Richard Skirmer, Gent.; d. 1721, aged 59 (?).

WHISTLER.

In the list of those summoned to appear at the 1665-6 Visitation is the following:—"Rich. Skermer (No App.) respit till next assises at Readg. discharged then."
(*MS. Ashm.* 850, 324; *Harl. Soc.* lvii., 23; *Burke, Gen. Arm.*; *Papw. Ord.*, 202).

John Whistler, Gent.; buried 1669.

3. WHISTLER.

In the list of those summoned to appear at the 1665-6 Visitation is the following:—"John Whistler (No App.) will app' at next Reads. Assises and then giue an acct of the Armes belongg to him, and wch are vpon the Mot of John Whistler Recorder of Oxford in Haseley Church in Com' Ox: whose Fath^r and this Jo: Whistlers grandfath^r were brothers. As also vpon the Mot of Ellen and Margets Mot^s his sisters in Goring. respit till next assises at Readg. discharged there." In *MS. Ashmole* 850, 324 there is a trick of the arms (as here shown in Aldworth church) on a monument in St. John's Church, New Windsor, of John Whistler and Martha his wife. Pibworth, an estate in this parish, formerly belonged to the Whistler family; it was sold c. 1744 to Mr. Rowland.

Richard Knapp, Esquire, Benchler and late Reader of Inner Temple London; *d.* 1716, aged 60. Jane, his wife; *d.* 1737. Their son George and daughter Katherine.

1. Or a lion passant and in chief three helmets sable. KNAPP.

The yeoman family of Knapp held land in Sulhampstead and Tilehurst, Co. Berks in 1539 and Richard Knapp (*d.c.* 1614) purchased the house called Lattons Place in Chilton in 1603. The name of George Knapp of Chilton is found in the list of Disclaimers and in the list of those summoned to appear at the Visitation of 1665-6. Richard Knapp (*d.* 1716) matriculated, as the son of Richard of Chilton, Gent., at St. Edmund Hall in 1673, aged 17, and became a barrister-at-law of Inner Temple in 1682 and Benchler in 1708 (when, however, he was described as son of George Knapp of Chilton). In 1701 a George Knapp was in possession of the manor of Chilton and probably conveyed it to Richard Knapp whose daughter Catherine married Charles Peers of Chislehampton, Oxon.; Robert Peers her son sold the manor soon after 1800. (*V.C.H. Berks*, iv., 11-12; *Cherry MS. Berch. Prosop.*, i., 112-115; *Hewett, Hundred of Compton* [1844], 19; *Foster, Alum. Oxon.*; *Harl. Soc.*, lvii, 4, 23).

Sarah, wife of Richard Puckridge; *d.* 1766, aged 33. Also their sons and daughters: Henry Head Puckridge, *d.* 1753, aged 3 years and 9 months, Richard Puckridge, *d.* 1758, aged three months, Dixia Puckridge, *d.* 1768, aged 3. Also Henry Head Puckridge, *d.* 1770, aged 6½. Thomas Head Puckridge, *d.* 1777, aged 25. Rachel Puckridge, *d.* 1778, aged 21, at whose expense this monument was erected.

1. Sable a chevron ermine (?sable ermined silver) between three unicorns' heads rased argent. HEAD.

2. Chequy (?or) and (?azure) on a fess argent three escallops or. TWITCHEN.

The arms of Twitchen are also to be found in Inkpen church; see Inkpen No. 5 on p. 54 of Volume XXXVIII.

Hewett in his " Hundred of Compton " states that the family of Pottinger was settled in Compton before the sixteenth century. The following extract from the parish register probably refers to this Richard Pottinger : " 1695. Richard Pottinger, son of John and Anne, baptized ; the first who was taxed at his entrance into the world in this parish " and is a comment on the graduated scale of duties imposed by William III in 1694. The arms of Pottinger are also found in Inkpen church (No. 4, p. 54, Vol. XXXVIII) ; the impaled arms here found may represent Tipping of Chaddleworth. (Hewett, *Hundred of Compton* [1844], 65 ; Papw. *Ord.*, 216 ; *Harl. Soc.* lvi, 263).

The arms in No. 10 have been borne, with varying tinctures, by Gregory, Delwood and Blayney. (*Papw. Ord.*, 149).

