# Coats of Arms in Berkshire Churches.

By P. S. Spokes, M.A. (Continued from Vol. 38, No. 1). HUNDRED OF FAIRCROSS.

In his prefatory note (Vol 35 [1931], p. 34) the writer stated that, with regard to the description of the coats of arms, "Where the tinctures are not shown on the original they have been ascertained, as far as possible, from some recognised source and inserted in the description." In future the tinctures, which do not appear in the original coat and which have been ascertained from other sources, will be inserted in square brackets. Thus there will be a record of the coat as it actually appears in the church together with information as to the full blazon where this can be found.

The references to the sources of information have now been inserted and it is hoped that this will prove a useful addition to the notes.

# BOXFORD.

West End. Tower Arch.

North Aisle. West End. Mural Marble.

John Rawlins, Gent.; d. 1719, aged 71. Hannah, his wife; d. 1727, aged 79. Two daughters, Ann, d. 1702, aged 18 and Sarah, d. 1719, aged 24.

 [Sable] on a chevron between three castles [argent] a pair of compasses extended [as the first]. COMPANY of MASONS, al. FREEMASONS.

(Papw., Ord., 506).

Sanctuary. North Wall. Mural Stone. James Anderton, d. 1672, aged 61.

3. Sable three pairs of shackbolts argent two in chief single that in base double. (ANDERTON).

He was the son of John Anderton of West Halton, Co. Lancs. (? Co. Lincs.) and matriculated at Oxford from Brasenose College on 9 December 1631; B.A., 1633; M.A., 1635; he was rector of Boxford from 1661 to 1672. The following appears in the list of those summoned to attend at the Visitation of 1665-6:—"Boxford. James Anderton, Clerk. Adjourned till Easter Term 1665. Respit of entry till next term; is trustee for Mrs. Jones of Welford." It seems from the Institution Books in the Public Record Office that his son John presented a younger son James, of Trinity and New Colleges, Oxford, in 1672. A piece of church plate, a pewter stand paten, bearing the arms of Anderton impaling a dolphin, is said to have been presented by one of the James Andertons when rector. (Harl. Soc. Ivii, 31; V.C.H. Berks. iv. 47; Papw. Ord., 966; Foster, Alum. Oxon.)

#### BRIGHTWALTON.

West End. Brass Shield on Wall.

I. [Argent] seven mascles three three and one [azure] between the first and second rows two roses [gules]. BRAYBROOKE.

This is a remaining fragment of the brass of James Braybrooke (d. 1590) and Martha, his wife, which was found on moving the choir stalls on the north side of the church in 1880. He was the son and heir of Thomas Braybrooke (d. 1541) by his wife Katherine, daughter of William Barker. He married at Sutton Courtenay on 27 April 1559 Martha, daughter of John Yate of Lyford and widow of Humphrey Cheney (d.s.p. 1557). Between 1561 and 1568 six of his children were baptised at Sutton Courtenay; according to the pedigree in MS. Ashmole, 852, p. 20, the issue was Edward (d.s.p.), Robert, William of Brightwalton (who married Margaret, daughter of Richard Middlemore of Edgbaston, Co. Warwick, and had issue Richard), Dorothy (who married Paul Alexander, Gent.), Martha (who married Otto Garr of Greenham, Co. Berks), Mary and Elizabeth (who married John Whistler, of Yattendon, Co. Berks. (? Gatehampton, Oxon.). James Braybrooke died on 8 May and his will was proved on 22 May 1590 (P.C.C. 32 Drury); his sister Margaret married firstly William Andrews in 1558 and secondly John Fettiplace (d.s.p. 1602; see Sparsholt No. 4); he was succeeded by his son William who died 30 May 1592 at the age of not more than 30 years. (Bradbrooke, Berks. Arch. Journ. xxxvi, 164, 169, 170; Morley, Mon. Brasses of Berks., 61; MS. Ashmole, 852, p. 20; 850, 167).

