suggestive of how a *placens uxor* of some short two-and-a-half centuries agone had to address her liege lord and master. Whether, however, a covert meaning may not be detected between the lines, of the fair writer's being only too thankful that her husband should still longer "order his house and affaires in the countrey," that she might prolong her stay with her deare mother and sisters in the then fashionable *purlieu* of Blackfriars, may be left to the gentler sex to determine.
