THE MANOR OF WEST HAGBOURNE.—This manor was held a century ago by John Blagrove Pococke, Esq., as we learn from Lysons. In 1889 James Samuel Harrison sold it to the present owner. It is believed that Eliza Catherine, daughter of John Blagrove Pococke, brought it in marriage to George Harrison and that James Samuel Harrison was their son. Can any correspondent supply the date of this marriage, as a link in the history of the manor, or suggest where it may be found? It is not registered at Hampstead Norris, and the Pocockes did not reside at Hagbourne.—J.E.F.
