BUCKLAND.

- 1. Dexter: Quarterly: 1 & 4. Azure a fess between three leopards' faces or. DE LA POLE.

This may represent Alice, the wife of William de la Pole, Earl of Suffolk, and daughter and heir of Thomas Chaucer; the manor passed to her on the death of her father in 1434 and successively to her son, John Duke of Suffolk, and grandson, Edmund Duke of Suffolk,

- 3. Centre: No. 1. SEE OF OXFORD. Impaling.
- 4. Argent an eagle displayed sable. BUCK-LAND.

This may represent William de Buckland (d.c. 1215) who was probably the great-grandson of Hugh de Buckland, Sheriff of Berkshire for nine years, temp. Henry II.; he appears to have held the manor of Buckland, which eventually passed to his daughter Maud, wife of William Davranches (d. 1230). It is not clear why this coat should be impaled by that of the See of Oxford.

5. No. 2. Or on a cross engrailed gules five cinquefoils of the field (here argent). EDINGTON PRIORY.

In 1361 William de Edington, Bishop of Winchester, gave, as part of the endowments of the Augustinian College of Bonnes Hommes at Edington, Co. Wilts, certain lands at Buckland including the manor of the Rectory.

- 6. Sinister: Quarterly: 1 & 4. Chequy or and azure a chevron ermine. NEWBURGH.
- 7. 2 &3. Gules a fess between six crosslets or. BEAUCHAMP.

Sir Edward Yate, Bt., d. 1645; Lady Katherine, his wife and Elizabeth, their daughter.

Sir Edward, the grandson of John Yate (d. 1578 and mentioned in Nos. 12-24 below) was created a Baronet in 1622; he married Katherine, daughter of Sir John (?Henry) Baker, Kt. and Bt., of Sissinghurst, Co. Kent. The issue of the marriage were Sir John Yate, Kt. and Bt. (d. 1659; see No. 30 below) who married Mary daughter and co-heir of Humphrey Packington of Chaddesley Corbett, Co. Worc., James Yate (alive in 1665), Mary, who married Charles Paris, Esquire of Linton, Co. Camb., Elizabeth and Katherine. John Yate of Charney and Lyford, Co. Berks., merchant of the staple and great great-grandfather of Sir Edward, had married, as his first wife, Joan, daughter and heir of Richard Goddard of Upham, Co. Wilts.



John was the son of James Yate by his wife Mary, daughter of Richard Fettiplace of East Shefford; he married Mary, daughter and heir of William Justice, Esquire, of Reading: they had five sons, of whom the eldest Edward (d. 1596) was the father of Sir Edward Yate mentioned in No. 8 above, and seven daughters. The top sinister coat, Yate impaling Hyde and Lovingcott quarterly, probably represents the marriage of John Yate (the grandfather of the John here mentioned) with Alice, second daughter of Oliver Hyde (d. 1516) of South Denchworth by his wife Anne, daughter and heir of Thomas Lovingcott. The arms of Justice, as here exemplified, were granted to Mary, wife of John Yate, in 1574 by Robert Cooke, Clarenceux.

Sir John, 2nd Baronet, was the son of Sir Edward Yate, Bt. (d. 1645 and mentioned in No. 8 above) and married Mary, daughter and co-heir of Humphrey Packington, Esquire, of Chaddesley Corbett, Co. Worc.; the issue were Edward, the elder, who died aged 12, Charles, the younger, who married Frances, daughter of Sir Thomas Gage of Firle, Co. Sussex, and became Sir Charles Yate, 3rd Baronet and three daughters; and eldest Abigall married the Rt. Hon. Charles Lord Fairfax of Gilling Castle, Co. Yorks, and Viscount Elmley of Ireland; Appolonia, the second, was unmarried in 1658; Ann (Anastasia) married Thomas Talbot, Esquire, of Longford, Co. Salop. Sir Charles Yate (b. 1634), the surviving son and 3rd Baronet, had a son John (b. 1661, d. unm. 1690) and three daughters, Penelope, Mary and Elizabeth; Mary (d. 1722) married Sir Robert Throckmorton, 3rd Baronet (d. 1721; see No. 32 below) and on the death of John, her brother, she inherited, as heir, the manor of Buckland.

