

#### **Exhibitions**

**Poverty and Pleasure** – **life in Victorian Southwark**, at the Cuming Museum, 155 Walworth Road, SE17 until 20 April. Open Tuesday – Saturday, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission free.

Images of the London Blitz, a temporary photographic exhibition at the Museum of London, to mark the 50th anniversary of the London Blitz, until 6 May.

Archaeology and the Bible, at the British Museum, to 24 March. Using objects drawn mainly from the Museum's own collections, it will illustrate the cultural and political history of the Holy Land from the time of the Patriarchs to the domination by Assyrians, Babylonians, Persians, Greeks and Romans. On display will be one of the Dead Sea Scrolls and two of the recently-excavated lime-plaster statues from 'Ain Ghazel in Jordan. Admission £2, concessions £1.

The Tale of London Past – Beatrix Potter's archaeological paintings, at the Museum of London, to 27 January. These little-known watercolours comprise a formal archaeological record of everyday Roman objects such as shoes, pots, nails and tools, painted in 1894-5. The objects were discovered in the silty deposits of the Walbrook stream on the site of the National Safe Deposit Company's premises to the west of Mansion House in 1872-3. Although some of the finds went to the Guildhall Museum, those illustrated here went to a private collector and were lost.

Treasures and Trinkets, jewellery in London from pre-Roman times to the 1930s. At the Museum of London from 5 February to February 1992. Over 500 pieces from the Museum's collections, with special emphasis on the significance of jewellery as social symbols. A fully-illustrated catalogue will be published to accompany the exhibition; there will also be a special series of early evening lectures in February and March and a day conference in April.
