DORCHESTER.—For Lockette *read* Socketts, i.e. for lights, possibly of tenebræ standards; for a leyehe bell and ffryer pan *read* a leyche bell and a ffyer pan; lych or corse bell, rung before the corpse at funerals, and ffyer (fire) pan for the incense.

IPPWELL.—For sauce bell *read* sance bell, i.e. sancte bell, and in the last clause for Morntorye *read* Inventory.
