

Exhibitions

London Bodies, at the Museum of London to 21 February. The exhibition uses skeletal remains from archaeological excavations throughout London and objects from the Museum's own collections to look at what Londoners ate, how they lived, the diseases they had, and what they did to improve their appearance.

A special book, London Bodies: a skeletal history of London, with an introduction by Roy Porter, has been published by the Museum of London to accompany the exhibition.

Building the British Museum, at the British Museum from 23 January to 18 April. Using archive material, much of which has never been exhibited before, Building the British Museum shows the contribution of ten architects to this world-famous building. Watercolours of early interiors, unexecuted schemes, written accounts by builders and Museum staff, and the atmospheric images of photographers such as Roger Fenton and William Lake Price, document the constantly changing Museum environment.

The exhibition is accompanied by the book *Building the British Museum* by Marjorie Caygill and Christopher Date (published by British Museum Press, price £8.50).