Bernard Henry Howard, Major 47th Sikhs, born in 1879, was the eldest of the three sons of the Rev. Henry Frederick Howard, M.A. (Rector of Brightwalton and grandson of Frederick, 5th Earl of Carlisle) by his wife Eliza Mima, eldest daughter of the Rev. John Spearman Wasey of Prior's Court, and late vicar of Compton, Co. Berks; he married in 1909 Margaret Edith Ellen, daughter of Lieut.-Col. D. McMahon, by whom he had Henry Bernard Patrick (1912-1915) and two daughters. Henry Charles Mowbray Howard, Lieut. York and Lancaster Regt., the third son of the above mentioned Rev. H. F. Howard, was born in 1895 and died unmarried. (Burke, Peer.; M.I.).

He was the son and heir of Thomas Wollascott of Sutton Courtenay, Co. Berks, by his wife Katherine, daughter and heir of William Wollascott; Martin married Mary, daughter of Sir Francis Throckmorton, 2nd Bt. (d. 1680) of Coughton, Co. Warwick and succeeded to the manor of Brimpton and was holding it in 1691; their son and heir William made a settlement of the manor in 1717 and died in 1757 leaving an only daughter Henrietta Maria who married the 7th Earl of Fingall in 1755. (M.I.; Harl. Soc., lvi, 147, 316; V.C.H. Berks, iv, 52; Burke, Peer.).

# CHIEVELEY.

At the west end of the nave there is a rubbing of this coat in a frame on the wall; above the rubbing is depicted: Gules a chevron between in chief two bezants and in base a griffin's head erased or on the chevron a mullet argent. Below the rubbing is typed: "The coat of arms of Henry Blanchard of Prior's Court, 1581, Barrister at law. It is under the carpet in front of the altar." Below is typed an extract from Ashmole (1719) and "Henry Blanchard, son of Richard of Horton, Dorset, Reader of the Middle Temple, 1581." From the pedigree in MS. Ashmole 852, p. 262, it appears that he married Mary, daughter of Richard Bruning of Wymering, Co. Hants, and had issue Richard (who married Mary, daughter of Michael Erneley of Bishops-Cannings, Co. Wilts, widow of Robert Hampton), Henry, Mary (who married Thomas Stampe of Peasemore, Co. Berks) and Dorothy, a nun. In MS. Ashmole, 850, p. 175, it is recorded that, besides the Blanchard coat on the dexter side of the gravestone, there was on the sinister side a shield with Blanchard impaling two bendlets wavy which no doubt represented Bruning. A Henry Blanchard, with Matthew Haycock, seems to have had lands, being part of the manor of Chieveley in 1574 and also, with the same Matthew Haycock, he purchased the manor of Shaw in 1575 but sold it in 1576. From a MS. Dyer pedigree in Reading Public Library it appears that he was the second son of Richard Head (d. 1739), Esquire of Langley Hall in Hampstead Norris, by his wife Elizabeth, daughter of John Wallis of Soundness House, Oxon; he left an only daughter and heir, Harriet who married in 1788 the Rev. Morgan Graves, M.A. and had issue. His eldest brother was Sir Thomas Head, Kt. (d. 1780) of Langley Hall, Sheriff of Berkshire. The Rev. Richard Head was Vicar of Chieveley for thirty-six years. (M.I.; Burke, Peer.; MS. Dyer, Reading Libr.).

He was the eldest son of Sir Walter James Head (d. 1829 and who assumed the name of James) of Langley Hall in this parish, by his wife Lady Jane Pratt, youngest daughter of Charles, 1st Earl of Camden. He was Captain in the 81st Regt. and served as A.A.G. in Major-General Colville's Brigade in Portugal serving under the Marquess of Wellington; he saw service in the West Indies, Egypt, Denmark, Spain and Portugal and was in the battle of Maida; he was buried at Badajos. The father of Francis, Sir Walter James Head (d. 1829) assumed the name of James on inheriting the estate of Denford through his aunt Elizabeth, who married John James of Denford. (See pedigree on p. 139). (Burke, Peer.; Harl. Soc. lxvii, 201; lvi, 233; M.I.; V.C.H. Berhs, iv. 78, 213.; Lysons, Mag. Brit., i, 287).



