A FORMER CURATE OF SHINFIELD.—In Bromley Churchyard, Kent, the following inscription appears:—

"Caroline Shebbeare, wife of Robert Shebbeare, Esq., R.N., Nat. Oct. 30, 1786, obt. Apl. 16, 1844. Also Elizabeth Gayton, mother of the above Caroline Shebbeare, and widow of the late Rev. George Clark Gayton, Curate of Shinfield and Swallowfield in the County of Berks (and 46 years a thankful inmate of Bromley College), Nat. Nov. 12, 1735, obt. Oct. 1818.

Mary Ann Gayton, youngest daughter of the above Rev. George Clark Gayton, Died March 13th, 1881, aged 85 years."

This Mary Ann Gayton taught Mr. Gladstone to read.—P.H.D.

Queries.

Information wanted of (I.) Roger Cheyney, M.P. for Oxfordshire 1381 and 1385? There is a well-known brass cross in Cassington Church said to be c. 1415, inscribed "Rogerus Cheyne quondm armiger dne Regis." (II.) Sir Thomas Coventry, Justice of the Common Pleas, 1606, son of Richard Coventry, Esquire, of Cassington, Oxon; or his family. (III.) Hugh Francis and William Keate, sons of Christian and Hugh Keate (see Berks, Bucks and Oxon Archæological Journal, xviii., 4, p. 99), to whom it seems the Rectory and Church of Cassington was demised 1637. Also information required about (a) Boroule (later Burleigh and Burley) Wood, 1279; (b) Henry de Braby, M.P. Oxon, 1297; (c) Henry Burle, alias Abergevenney, buried 1686, aged 94; (d) Burles Gay.—Rev. G. W. C. WARD, Cassington.