Sir Robert, 3rd Baronet (1662-1721) married Mary (from whom he acquired the Buckland estate), second daughter and heir of Sir Charles Yate, 3rd Baronet, of Buckland, by Frances, daughter of Sir Thomas Gage, 2nd Bt. of Firle, Co. Sussex.

The hatchment of Sir John Courtenay Throckmorton, (b. 1753, d.s.p. 1819), 5th Baronet, who married, in 1782, Maria Catherine (d. 1821), daughter of Thomas Giffard of Chillington, Co. Stafford; the baronetcy passed successively to George and Charles his brothers and the latter dying s.p. in 1840, Robert George (1800–1862, see Nos. 41–42 below), the son of William (1762–1819) another brother of the 5th Baronet, succeeded as 8th Baronet.

Probably the hatchment of Sir Charles Throckmorton (b. 1757; d.s.p. 1840), 7th Baronet, third son of George Throckmorton who d.v.p. 1767; he succeded as 7th Baronet on the death in 1826 of his brother George, 6th Baronet s.p. who in 1792 had assumed the additional surname and arms of Courtenay; George Throckmorton, the father of Sir Charles and Sir George, married Anna Maria Paston whose mother had inherited in 1732 the Courtenay estates at Molland, Co. Devon. Sir Charles married in 1787 Mary Margaretta, daughter of Edmund Plowden of Plowden, Co. Salop.

Chancel. Shields on roof moulding.

40. North-west: Or six annulets sable three two and one. LOWTHER.

41. Centre: THROCKMORTON, the Badge of Ulster.

This shield represents the marriage of Sir Robert George Throckmorton (1800–1862), 8th Baronet, the son of William Throckmorton (1762–1819), by his wife Frances, daughter of Thomas Giffard (d. 1775) of Chillington. He married in 1829 Elizabeth (d. 1850), only daughter of Sir John Francis Edward Acton, 6th Baronet of Aldenham, Co. Salop, by whom he had five sons and four daughters; Sir Robert was M.P. for Berkshire in 1831–5 and Sheriff of the County in 1843.

43. Gules a passion cross engrailed or.

44. North-east: Or on a cross engrailed gules five cinquefoils of the field (here argent). EDINGTON PRIORY.

45. Centre: Or on a cross engrailed gules five (here six) cinquefoils of the field (here argent).

This shield represents the marriage in 1835 of Thomas Perfect, who took the surname and arms of Hayward-Southby by Royal Licence in 1822, with Elizabeth, the only daughter of Charles St. Barbe of Lymington, Co. Hants, Esquire. He was born in 1801, being the son of Thomas William Chamberlain Perfect (b. 1777) of Hammersmith, Co. Middx. and Carswell, Co. Berks, Esquire, by his first wife Elizabeth (d. 1801), only surviving daughter and heir of Sir Thomas Hayward of Carswell, Kt. (d. 1799) and grand-daughter of Rev. John Hayward (d. 1791), Rector of Withington, Co. Glouc., by his wife Bridget, eldest daughter of Richard Southby of Carswell (d. 1750).

53. South-west: Argent three greyhounds courant sable collared of the first.

He was the son and heir of Robert Pigott of Colwicke, Co. Bucks, by his wife Mary, daughter of John Yate of Lyford, Co. Berks; his grandfather Thomas Pigott of Whaddon, Co. Bucks, married Elizabeth, daughter and co-heir of Enderby of Missenden, Co. Bucks. He married Margaret, daughter of Alban Butler, Esquire, of Aston in the Vales, Co. Northants, by whom he had seven sons and three daughters, his heir being Alban Pigott (d. 1648) of Marcham and Hatford.

