Bracklesham Bay

Summary Description

This gently curving bay boarders the eastern edge of the Solent and is the most easterly within the Seascapes study. Directly open to the prevailing south westerly winds the bay is popular for windsurfing and water sports. The exposed nature of the are also means that a number of wrecked ships have come to lie within the bay.

Sea Surface

The most frequently seen activities in this area are windsurfing, kite surfing, swimming and SCUBA diving. The sheltered and shallow waters of the bay are ideal for use by the large numbers of tourists who holiday in the area.

Further offshore there are faster currents, particularly near Selsey Bill, which makes swimming hazardous. There are numerous yachts and pleasure craft which utilised the area.

Seabed Surface

Groynes are frequent features all along the coastline of this rapidly eroding shore, these stretch into the fully marine zone. The area features the sandy coastal bay which is backed by shingle. The infamous Bracklesham fossile beds are exposed at low tide.

There are 14 wrecks and obstructions charted in the area, this includes the designated historic wreck site of Warship Hazardous, a 4th rate ship of the line sunk in 1706. The small number of charted site are only a minute proportion of the number of recorded losses in the area.

The nearshore zone features a series of semi-circular sandbanks, shoals, and rocks, known as 'The Mixons', it has been suggested that a number of these features may be related to Roman use of the area prior to sea level rise.

Seabed Subsurface

There is nothing charted or recorded within the currently available marine datasets for the seabed subsurface.

Coasta

East Wittering is characterised by caravan parks and residential housing. These buildings stretch along the sea front linking with those at Bracklesham to from a continuous ribbon of beachside development.

Selsey holds evidence of Roman occupation. This low-lying headland attracts many holiday makers. East beach is the resorts main centre, it is protected by a sea wall and many groynes, has a car park and boat park, with a wooden ramp down to the beach. East Beach keeps much of the seafaring flavour of old Selsey, with fishing boats offshore, lobster pots in heaps along the sea-wall, and stalls selling locally caught crabs, whelks, cockles, and fish.

Archaeological Potential

The archaeology of this area is dominated by the shipwreck resource. However, the potential for the survival of submerged prehistoric landscapes should be highlighted. Such deposits can reveal important evidence of sea level and climate change and the development of Britain as an island.

There is also the potential for the features off Selsey to be associated with Roman use of the intertidal and formerly terrestrial zones which are now drowned.
