and interpreting the arms described.

- I. Argent on a bend Sable three lozenges of the field each charged with a saltire Gules (Urswick).
- 2. a double tressure flory counterflory of the first (Howard); ii, Gules three lions passant guardant in pale Or a label of three points Argent (Thomas of Brotherton, younger son of Edward I); iii, Chequy Or and Azure (Warren); iv, Gules a lion rampant Argent (Mowbray); in fess point a crescent Argent for difference.

Quarterly, i & iv, Fleming; ii & iii, Hughes; impaling, In chief, Per fess Or and Azure a lymphad sails furled oars in action in dexter chief a hand couped grasping a dagger point upwards in sinister chief a cross crosslet fitchée all within a bordure engrailed Gules (Macpherson); In base, Argent a wolf salient (Rennick).

All as in No. 2, except that in Quarter v, the tinctures are reversed; Quarter x is, Sable fretty Or; and in Quarter xi the fess is charged with an annulet Sable.