He was the second son of Sir Walter James Head, Bt. (d. 1829) and brother of Francis James (d. 1812; see No. 5 above and pedigree). He married in 1814 Lady Emily Jane Stewart (d. 1865, having re-married Henry, 1st Viscount Hardinge), sixth daughter of Robert 1st Marquess of Londonderry, by whom he had an only son Sir Walter Charles James, 2nd Bt. and 1st Baron Northbourne. John James was minister plenipotentiary to the Netherlands. (References as in No. 5 above).

He may have been the fifth son of John Hinton (d. 1661) of Bourton in Shrivenham, Co. Berks, by his wife Elizabeth, daughter of Edward Pursell of Onslow, Co. Salop. (Harl. Soc., lvi, 227; Hist. of Newbury, [1839], 83).

John Smalwode assumed the name of his birthplace, Winchcombe in Gloucestershire; he was a clothier by trade, employing a large number of weavers, and a man of importance in the town. According to tradition he provided a hundred fully equipped men for King Henry VIII. against James IV. of Scotland in 1513; these men were sent, with other Berkshire contingents, in the first place to Stony Stratford where the Queen was collecting forces and were placed under the command of Sir Henry Englefield; these troops were not however required to fight but "Jack of Newbury" was given a chain of gold by the Queen. It is said that about 1516 Winchcombe gave hospitality to the King and Queen, accompanied by Cardinal Wolsey, at Newbury. He seems to have been married four times (see pedigrees in (1) Money, "Bucklebury and its owners" and (2) Humphreys, "Bucklebury"), his third wife being Alice and his fourth, Joan, who survived him. By Alice he had issue John, his heir and other children; he died in 1519 and by his will be left money to the church at Newbury with directions for his

burial there beside his wife Alice; it seems probable that he built a considerable portion of the present church during his life time. A grant of arms and crest from Sir Christopher Barker, Garter, was made on 26 October 1549 to John Winchcombe (1489–1557), his son and heir. A romance, "The Pleasant History of John Winchcombe," was written by Thomas Deloney about a hundred years after his death; a contemporary brass of him and his wife Alice is now in the north wall of the west tower of the church. (Harl. Soc. Ivi, 313; Ivii, 232–3; Hist. of Newbury [1839], 77–78, 149; Money, Hist. of Newbury [1887], 457; Money, Bucklebury and its owners; Humphreys, Bucklebury [1932], 310; Trans. Newbury Dist. Fld. Club, v, 66–75; V.C.H. Berks, iv, 138; Morley, Mon. Brasses of Berks, 161).

5. Defaced.

Griffin Curteys, of Greenham, was M.P. for Ludgershall in 1562 and escheator for Berkshire and Oxfordshire, 1574-5; by his will (P.C.C.5 Rutland) proved 29 January 1587, he desired to be buried in Newbury Church in a tomb "whiche I have alredie made in the southe Ile there"; he left money for the poor of Newbury and Enborne, and made Griffin Curteys (d. 1607) one of his sons, his executor; he mentions his wife Jane; he had, according to the figures on this monument, six sons and five daughters of which it seems five sons and five daughters survived; the figures of three female figures, presumably his wives, are also to be seen on the monument, which was originally inside the church on the south-east side. Misc. G. and H. 5th S. iii. (1919), 158, gives the arms as Ermine a chevron sable between three fleurs-de-lys or but in the confirmation of arms and grant of a crest by Dethick, Garter, of 2 June 1559 (MS. Coll. of Arms, Grants, i., 182), the arms are given as Ermine a chevron between three fleurs-de-lys sable. (Money, Hist. of Newbury [1887], 470; V.C.H. Berks, iv., 150; Harl. Soc. lvii., 111).

In the pedigree in the 1665 Visitation (MS. Ashmole, 851, p. 184) it appears that Anne, daughter of Humphrey Dolman (bur. at Shaw 1666) (by his wife Anne, daughter and heir of John Quarles, citizen and merchant adventurer of London), married Philip Weston of Newbury; this stone achievement may represent this marriage. Philip Weston was an alderman of Newbury in 1650. (Harl. Soc. Ivi., 151, 193; Ivii., 6, 30; Papw. Ord., 589, 898; V.C.H. Berks, iv., 67; Trans. Newb. Dist. Fld. Club, iv., 10).