Albinia Eliza, widow of Charles Price, Esquire, and daughter of Sir Charles Price, Bt. of Spring Grove, Surrey ; *d.* 1886, aged 77.

She was the fifth daughter of Sir Charles Price, 2nd Bt. (*d.* 1847) by his wife Mary Ann (*d.* 1847), daughter of William King of King Street, Covent Garden, Middlesex ; she married in 1835 her first cousin Ralph Charles Price (*d.* 1868) of Hill House, Carshalton, Co. Surrey, the issue being seven sons and four daughters. Her husband was the eldest son of Ralph Charles (*d.* 1860, being the third son of Sir Charles, 1st Bt.) and was patron of Farnborough church. (*Burke, Peer ; V.C.H. Berks.* iv, 24).

EAST ILSLEY.

Sanctuary. South Wall. Mural Marble.

Joseph Barnes, M.A., Rector of this church ; *d.* 1753, aged 79.

Martha, his wife ; *d.* 1721, aged 41.

1. [Azure] two leopards [argent]. BARNES.

The Rev. Joseph Barnes appears to have been patron and incumbent in 1704 and was succeeded by the Rev. Robert Barnes in the same capacity. (*V.C.H. Berks.*, iv, 31 ; *Harl. Soc.*, lvi, 159 ; *Papw. Ord.*, 146 ; *Burke, Gen. Arm.* ; *Hewett, Hundred of Compton* [1844], 59, 138).

William Morland, Esquire of West Ilsley ; *d.* 1838, aged 76.

Marianne Elizabeth, his wife ; *d.* 1832, aged 57.

1. Sable in chief a leopard and in base a fleur-de-lys out of a leopard's head or. MORLAND.

and in pretence :

2. Azure a chevron ermine between three hedgehogs. HARRIS.

He was the elder son of William Morland (1726-1773) by his wife Susanna Bunce of Sheepstead, Co. Berks ; he married Marianne Elizabeth, daughter of Aston Harris of Bellbroughton, Co. Worc., the issue being William (*d. unm.*), Benjamin (*d. inf.*), Marianne (*d. unm.*), Harriet (who married.....Payn) and Mary (who married.....Agg). His great-grandfather, John Morland, purchased the manor of West Ilsley from William Smith in 1711. The present representatives of the Morland family are descended from Benjamin who was a younger brother of William Morland (*d.* 1838).

3. [Sable] a chevron ermine between three unicorns' heads cut off at the neck [argent]. HEAD.

She was the third daughter of John Tubb (*b.* 1619), Gent. of East Challow, Co. Berks by his wife Margaret, daughter of John Blandy, Gent. of Letcombe Basset, Co. Berks. She married John Head (*d.* 1701) of Hodcutt in West Ilsley, the issue being John (*d.* 1746) of Hodcutt, Anne (married in 1694 Charles Collins (*d.* 1734) of Betterton, Co. Berks ; she died 1707, see Lockinge No. 12), Grace (*d.* 1731 having married George Fettiplace (*d.* 1730), Gent. of Letcombe Regis, Co. Berks ; see Letcombe Regis No. 1) and Margaret. (*V.C.H. Berks*, iv, 35 ; A. Stephens Dyer, *MS. Pedigree of Head*, Reading Public Library ; Papw. Ord., 419 ; *Harl. Soc.*, lvi, 296 : lxvi, 258).

Mrs. Jane Elsing, *d.* 1731, aged 77. Charles Elsing, eldest son of Mr. Thomas Elsing ; *bur.* 1733, aged 52.

1. [Gules] two barrulets [or] between three fleurs-de-lys [argent] a molet in chief for difference. ELSING.

She was the eldest daughter of Henry Batten, Gent. of East Garston, by his wife Mary, daughter of Edward Boyland of Hungerford Park, Co. Berks; she married the Rev. Thomas Elsing, Rector of Bratton-Clovelly, Co. Devon, who was the son of Henry Elsing (*d.* 1654), Clerk of the House of Commons (or, as stated on this monument, "Clerk to the House of Lords in the beginning of the reign of King Charles I.") Charles Elsing (*d.* 1733) is mentioned as trustee of the will (P.C.C. 120 Plymouth) of Mary Gratwick (1672-1726), sister of Elizabeth Gratwick mentioned in No. 2 below. (*M.I.*; *D.N.B.*; Comber, *Sussex Geneal.* : [Horsham], 126; Papw. *Ord.* 31; Cherry MS. *Berch. Prosap.*, ii. 319-20; *Harl. Soc.*, lvi. 169).

