This left foot from a statue of 'heroic' size, cast in heavily-leaded bronze, was recovered during excavations by Pre-Construct Archaeology at Tabard Square, Southwark in 2002. Wearing a sandal (with hints of a possible sock) the god or goddess represented remains enigmatic. The foot would no doubt have supported a larger-than-life size statue, perhaps set on one of the plinths situated in an open precinct adjacent to the two Romano-Celtic temples identified at the site.
