1 East IIsley. T. N. p. 111, 122, 126, Sewal d'Oseville has in Wydehay and East IIsley two fees of the Fee of the Earl of Hereford of the Honour of Pleshy. The same tenant holds Wendlebury, Oxon; and Wanborough in Wilts. Inkpen (Hundred of Kintbury Eagle). T. N. pp. 111, 122, 126. Walter le Mansel has one fee, Nicholas of Inkpen half a fee and the Abbot of Titchfield (Hants) half a fee of the Fee of Roger de Somery—so that the later holdings represent the previous holding by two freemen in alod as two manors. Isley (Hundred of Compton). T. N. p. 109, Oliver d'Eyncourt has in Frilsham and East IIsley \frac{2}{3}\$ of a fee of the Fee of the Earl of Ferrers. Isley. T. N. p. 111, 122, 127, John de Elsefeld has one fee of the Fee of Roger de Sumery of the Honour of Dudley.

4 Hungerford (Hundred of Kintbury Eagle). T. N. p. 125, Simon de Montfort holds Hungerford of the Honour of Leicester, 'nec facit scutagium.' p. 107, Laurencia Countess of Leicester is in the King's gift, and her land in Hungerford is worth £20.

5 Hungerford. T. N. p. 107, Simon Ponchard has two virgates of land 'per serjantiam hastillarum' worth 10s. (p. 128, 'per serjantiam hastæ tornandæ.') p. 125, Geoffrey Ponsard holds one virg. of the King's gift by serjeanty 'ad Hardland Carv.' p. 127, Richard Possat holds one virgate 'per serjantiam faciendi Harz in cognina domini Regis,' and it is worth 10s. per annum.

6 Hungerford. T. N. p. 107, 109, 122, 126, John Belet holds one hide of land in Hungerford, of the King in chief by the service of one-fifth of a knight's fee, and it is worth 20s.

7 Hungerford. T. N. p. 111, 122, 126, Philip de Cumberwell has half a fee of the Earl of Hereford of the Honour of Hereford.

8 Englefield (Hundred of Theale). T. N. p. 111, 119, 121, William of Englefield has one fee of the Fee of Roger de Somery of the Honour of Dudley. p. 132, for 7 car. are paid 14s.

9 West Lockinge (Hundred of Wantage). T. N. pp. 109, 121, 126, Stephen de Curzon has one fee of the Fee of the Earl of Ferrers. See Acenge.

10 East Lockinge. T. N. p. 121, Henry de Pewsey has in Pusey, East Lockinge and La More (Draycott Moor) one fee of the Abbot of Abingdon of his barony. p. 124, it is said to be held in demesne by the Abbot in alms and to pay no scutage.

N. p. 128, William Briwar 'juvenis' has £10 of land of the gift of King John 'sine servicio nominato.' pp. 110, 122, 126, William Gernon has of the land which belonged to William Briwar half a fee which he now holds of the King in chief. p. 128, Ricardus Wallensis has £7 10s. od. of land of the gift of King John 'sine servicio nominato.' 1 Chipping Lamborne. T. N. pp. 110, 122, 126, Fulk fitz Warin has half a fee in Chipping Lamborne, and he holds of the King in chief. T. N. p. 128, Hawis de Dinant has £22 10s. od. of land by a fine which Fulk Warin her late husband made with King Richard. This land was held by her father Joc' de Dinan of the gift of Henry the former King, 'sine servicio nominato.' T. N. pp. 110, 122, 126, William de Plugeney has half a fee of the King in chief. p. 128, the Abbot and Monks of Stanlegh (Hundred of Chippenham?) hold in alms one hide of the gift of Hugo de Pluggenet by the confirmation of Henry the former King. p. 133, there is paid by the tenants of the Abbot of Gloucester for one car. 2s. T. N. p. 124, Hugo de Plugeney holds in Up-Lamburn the land which belonged to John de Gyse, viz. £10 of land, and pays into the Exchequer 40s. a year rent.

<sup>2</sup> East Garston (Hundred of Lamborne). The name East Garston seems to be corrupted from Esgarston, so called from Esgar the Staller who held the Manor T.R.E. The village is now popularly called Argoson: and there is no West Garston. T. N. p. 107, Eva de Tracy is in the King's gift and is not married, and her land in Esgareston which she holds from the King is worth £20. p. 124, Eva de Tracy holds the Manor of Esegareston in dower of the inheritance of Hawis of London, and it belongs to the Manor of Kidwelly; the service by which the said Hawis holds is that if the King or his chief justice comes into the parts of Kidwelly with an army, the said Hawis shall conduct the said army with her banner and all her people through the midst of the parish of Neath to Lagern. p. 131, she pays for 29\(^2\) car. 59s. 4d. 

Stamborne. T. N. p. 111, 122, among the fees held of the King's bailiff by Geoffrey le Despenser by reason of his having the son and heir of Robert Musard in ward, is one fee in Sparsholt and Lamborne. p. 119, for this is paid one mark.

Leckhampstead (Hundred of Faircross). T. N. p. 109, Herbert fitz Peter has one fee of the Fee of the Abbot of Abingdon. pp. 121, 126, this is held by Isabella de Mortimer of the inheritance of Herbert fitz Peter. p. 133, for 9 car. are paid 18s. From the Abingdon Chronicle (A. C. i. 457) it appears that in the time of King Cnut Brihtmund the father of Brihtmin, the tenant T.R.E. held this land under Abingdon Abbey on a lease for three lives. Brihtwin, who was only the tenant, seems to have set up an unjust claim to ownership.

Letcombe Basset. Possibly Robert d'Oily may have been so named from Ouillie-la-Basset near Falaise. See Ordericus Vitalis (ed. A. le Prevost: vol. iv. p. 165 n.)

Letcombe Regis (Hundred of Kintbury Eagle). T. N. p. 128. the Abbot and Monks of Cluny hold this in alms of the gift Henrici regis avi. p. 125, the Prior of Tifford holds Letcombe in demesne with Chaulawe Wodhull of the Abbot of Cluny paying yearly 100 marks, and the said Abbot holds in demesne.-See Ceveslane.

\*\*Lyford\*\* (Hundred of Ock). T. N. pp. 110, 121, 126, Fulco de Cowdray holds one fee of the Fee of the Abbot of Abingdon.

A. C. ii. 133, it is stated to be held by Walter Giffard, junior, and to be of the extent of 7 hides.

Lyford.

T. N. pp. 110, 121, Philip de Sta. Helena and Robert de Turbervill have in St. Helen's, Frilford, Lyford, Sutton and Hendred three fees of the Fee of the Abbot of Abingdon. This estate was given by Cnut (A. C. i. 439) and consisted of two hides.

A. C. ii. 5, 'Reginaldus de Sancta Helena (the Rainaldus of Domesday) iii. milites pro v. hidis in Gerstune et pro iiii. or hidis in Frileford et iii. hidis in Liford et ii. hidis in Henrethe.'

Lovingdon (Hundred of Blewbury) near Aston Tirrold.

Marcham (Hundred of Ock). T. N. p. 124, the Abbot of Abingdon holds among other places Garford, Marcham.

T. N. pp. 121, 127, William of Sevekwurth (Seacourt) holds in Seacourt, Bagworth and Marcham, two fees of the Abbot of Abingdon. From A. C. ii. 123, it may almost be inferred that William of Seckworth was the son of Anschil.

Milton near Abingdon (Hundred of Ock). T. N. p. 124, Middelton is held with other places in demesne by the Abbot of Abingdon.
