## HOT TOPIC 1:

### MAYOR'S NEW LONDON PLAN

Boris Johnson, Mayor of London, recently published a draft revision to the London Plan. This is the Spatial Development Strategy for Greater London. Archaeology and heritage crop up in a few places. They even have their own section within the "London's Living Places and Spaces" chapter. Policy 7.8 (Heritage Assets and Archaeology) states the following:

The London Plan

## Strategic

A London's historic environment, including natural landscapes, conservation areas, heritage assets, World Heritage Sites, Scheduled Ancient Monuments and memorials should be identified, preserved and restored.

B Development should incorporate measures that identify, record, interpret, protect and, where appropriate, present, the site's archaeology.

#### Planning decisions

C Development should preserve, refurbish and incorporate heritage assets, where appropriate.

D New development in the setting of heritage assets, and conservation areas should be sympathetic to their form, scale, materials and architectural detail.

E New development should make

provision for the protection of archaeological resources and significant memorials. Where the artefact or memorial cannot be

moved from the site without damaging its cultural value, the assets should where possible be made available to the public on-site.

## LDF preparation

F Boroughs should, in LDF policies, seek to maintain and increase the contribution of built heritage to London's environmental quality and economy while allowing for London to accommodate change and regeneration.

G Boroughs, in consultation with English Heritage, Natural England and other relevant statutory organisations, should include appropriate policies in their LDFs for identifying and protecting heritage assets scheduled ancient monuments, archaeological assets, memorials and natural landscape character within their area.

There's plenty in the London Plan about tall buildings, regeneration, housing and climate change.

CBA London will be responding to the Draft London Plan. We would like to incorporate your views into our response. Is there something that you feel the Mayor has omitted? Do you think that the historic environment deserves a higher profile in the London Plan? Has the Mayor done the bare minimum or is this a long-overdue recognition of archaeology at City Hall? #### **HOT TOPIC 2:**

# OLYMPICS AND ARCHAEOLOGY (CONTINUED...)

The main Olympic site in Hackney and Newham has been one of the largest archaeological excavations in London for many years. The vast majority of the excavation and preliminary analysis of the site has been undertaken by a consortium of Museum of London Archaeology and Pre-Construct Archaeology.

This MOLA/PCA compact was designed to allow the entire site to be excavated in a holistic manner, combining the skills and experience of two of London's largest contracting units. It was a model that has been used before, most notably at the large Heathrow Terminal 5 excavations undertaken by Oxford and Wessex Archaeology.

CBA London has learned, to our surprise, that the Olympic Delivery Authority has awarded the contract for the site-wide assessment of the site (including dissemination of the site's interpretation) to a third company: Wessex Archaeology. This raises a lot of questions about the continuity of excavation and interpretation and CBA London will be seeking to ensure that the archaeology at the Olympic site is properly analysed and fully explained to the public, thereby ensuring a proper archaeological legacy from the 2012 London Olympics.

Meanwhile, at Greenwich Park, the proposed site of the equestrian events and home to some special archaeology (as well as being a World Heritage Site), there seems to be something of a stalemate.

Local protests have continued.

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raising a diverse set of issues that range from car parking to tree-saving, and CBA London are still waiting to see a planning application from LOCOG which should indicate how the park will be utilized and how any negative effects on the archaeology in the park (including an Anglo-Saxon burial ground and a Roman temple) will be mitigated.

Watch this space and let us know what you think should be done.