Pet r Cotes, Rector of Litchfield, Co. Hants, and Mary, who died unmarried. John Loder (1620-1701) purchased from Henry Marten (d. 1680), the regicide, of Longworth, Co. Berks, [the son of Sir Henry Marten, Kt. (d. 1641; see Longworth), Judge of the High Court of Admiralty] the Manor of Hinton which remained in the family until it passed to the Rev. Robert Symonds on the death of the Rev. John Loder. It appears that Robert Symonds, Rector, presented a paten to the Church in 1835.

He was a Doctor of Laws, Judge of the High Court of Admiralty and of the Prerogative Court of Canterbury and twice Dean of the Arches; he purchased the manor of Longworth in 1618 from John Fisher for £9,500; he probably married in 1507 Elizabeth Weld (d. 1618) by whom he had two sons, Henry and George, and three daughters. The eldest son Henry was M.P. for Berks, in two of the Parliaments of Charles I. but at the Restoration he was tried as a regicide and died in 1680 a prisoner in Chepstow Castle, having married Margaret (see No. 4 below).

Ledger Stone.

Margaret Marten, d, 1689, aged 75. Her son Henry Marten, Esquire, who with Mary his daughter were both buried here 1698 (?1696); his age was 58.

4. MARTEN.

She was the wife of Henry Marten, the regicide; Ashmole (Antiq. Berks. I. p. 161) records that she placed the monument in the Church to her father-in-law, Sir Henry Marten, Kt.

He was the eighth son of Charles Home Lloyd Fitzwilliams (who assumed the old family name of Fitzwilliams in place of Hall) of Cilgwyn, Co. Cardigan, by his wife Margaret Alice, eldest daughter of the late David Crawford of Cheltenham; his grandfather, Benjamin Edward Hall (1776–1849), of Cilgwyn, married in 1866, Jane Maria (d. 1853), second daughter and co-heir of Admiral Richard Braithwaite of Warcop, Co. Westmorland. He married in 1910 Margery Laura, only child of Sir Clarendon Hyde, Kt., and left issue one son and two daughters.

Nave. South Wall of North Aisle. Mural Marble. Dan. Bunce, Esquire, d. 1754, aged 50.



The hatchment of Philip Pusey (1799-1855) who married Lady Emily Herbert (d. 1854), second daughter of the 2nd Earl of Carnarvon (d. 1833) by his wife Elizabeth, daughter of Colonel John Dyke Acland, eldest son of Sir Thomas Acland, 7th Bt. of Colomb John. Philip was the son and heir of the Hon. Philip Bouverie Pusey by his wife Lucy (1722-1858), eldest daughter of Robert Shcrard, 4th Earl of Harborough and widow of Sir Thomas Cave, Bt. (see Nos. 13-15 below). Philip Pusey was at Eton and Christ Church, Oxford, and after being elected an M.P. for various constituences eventually represented Berkshire from 1835 to 1852 during which time he was an influential member, being a friend of Peel, Gladstone, and Carlyle. In 1838 he took a prominent part in the formation of the Royal Agricultural Society of England, became President in 1840 and again in 1853 and contributed many articles in the Society's Journal; he was made a F.R.S. in 1830 and on his estate at Pusey he proved himself to be a very practical agriculturist, the breeding and feeding of sheep being his main interest; he also carried out many experiments and trials of implements on his land.

This represents the marriage in 1862 of Captain Francis Charteris Fletcher (d. 1891), late 60th Rifles, with Clara, second daughter of Philip Pusey mentioned above; their only son, Philip Francis Fletcher, succeeded to the Pusey estate in 1911 and assumed by royal licence the name and arms of Bouverie Pusey.

This is the hatchment of the Hon. Philip Bouverie Pusey (1746–1828; see also Nos. 16–20 below), son of Jacob, 1st Viscount Folkestone; he married in 1798 Lucy, eldest daughter of Robert Sherard, 4th Earl of Harborough and widow of Sir Thomas Cave, Bt. He was the father of Philip Pusey (1799–1855), the Agriculturist.