Lydia Catherine, Duchess of Chandos was the third wife of James, 1st Duke of Chandos (1673-1744) and was described, at the time of her marriage to the Duke in 1736, as Lydia Catherine Van Hatten, widow of Sir Thomas Davall, Kt.; it appears that she was the daughter of John Van Hatten by his wife Lydia, daughter of Thomas Davell, merchant. It is said that about 1720 the Duke rescued the lady from the maltreatment of her first husband, an ostler at the Castle Inn at Marlborough, made her his ward and eventually married her after the death of his second wife; in his will he says "I owe the greatest comfort I have enjoyed in this life (since I have been blest with her) to my duchess, Lydia Catherine." By her wish she was buried at Shaw but in 1751 her body was removed to the Chandos vault in Whitchurch Church, Middlesex. In some accounts it is said that the Duchess was "reproached with her being bred up in Burr Street, Wapping" and that, as a girl of fourteen, she worked as a pot girl in an ale house near Winchester Close; however it seems more certain that the Duchess helped her poor relations and during her residence at Shaw House, which was left in trust to her for life by the Duke, she proved herself to be of generous disposition. Charles Gray, second son of James Pettit and Anne Andrews; d. 1791, aged 18, buried in Kingston Chapel, Hants. Monument placed by Joseph, nephew of the above Sir J. Andrews, Bt. and successor to the title and eldest son of James Pettit and Anne Andrews.

James Pettit Andrews (d. 1797) was police magistrate at Queen's Square and was the author of "Anecdotes, ancient and modern, with observations" and of "A history of Great Britain, connected with the chronology of Europe." The manor of Shaw passed under the will of Sir Joseph Andrews, 2nd Bt. to his sister, Elizabeth Anne Hunt, who reassumed the name of Andrews; on her death the manor passed under her brother's will to her cousin, the Rev. Dr. Thomas Penrose (d. 1851) who was in possession in 1839. (Trans. Newbury Dst. Fld. Club, iv. 17–18; Burke, Ext. Bt.; Hist. of Newbury [1839], 173, 179; M.I.; V.C.H. Berks, iv. 90; Harl. Soc., lxvii. 8: xliv. 35).



He was the second son of Sir Thomas Dolman, Kt. (d. 1697), M.P. for Reading and a clerk of the Privy Council, by his wife Margery (d. 1686), daughter of John Hobday (? Hobilday) of Thornton, Co. Warwick. He married Dorothy, daughter of John Harrison, Esquire, of Scarborough, Co., Yorks, widow of Henry Ball, Esquire, Windsor Herald. He matriculated from Wadham College, Oxford, on 10 April 1674, aged 16, and became a barrister-at-law of Lincoln's Inn in 1683, a J.P. and D.L. for the County, a Colonel of the Berkshire Militia, and was knighted 7 November 1703 in recognition of his hospitality to Queen Anne at Shaw on October 27 and 28, 1703, on her return from Bath. He inherited the manor of Shaw from his father in 1697 and on his death the manor passed to his nephew Thomas Humphrey Dolman. The arms were granted to Thomas Dolman, Sheriff of Berkshire in 1588, by Cooke, Clarenceux in 1587. (Trans. Newbury Dist. Fld. Club, iii., 144: iv. 11; MS. He was the second son of Captain Thomas Fowke by his second wife; he married Margaret Saunders (d. 1783) by whom he had two daughters, Martha (who married Arnold Sansom, barrister-at-law, and had issue) and Mary (who married Henry Villiers of Chelsea). He was the brother of Lieut.-General Thomas Fowke (d. 1765), Governor of Gibraltar. His eldest son, Henry Breffney (1847-1927) was commissioned in the 66th Foot in 1868 and subsequently transferred to the Bombay Staff Corps. Alexander Gore Breffney Ternan was commissioned in the 51st Foot in 1874, transferred to the Bengal Staff Corps and became Captain in 1885. (Arm. Fam. [1930], 1913; information from Major V. C. P. He was the eldest son of Thomas Case of Red Hazels, Co. Lanc. and Shenstone Moss, Co. Staffs, by his wife Alexandrina Veronica, daughter of Giovanni Mavromati of Messina, Sicily, and grand-daughter of Thomas, Marquis de Serpos. He was baptised at the British Embassy, Pera, Constantinople, on 18 August 1839, and entered the Bengal Army in 1856; he was at Agra with the 67th N.I. when the Mutiny broke out, his Regiment being disarmed; he served as a Volunteer at the battle of Shahganj against the Nimach mutineers and afterwards with Meade's Horse in the suppression of mutiny in Gwalior and Bundelkhand. He next served with the 1st Mahratta Horse, 16th and 18th Bengal Cavalry; he was Assistant Commissioner in Oudh, 1862-65 and served in the Bhuran campaign of 1865-6 with the 9th Bengal N.I. In 1869 he was appointed to the Army Commissariat Department and served with the Chittagong Column in the Lushai Expedition of 1871-2

