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



The Surrey Archaeological Society was founded in 1854 and the area which it covers remains the same today as it did then—the whole of the historic County including all that part of South London that used at one time to lie in Surrey.

Today the Society's *activities* have grown to match the challenge that faces modern archaeology. A vigorous programme of research and rescue excavation is carried out and an annual volume of excavation reports, synthesising articles and notes is published (free to members). The challenge of observing the construction work on the motorways has been met and a healthy relationship built up with planning authorities in the County.

Naturally there is a full range of services to members as well—a first class library, a *Bulletin* published eight times a year, a programme of lectures and visits, and so on. No one who is seriously interested in the archaeology or history of Surrey or South London can afford not to be a member.