This coat probably represented the Hon. Philip Bouverie Pusey (1746–1828); he was the son of Jacob (d. 1761), 1st Viscount Folkestone by his wife Elizabeth (1711–1792), eldest daughter of Robert, Lord Romney and grandson of Sir William des Bouveries (Bouverie) Bt. (d. 1717). Miss Jane Allen Pusey who was the surviving sister of John Allen Pusey had succeeded on the death of her brother in 1753 to the Pusey estate; both Jane and her sister Elizabeth (who d.s.p. 1757 having married William Brotherton, Esquire) were much attached to their sister-in-law Mrs. Jane Allen Pusey (d. 1742); see Nos. 35–42 below), who was much respected by all who knew her, and the two sisters decided that on the coming of age of Philip Bouverie, the youngest son of Mrs. Jane Allen Pusey's brother Jacob, he should live six months at Pusey and six months on their estate in Gloucestershire and then decide at which he wished ultimately to live; his choice was to be lent to him until the death of the surviving sister when it was to become his property. The Hon. Philip Bouverie first lived at Pusey in 1767 and being well content with the estate, made no inspection

of the Gloucestershire property and changing his surname to Pusey in 1784, ultimately succeeded to the Pusey estate in 1789 on the death of Miss Jane Allen Pusey. At the age of 52 he married in 1798 Lucy Sherard (1711-1858), daughter of Robert, 4th Earl of Harborough and widow of Sir Thomas Cave, Bt., the issue being Philip (1799-1855), the Agriculturist, Edward (1800-1882), who became Canon of Christ Church, Oxford and Regius Professor of Hebrew in the University, and William (1810-1888), Rector of Langley, Co. Kent. He was generous, able, well-informed, of strong will and quick temper, and holding inflexible political views; an autocrat in domestic affairs he insisted on an "almost military exactness" in his household.

This coat may possibly represent John Allen (d.s.p. 1753) who took the surname of Pusey on coming into possession of the manor through his uncle, Charles Pusey (d. 1710). The Allens of Streatley had married, about the beginning of the 17th century, members of the families of Clarke of Goring and White of Bramley, Co. Hants. (see also Nos. 35-42 below).

He was the son and heir of John Dunch (1630–1668), M.P. for Berks 1654–9 and of Gray's Inn, by his wife Anne, daughter and co-heiress of Richard Maijor of Hursley, Co. Hants; his grandfather was Samuel Dunch, the fifth son of Edmund Dunch, of Little Wittenham (see notes on Little Wittenham, Vol. 35, p. 139). His father, John Dunch, was a friend of Oliver Cromwell who summoned him to Hampton Court in 1657, made him a justice of the peace and gave him a commission in the army. Maijor was instructed in his youth by Robert Lancaster and Humphrey Gunter who was an ejected Fellow of Magdalen College, Oxford: he was High Sheriff of Berks in 1677 and appears to have held a licence, as a Presbyterian, to hold services at his Pusey house in 1672; he married Margaret, 2nd daughter of Philip, Lord Wharton; after his death she married (c. 1687–9) Sir Samuel (?Thomas) Selyard, Bt. of Boxley Abbey, Co. Kent. Maijor had one son, Wharton (d.s.p. 1705; see No. 30 below) who matriculated at Pembroke College, Oxford, in 1697, aged 15, and two daughters, Margaret, who probably died young and un-married, and Jane who on the death of her brother Wharton became heir; Jane married Francis Keck (d. 1728), Esquire, of Great Tew, Co. Oxon.

In the 15th century he was in possession of Bishop's Manor which after 1546 followed the descent of Mansell's Court, becoming in 1749 part of the Manor of Pusey; he left several daughters, and the son and heir of one of them, one Clement Cotton, unsuccessfully sued the widow of Henry, Amice, who had become the wife of Edmund Wyghthyll, for the possession of the Manor which subsequently remained with Philip and Anthony Fettiplace until 1546.

She was the daughter of Samuel Dunch of North Baddlesly, Co. Hants, by Dulcibella, eldest daughter of John More, Counsellor at Law, and married in 1634, as his first wife, Sir Francis Pile, 2nd Bt. of Compton, Co. Berks; the issue was one daughter, Frances, who died young. Sir Francis (1617-1648) matriculated at University College, Oxford, in 1633, and was admitted to Middle Temple in 1637; he was Sheriff in 1643-45 and M.P. for the County from 1646 till his death.