and with the Kandahar Force during the first phase of the Afghan War, 1878-9. He died at Murree, 16 September 1882, where there is a memorial to him in the New Cemetery. (Arm. Fam. [1930], 326; information from Major V. C. P. Hodson; M.I.).



John Baptist Castillion was the son and heir of Peter de Castillion, Kt. of Mantua in Italy, and was born at Gassino in Piedmont, and saw military service under King Henry VIII.; he had arms registered to him in 1563 and in 1565 and obtained a grant from Queen Elizabeth of the manors of Benham Valence and Wood Speen. (Money, Hist. of Speen [1892], 18, 26; G.E.C., Gen. N.S., xvii. 73; V.C.H. Berks, iv. 165). In 1557 he married in London, Margaret (? Allen), probably a widow, daughter and sole heir of Bartholomew Compaigne of Florence in Italy. In Queen Mary's reign he was in the service of Princess Elizabeth who entrusted him with letters to the Eraph Ambassades. the French Ambassador; for this he was put on the rack in the Tower but made no confession and was lame thereafter. On becoming Queen, Elizabeth did not forget his services and he was sworn of the Privy Chamber and was granted the honourable augmentation of a canton ermine. (Archaeologia, xxxii., 371-2). He died on 12 February and was buried in Speen Church on 17 March 1597-8; his funeral certificate is in the College of Arms and a facsimile of his arms appears as the frontispiece to Volume XVII. of "The Genealogist," N.S. (1901). His issue was six sons and six daughters. His eldest son and heir was Sir Francis (1561-1638), of The Geneaugist, N.S. (1901). This issue was six sons and six daughters. His eldest son and heir was Sir Francis (1561-1638), M.P. for Great Bedwyn, 1597-8, knighted at Charterhouse in 1603, who married firstly Elizabeth (d. 1603; see No. 47 below), daughter of William St. John, and secondly, Anne Masham, widow and daughter of . . . Calton (see No. 27 above); Sir Francis had issue by his first wife. His second son was Valentine (1564-1641); Peter, the third son (bap. 1569; d. ante 1603) married Thomazine, third daughter and coheir of Christopher Peyton of Bury St. Edmunds (see Nos. 29-31). The fourth son was Walter (1570-c. 1597), the fifth son Douglas (bap. 1573; d. 1659), was a Fellow of Magdalen College, Oxford, and the sixth son, Henry, was baptised in 1579. Of the daughters, Elizabeth, the third, married in 1587 Peter Leigh (d. 1613) of West Hall in High Leigh, Cheshire; (see Nos. 41-42). Anne, the fourth daughter, married Robert Hyde (d. 1642) of West Hatch in Tisbury, Co. Wilts; (see Nos. 37-39). The fifth daughter, Barbara (d. 1641), married Sir Laurence Hyde, Kt. (d. 1641; see No. 40). Selina, the sixth daughter, married Robert Cheney of West Woodhay, Co. Berks; (see Nos. 32-36). (Genealogist, N.S., xvii. 73-77; MS. Ashmole, 852, ff. 42-4; Money, Hist. of Speen, 1892). As regards the arms of Castillion (No. 18), Hist. of Speen, 1892). As regards the arms of Castillion (No. 18), it should be noted that the original arms given in the funeral certificate of Jean Baptist Castillion (see Genealogist, N.S., xvii., for facsimile and Harl. Soc., lvii. 92) were Gules a lion rampant argent in dexter chief a tower or; and described "This is the true Coate of John Baptist Castillion as it was sent from Piemont," but the arms shown in the certificate, as being those at the time of the funeral,


