

EXHIBITIONS

Guildhall Museum and London Museum—the exhibition galleries of both museums are now closed. The new Museum of London will probably open in 1976.

Welwyn Roman Bath-House. The baths of the Dicket Mead Villa near Welwyn were enclosed in a steel shell when the A1(M) was constructed over them; access is by tunnel. The Baths are the responsibility of a charitable trust for archaeological education. The site is open to the public on Sunday afternoons from 2-4.30 p.m.; admission is 10p per person.

Boat Archaeology Symposium at the National Maritime Museum, Greenwich. 20-24th September. Subjects to be covered will include the properties of wood and related conservation problems, ethnography, the recording of finds, hypothetical reconstructions, ancient building methods and experimental archaeology.

The programme will be of interest to both professional and amateur archaeologists. In addition to a number of invited speakers the Museum will consider applications from those wishing to contribute a paper. Residential Summer School on London Ceramics at the Morley College. Over the last seven years the Morley College Ceramic Circle has built up a great reputation through its annual weekend seminars. The College is now offering a Residential Summer School. Subjects will include: manufacturing techniques; practical pottery; stoneware in London; delftware in Lambeth, Southwark and Mortlake; Chelea, Bow and the porcelain factories; the Art Pottery; two days of visits to places of ceramic interest. The lecturers will include R. J. Charleston, Dr. R. Redstone and Hugh Tait.

Fees are £35 for the week, which includes tuition, bed, breakfast, mid-morning coffee and lunch; the two coach trips are extra. There is also a limited number of non-residential places; fees £22 including tuition, mid-morning coffee and lunch.