John Allen Pusey married Jane, daughter of Sir William Des Bouveries, 1st Bt. (grandfather of 1st Earl of Radnor) by his wife Anne, daughter and heiress of David Urry, Esquire, of London; on his death, s.p. in 1753, the estate subsequently passed in 1789 to the Hon. Philip Bouverie Pusey (1746–1828) who was the son of his wife's brother, Jacob, 1st Viscount Folkestone, and who took the surname Pusey in 1784. In 1745 he rebuilt Pusey Church on the present site as a memorial to his wife; see also Nos. 21-25 above.

He was born at Shellingford in 1767, being the son and heir of William, 2nd Viscount Ashbrook by his wife, Elizabeth, daughter of Thomas Ridge of Co. Oxford; he matriculated at Trinity College, Oxford, in 1785 and died unmarried at Wadley House, Co. Berks. His sister, Caroline, died in 1844, aged 71, and is buried in Trinity Church, Cheltenham.

He was the only son and heir of Henry, 2nd Baron of Castle Durrow and 1st Viscount Ashbrook (d. 1752) by Flizabeth his wife, daughter of Lieut.-General William Tatton of Hillingdon, Middlesex. He was born at Castle Durrow, Co. Kilkenny, and matriculated at Christ Church, Oxford, in 1762. His widow married, in 1790 the Rev. John Jones, D.D., and died, in 1808, at Shipston upon Stour, Co. Robert Packer was the son of Robert Packer (1646–1687), M.P. for Wallingford, by his wife Temperance (d. 1705), daughter of Colonel Edward Stephens of Little Sodbury, Co. Gloucester. His grandfather, John Packer (d. 1649) of Westminster, a Clerk of the Privy Seal, purchased the manor from Sir Henry Neville in 1620 and rebuilt Shellingford Church in 1625. Robert was M.P. for Berkshire in 1710, 1713, 1722 and 1727 and married Mary, daughter and sole heir of Sir Henry Winchcombe (1683–1719), Baronet of Bucklebury, Co. Berks; his son, Winchcombe Howard Packer, sold the manor of Shellingford in 1738 to Sarah, Dowager Duchess of Marlborough.

She was the wife of Richard Clayton (1603–1676), Fellow and Master (1665–76) of University College, Oxford, Rector of Shawell, Co. Leicester, 1623, Vicar of Great Wilbraham, Co. Camb., 1627, who became Rector of Shellingford in 1639 and Canon of Salisbury in 1661; he was the grandson of Richard Clayton of Wakefield who was the second son of John Clayton of Clayton Hall, Yorks; his name appears in the list of those summoned to appear at Ashmole s Visitation of 1665–6. The issue were John (a. aged 20, in 1649, ? 1641) and Thomas; after her death her husband's sister, Dorothy Clayton, kept house and cared for the children for 15 years and died in 1658.

He was the son of Richard Knollys, Esquire, who was brother of the 1st Earl of Banbury; he married firstly, Elizabeth, daughter of Sir Charles Wiseman of Berkshire and secondly, Alice, sister of Sir William Beecher, of Middlesex, by whom he had two sons, William and Francis (both d.s.p.) and one daughter Dorothy who married William Byam (b. 1623), Governor of Surinam and in 1667 of Antigua. Francis was "by death taken from the command of the Train Bands of Abingdon Division." His maternal uncle John Heigham, Esquire, (d. 1632), is commemorated by a marble slab in the Sanctuary. The monument was restored in 1865 by Edward S. Byam, Esquire, who was lineally descended from Francis Knollys' daughter Dorothy mentioned above.

He was the eldest son of William Aldrich Cotton, being born at Ellesmere, Co. Salop; he was at Exeter College, Oxford, and received his M.A. degree in 1860; he was Vicar of Haynes, Co. Bedford, 1869-78, a Minor Canon of Westminster, 1875-92, a Priest in Ordinary to Queen Victoria, 1878-1901 and to the King until 1927 and Vicar of Stanford in the Vale, 1892-1915.
