Chained Bible.—The old chained Bible table, formerly in the Church of St. Mary Bourne, near Andover, has been restored to the church by the authorities of the Reading Museum. Fifty years ago, when the church was re-pewed, the table was about to be cut up for firewood, when the then vicar redeemed if for a few shillings. On his death it was bought by Dr. Stevens, subsequently curator of Reading Museum, in which it was placed. The table is 4ft. 9in. in height, standing on a strong pedestal with a cruciate foot, and the reading desk is square, and made to revolve. Two chains are attached to it, secured to the supporting pillar underneath the desk. The old table has been placed near the tower arch of the church, and it now bears two old Bibles, dated 1701 and 1717.