are Gules a demi-lion or rising out of a castle argent a canton ermine. It is stated by W. H. Rylands (Harl. Soc., lvii. 92) that this tomb "originally shewed this 'true coate' as above, with the difference that it is castle with three towers in the corner of the shield, and not a single tower." The tomb of Elizabeth Castillion (Nos. 47-52. below) "also originally had the 'true coate.' In all the Castillion Arms on the two tombs the lion rampant is carved in relief, and in some of the shields the castle in the corner is slightly raised. At some period the Arms have been altered in every shield by fastening over the lower half of the lion a tower, gilding the upper half of the lion, and painting a small ermine canton over the castle in the corner. The tower has now fallen away, and the mark of it still remains; the gold castle lined out with black originally in the corner can also easily be traced" (e.g. on Nos. 40 and 47). "The painted impalements recording the various marriages, reaching to 1607, may have been added at any time." The arms Gules a demi-lion or rising out of a tower argent were granted by Sir Gilbert Dethick about 1563 or 1565. Ashmole in his trick (MS. Ashmole, 850, 178) of 1665 gives Gules a lion rampant argent in dexter chief a tower or a crescent of the first for difference and in MS. Ashmole, 852, f. 42, 43, it is stated that the canton ermine was given by Queen Elizabeth to Castillion as an augmentation of honour "for his faithful service" and that King Henry VIII. added a rose gules to the arms of Bartholomew Compaigne as an augmentation of honour. Rylands further states, "It is puzzling to know at what time the alterations were made in the Arms; it may have been done by by J. B. Castillion on his receiving the augmentation, if some portions of the tombs at Speen were prepared before his death in 1598. The later tomb is unfortunately like the older one, neither in its original position nor condition, but the Arms upon it are those of Sir Francis Castillion and Dorothy (St. John) his wife impaled. If their marriage took place, as stated, in the year 1597, the impaled Arms must have been placed on the base in or after that year, and possibly the figure and inscription were not added until 1604. Or it may be suggested that after the funeral of J. B. Castillion, Camden and Thompson, the Heralds, ordered the alteration mentioned above, and made the Arms on both the tombs agree with those exemplified by William Dethick, and with those given on the funeral certificate." It should further be noted that in the Visitation of 1623, Francis Castillion, his son, proved as his arms the original "true coate" Gules a lion rampant argent in dexter chief a tower or quartering Compaigne, with the rose of augmentation. (Harl. Soc., lvii. 92-4).



(who was executed for "sundry treasons" in 1539); she married thirdly Sir Thomas Parry, Kt. (d. 1560), Treasurer to the Queen and a privy councillor. Sir Thomas received a grant from the Crown of the vills of Welford and Easton in 1546 and in 1560 he was granted by Queen Elizabeth the manor of Hampstead Marshall; it appears from his Inquisition post mortem that Sir Thomas had at one time been known by the name of Vaughan, being the son of Henry Vaughan; his Welsh surname Ap Harry was contracted to Parry; he was buried in Westminster Abbey in the north ambulatory and seems to have been a man of unfortunate manner and temper and is said to have died "of mere ill-humour" when the projected Dudley marriage failed. Lady Anne was a lady of the privy chamber and received an annuity of \$50 for thirty-three years; she had, as surviving issue, three sons and two daughters by Sir Adrian Fortescue and two sons and two daughters by Sir Thomas Parry; her son, Sir Thomas Parry (d. 1616) was ambassador in France, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, M.P., D.L. and Sheriff for Berkshire and was knighted

