OXFORD IN THE PAST.—Mr. A. Meade, in "The Argosy," quotes an account of College life at Oxford from a sermon preached in 1551. "The scholars it says, rise at four or five in the morning, and after service in chapel attend lectures till ten, when they partake of a very frugal dinner, content with a penny piece of beef between four, having a pottage, made of the same beef with salt and oatmeal, and nothing else. After the dinner," continues the description, "they are reading or learning till five in the evening, when they have a supper not better than the dinner, immediately after they go to reasoning in problems or to some other study till nine or ten, and then, being without fire are fain to walk or run up and down for half an hour to get a heat in the feet, when they go to bed."

SOUTHAM, THOMAS.—The following references are from the Calendar of Petitions to the Pope recently issued by the Deputy Keeper of the Public Records:—
2 Urban V. 1364. William de Beauchamp. On behalf of Thos. Southam, Licentiate of Civil and Bachelor of Canon Law, tor a dignity or office in Wells Cathedral, notwithstruding he has a canonry of the same, with expectation of a prebend. Granted, and to resign the expectation. Avignon. I. Clement VII. Antipope, 1378. Thos. Southam, Licentiate of Civil Law, Bachelor of Canon Law and scholar of theology, auditor of the late Cardinal of England, for a canonry of Lichfield, with expectations of a prebend, notwithstanding he has the Archdeaconry of Oxford and canonries and prebends of Lichfield and Salisbury, and expects a prebend of Lichfield, which he is ready to resign. Granted and let him be the first. The latter is from the Roll of the University of Avignon.

LINGUTIO.—Under Lingutia, Ducange gives the following extract from an Inventory of the Treasury of the Apostolic See, an. 1295. "Ipsa autem rama est de corallo in qua pendent XII. lingutice in castonellis de argento." I would suggest that *lingutio* was applied to the rattle or clapper used during Holy Week when bells are forbidden by the rubrics, but I am open to correction.—NATHANIEL HONE.
