ART. XV – The case of the Stainton, Newbiggin and Blencow Enclosure Award By ROBERT S. DILLEY M.A., M.LITT., PH.D

The deciphering of enclosure awards may be tedious and, where damage has occurred, frustrating. Only rarely is it genuinely puzzling.

The writer first met the Stainton, Newbiggin and Blencow Award (Q/RE/1/38) over thirty years ago as part of an undergraduate project. It was quickly abandoned as too complicated to be understood. While age does not necessarily involve greater wisdom, it usually confers more patience and – with some trepidation – the Award was recently approached again. This time, three days' hard labour yielded success. It may be that the time taken to unravel the mystery of this 200-year-old document reflects the fact that the writer's deductive powers owe less to Sherlock Holmes and more to Dr Watson. Nonetheless, publishing the results of this battle may help some future researcher.

Cumberland enclosure awards normally consist of three parts. There is a written preamble referring to the Act of Parliament or Private Agreement initiating that enclosure, naming the Enclosure Commissioner(s) and detailing the procedures followed in making the award. Then there is a list of individual allotments, generally written as continuous text until the early 19th century and thereafter more usually taking the form of a table, with the name of the owner, the area of the allotment and variable other details such as descriptions of adjoining plots. Finally, there is a map outlining the area to be enclosed (with more or less – usually less – detail of the surrounding area) and specifying the exact location of each person's allotment.

A few awards – especially more recent copies – lack maps and are therefore hard to locate on the ground. Some have suffered from fading, rubbing or other damage and are in places difficult to read. The Award for Stainton, Newbiggin and Blencow is complete (it has both a narrative description of allotments and separate tables); it has good maps and has suffered little damage. Yet on closer inspection it defies rational interpretation. Nothing seems to fit. It is as if the Enclosure Commissioners ('Thomas James of Penrith in the County of Cumberland Gentleman Isaac Hobson of Grassgarth in the Parish of Sebergham in the said County Gentleman and Joseph Hodgson of Penrith aforesaid Ironmonger') deliberately set about creating a puzzle for future generations.

The Common Waste

The text lists allotments in four sections: (1) those on the waste common to all three townships; and then those in the common arable fields for (2) Stainton, (3) Newbiggin and (4) Great Blencow. At first sight Section 1, enclosure of the common waste, is straightforward. Each parcel is described and located (there is no tabular listing for this Section). For example, one William Weightman was allocated

All that Part or Parcell of the said Common and Waste as the same is marked out thereon




Fig. 1. The Stainton, Newbiggin and Blencow enclosure award.

and distinguished in the said Plan marked (I) with the number and letter (4N) Containing One Acre Three Roods and Twelve Perches and bounded on the East by the Quarry Ground hereinbefore set out near Stainton on the South East and South West by a part of the share hereinbefore set out to the said William Scott and on the North West by the said last mentioned Turnpike Road. . . .

The plan or map (originally labelled H but with an attempt made to erase the right upright and the crossbar) shows each allotment with the owner's name, the number/letter identification and the area.

In fact, things are not quite so simple. When an individual was allocated two or more parcels, all were given the same number and the area stated is that for all that individual's parcels. The area was entered on the map in only one of those parcels. This can result in one plot on the map being next to a visibly smaller one credited with a larger area. Still more confusing is the fact that in some cases allotments in the common arable fields were included with those on the common waste; only one number was given and only one total area.

Stainton and Newbiggin Common Fields

Section 2, Stainton common field, refers to Map A. As with Section 1, each parcel has a code number in the text – but these do not match those on the map. Moreover, while the table at the end of the Award ('A Schedule of the old improved Lands in the Townships of Great and Little Stainton in the Barony of Graystock in the County of Cumberland') gives each parcel a number that does appear on Map A, neither the parcels nor the numbers seem to relate to those in the text. There is no indication in the table which of these parcels (noted as reorganised and consolidated by voluntary exchange) was subject to enclosure at this time. The map uses two different colours for parcel boundaries, but these do not seem to have anything to do with ownership or state of enclosure.

Closer investigation of the map reveals that some parcels have a second number written on them, and this refers to the number in the text for parcels enclosed and allocated in this Award. There is still the problem that one landowner may be allocated more than one parcel in the common arable fields, and that all will be given the same identification number and a single area, sometimes combined with shares of the waste. It is therefore necessary to check each parcel on the map carefully to see if it has a second number and is thus part of the enclosure. Some tiny parcels noted in the text cannot be found on the map, and were presumably considered too small to show. Section 3, Newbiggin common field, refers to Plan E and follows the same format.

Great Blencow Common Field

In Section 4 the compilers of the Award, obviously feeling that they had not been sufficiently devious, tried something different. The text refers to plan D (actually another plan I – this one intended as an I from the beginning). However, in this case

the identification number from the text does not appear on the map – only the number from the table of parcels in the field which, as in the other sections, includes many not part of the Award. If the landowner is allotted only one parcel then it can be traced by finding a parcel in the table of exactly that size. However, most were allotted more than one parcel – but only the total area for all that person's parcels is given. For example, George Troutbeck was allotted five parcels in Great Blencow field totalling 44 acres 2 roods and 26 perches. In the table he has thirty parcels totalling 113 acres 2 roods 15 perches. Neither the table nor the map indicates which is which.

Some clue can be obtained from the listing in the text of the parcels adjacent to each allotment, though as there were only five landowners involved and the use of directions is rather approximate this does not always permit identification. The task was completed by entering every parcel in the Blencow field on a computer spreadsheet and converting all roods and perches to decimal fractions of an acre. Likely parcels identified from the text directions were then combined until the correct number of parcels totalled exactly the total area allotted to that individual. Text numbers and map and table numbers are equated in Table 1.

Conclusion

There were some other minor problems. A few numbers were illegible, and there were some discrepancies in names and numbers between the text and the map. None of this is serious, as it is always possible to get areas approximately right from the map. Once it was established just which parcels were dealt with in this Award, the outer boundaries were transferred to outline 1:25000 Ordnance Survey maps. This involved careful measurement in places where original field boundaries have disappeared. The result is shown in Figure 1. The accompanying table lists all holdings as taken from the text, rearranged to separate holdings in the common arable fields from those on the common waste.

Schedule of Allotments

The following numbers (in acres, roods and perches) are taken from the Award. In the text of the Award, allotments are mostly in order of map number. Allotments in this version have been resorted to eliminate irregularities. Missing numbers (e.g. 7A) are not used in the original (except for 5A to 5L and 10W, which indicate public quarries and public watering places and for which no areas are given).

Any one allotment may include several parcels. However, where allotments include areas both on the common waste and in the common fields, these components have been separated and listed under the appropriate heading. An asterisk (*) in the common waste listing indicates an allotment with land also in Stainton Common Field.

The text shows that several parcels were consolidated, exchanged, sold or bequeathed before formal allotment. The names given below are those of the people who were actually allotted the land in the final award.

For lands in the common fields, the names of the specific fields or furlongs being enclosed are given.