in 1601; he died s.p., intestate and was buried in Westminster Abbey, having married Dorothy (d. 1624 and buried at Welford), daughter of . . . Brooke of Bristowe (? Bristol) and a maid of honour to Queen Elizabeth. (Harl. Soc., lvii. 191; Berks. Arch. Journ., xxvii. 118; Papw. Ord., 742; MS. Ashmole, 850, 176; V.C.H. Berks, iv. 117, 181; E. T. M. Smith, Roll Call of Westminster Abbey [1902], 123; M.I., Welford Church; D.N.B. Roy. Comm. Hist. Mon. London, I, (1924), 32b.).

Francis Mundy, Rector of Welford, was appointed Prebendary of Bath and Wells on 29 June 1661 and was installed Sub-dean on 28 September 1665, having been made Treasurer of Llandaff on 1 September 1665. He married Elizabeth, who died in 1689 (see No. 10 below). The issue (see No. 13 below) was Richard John, son and heir, Francis, Thomas (M.B. and Fellow of New College, Oxford), William (a lawyer) and Elizabeth, Frances and Mary. (Papw. Ord., 662, 244; Harl. John Archer was the son of William Eyre, Esquire of Home and Hylow, Co. Derby, by Susanna, daughter of Sir John Newton, 3rd Bt. of Barr's Court, Co. Glos. and of Thorpe, Co. Lincs, and eventually heir to her brother, Sir Michael Newton, 4th Bt. His father took the name of Archer and the Welford and Coopersale estates by the bequest of John Archer, Esquire of Welford. John Archer (d. 1800) married Lady Mary (d. 1776), third daughter of John, 2nd Earl Fitzwilliam (d. 1728) by whom he had issue two daughters, Susanna (who married Jacob Houblon, Esquire of Hallingbury Place, Co. Essex) and Charlotte (who married Gillery Pigott Esquire; see No. 18 below). The monument was erected by John Archer Houblon, Esquire of Hallingbury, grandson of John and Lady Mary Archer and the only son of Jacob Houblon. See pedigree on p. 160. (Burke, Land. He married Anne, daughter of Robert Mason, Recorder of London, and had an only daughter Mary (d. 1702) who married John Archer of Welford, son of Sir John Archer, Kt. Justice of the Common Pleas. In 1644 Richard Jhones came into possession of the manor of Welford which Sir Francis Jhones (d. 1623) had purchased c. 1617; he also succeeded to the manor of Kintbury Eaton which he sold to William, Lord Craven of Hampstead Marshall in 1662. Francis Sayer, M.A., 47 years Rector; d. 1711, aged 78.

I. [Gules] a chevron between three [seapies argent]. (SAYER). He was the son of the Rev. Francis Sayer (d. 1648) who was Rector of Yattendon 1620-1648. He was M.A. of Merton College, Oxford, and succeeded his brother Joseph Sayer (d. 1693) as Rector of Yattendon in 1663 which living he held until his death; he was also Vicar of Hampstead Norris, Co. Berks, in 1680 and Rector of Checkendon, Co. Oxon in 1703 and was chaplain to Dianna, Countess of Oxford. By his wife, Jane (d. 1676, aged 38), daughter and heir of Philip Osborn of Egham, Co. Surrey, he had seven children, all of whom, except a daughter Anne, died unmarried or s.p. Anne (d. 1711, aged 37), the surviving daughter, married Edward Wise, Master Gunner of Windsor Castle and of Eton, Co. Bucks. The Rev. Francis Sayer (d. 1711) probably married, as his second wife, Bridget, daughter of Anthony Lybbe, Esquire of Hardwick, Co. Oxon, as appears from the inscription on a paten given for the use of the church in 1714. It appears that . . . Sayer, clerk at Yattendon disclaimed at the Visitation of 1665-6. (Harl. Soc., lvii., 30; V.C.H. Berks, iv., 129; M.I.; Papw. Ord., 392; J. E. Smith-Masters, "Yattendon and its Church" (1929), 50; F. Turner, Loc. Hist. Rec. Scheme, Reading Library, File Y1/1).

