
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

Exhibitions

Maori, at the British Museum to I November. The first exhibition ever mounted by the British Museum devoted entirely to the culture, history and arts of the Maori people of New Zealand. See previous issue for details.

To accompany the event a special publication has been prepared, with contributions by Maori scholars from New Zealand, which provides a wider historical and cultural background. Edited by Dorota Starzecka, *Maori* is available from Museum bookshops price £14.99.

Buddhist Arts of the Edo Period (1600-1868), at the British Museum to 15 November. Includes Buddhist sculpture, ritual implements, paintings and prints from the 17th to 19th centuries, all from the British Museum's own collections. Admission charge.

Earlier Monetary Unions, at the British Museum to 10 January 1999. An exploration of common currencies and economic union in Europe since the beginning of coinage, to coincide with the introduction of the new Euro currency in Europe.

London Bodies, at the Museum of London from 27 October to 21 February 1999. The exhibition uses skeletal remains from archaeological excavations throughout London and objects from the Museum's own collections to look at what Londoners ate, how they lived, the diseases they had, and what they did to improve their appearance.

A special book, London Bodies: a skeletal history of London, with an introduction by Roy Porter, is being published by the Museum of London to accompany the exhibition.