Nave. North Wall, Window.

2. Quarterly argent and gules in the second and third quarters a fret or over all a fess azure. NORREYS.

It appears that Alfred Waterhouse (d. 1905), R.A., LL.D., architect and churchwarden of the parish, inserted this coat of arms, c. 1896, when the monument of Sir John Norreys, Kt. (d.s.p. 1597) was placed in its present position on the south wall of the nave. Sir Francis Norreys was the second son of Henry, Lord Norreys of Rycote, Co. Oxon, by his wife Margery, daughter and coheir of John, Lord Williams of Thame. His biography is given in the inscription on his monument, a transcription of which is given in the History of Newbury (1839), p. 229 and in "Yattendon and its Church" (1929) pp. 38-39. (D.N.B.; J. E. Smith-Masters, Yattendon and its Church (1929), 11, 15, 38, 39; Lee, History of Thame Church (1883), 442; Burke, Gen. Arm.; Harl. Soc., lvii.. 184; Hist. of Newbury (1839), 229.

GULL. Lady Gull was the second daughter of Nathaniel, Lord Lindley (d. 1921) of East Carleton, Co. Norfolk, by his wife Sarah Katherine, daughter of Edward John Teale of Leeds; in 1886 she married Sir William Cameron Gull, 2nd Bt. (d. 1922), as his first wife. The issue was Major Francis William Lindley Gull (killed in action, 1918), Richard Cameron, the 3rd and present baronet, and four daughters. (Burke, Peer.).

John Harris, Rector of Dogmersfield, Co. Hants, and also of this parish when he d. 1743, aged 38.

He was the son of Roger Harris, Esquire of St. Swithin's, Winchester, by his wife Jane, daughter of Sir Edward Norreys, Kt. of Weston-on-the-Green, Co. Oxon. He matriculated from New College in 1723, B.C.L., 1731 and was elected a Fellow of New College in 1725; the monument was erected by his elder brother Henry Harris, Esquire of Silkstead, Co. Hants. (M.I.; J. E. Smith-Masters, "Yattendon and its Church" (1929), 39-40, 51; Papw. Ord., 390, 1020; Foster, Alum. Oxon.).

He was born at Dorset Street, London, and was the second son of James Plumer George Beeching, of the Sussex family, by his wife Harriet, daughter of William Skaife, of Knaresborough, Co. York. He was educated at the City of London School and at Balliol College, Oxford, and after serving as a curate in Liverpool became Rector of Yattendon in 1885; in 1900 he became chaplain of Lincoln's Inn, professor of pastoral theology at King's College, London, and in 1902, Canon of Westminster; he was a select preacher at Oxford, Cambridge and Dublin. In 1911 he was appointed Dean of Norwich where he died, his ashes being buried in the Cathedral. He married in 1890 Mary, daughter of the Rev. A. J. Plow and niece of Robert Bridges, poet laureate, by whom he had issue three daughters. He was an essayist of note and while at Yattendon devoted much of his time to the study of English poets; some of his poems are published in "Yattendon and its Church" together with a tribute paid to him by the Rev. W. H. Hutton, Dean of Winchester, at the unveiling of the tablet. (M.I.; D.N.B. J. E. Smith-Masters, "Yattendon and its Church" [1929], 52, 74-80; Arm. Fam. [1929], 126).

Mr. A. Stephens Dyer, in correspondence with the writer and in his MS. Pedigree of the Pleydell family (a copy of which pedigree is in the Reading Public Library), shows that John Pleydell (d. 1591), who married Bridget Barker, was the seventh son of William Pleydell (d. 1555) and Agnes Reason, and not the brother, as is shown in the key pedigree. However, the manorial descent of West Ilsley (Memo. R. Trin. 7 Eliz. Rec. rot. 60, and Chan. Proc. (ser. 2) bdle. 146, No. 45, quoted in V.C.H. Berks, iv. 33) shows that John Pleydell (d. 1591) was the brother of William Pleydell (d. 1555), who married Agnes Reason.