West End. South Wall. Mural Marble.

Edward Batten of Lamborne Woodland; *d.* 1727, aged 68. Elizabeth, wife of Edward Battin, Gent., daughter of John Gratwick of Jarvis in Cowfold, Sussex, Esquire; *d.* 1739, aged 70.

2. Azure three battle-axes argent. BATTEN.
Impaling:
3. Azure a saltire engrailed ermine (*here or*). GARRARD.
and in pretence:
4. Or a chevron engrailed gules between three roundels sable (*here gules*). GRATWICK.

He was the elder son of Henry Batten, Gent. of East Garston, by his wife Mary, daughter of Edward Boyland of Hungerford Park; he married at Cowfold, Sussex, in 1696, Elizabeth (*d.* 1739), eldest daughter of John Gratwick (*d.c.* 1664), Esquire of Jarvis in Cowfold, Sussex, by whom he had an only daughter Mary (1696-1778), who married Charles Garrard (1695-1761) of Kingwood in Lambourn Woodlands, and had issue (see pedigree on p. 68). In the list of those summoned to appear at the Visitation of 1665-6, there appears the following (which possibly refers to Adam Batten (born 1588), grandfather of Edward Batten (*d.* 1727))—"Adam Battin Entr. further tyme given to p'ue Coat vizt: till next Assises & now (17 July 1665) will send his B^r to me to consider of a Grant of Armes." (*M.I.*; Comber, *Sussex Geneal.* [Horsham], 125-6; Papw. *Ord.*, 12,464, 1061; Cherry MS. *Berch. Prosap.*, ii. 319-20; *Harl. Soc.*, lvi. 619; lvii. 24; Footman, *Hist. of Lambourn Church* [1894], 168).

William Seymour, late of East Garston Wood Lands, Gent.; *d.* 1731, aged 68. Margaret, wife of William Seymour of East Garston Woodlands, Gent.; *d.* 1742, aged 75.

5. Quarterly 1 & 4. [Or] on a pile gules between six fleurs-de-lys [azure] three leopards of England. SEYMOUR.
6. 2 & 3. [Gules] a pair of wings [or]. SEYMOUR (*antiqua*).

Sanctuary. North Wall. Monument with four figures.

Thomas Garrard, *d.* 1583. Agnes, his first wife ; *d.* 1556.

William Garrard, their son ; *d.* 1608.

1. Quarterly 1 & 4. Azure (*here argent*) a chevron engrailed ermine. GARRARD.
2. 2 & 3. Argent two bars gules on a canton per pale sable and gules a boar's head cut off at the neck or. PAKENHAM.

He was the son of William Garrard by his wife, daughter of . . . Roseer (see pedigree on p. 68). He married firstly Agnes Blagrove by whom he had issue William (*d.* 1608), Elizabeth and three other children who died in infancy. The inscription on this monument states

" Three children more at one birth Agnes had
Weare all baptizde, wth hir in one grave laid."

Thomas married secondly Alice, daughter of Richard Organ of Lambourn by whom he had issue Thomas (*d.* 1619; see No. 3 below), Roger and John. The arms of Pakenham were brought in by the marriage of Richard Garrard, great-grandfather of Thomas (*d.* 1583) with Agnes, daughter and coheir of William Pakenham. (*M.I.*; *Harl. Soc.*, lvi. 93, 117, 142, 210-214; Footman, *History of Lambourn Church* [1894], 162 *et seq.*; Papw. *Ord.*, 22, 373; *M.S. Ashm.* 850, 149).

South Wall. Brass.

Thomas Garrard, Gent. ; *d.* 1619. Anne, his wife ; *d.* 1610.

3. Quarterly 1 & 4. GARRARD.
4. 2 & 3. PAKENHAM.

He was the son of Thomas Garrard (*d.* 1583; see No. 1 above and pedigree on p. 68) by his second wife Alice, daughter of Richard Organ of Lambourn. He married Anne, daughter of John Tutt, Esquire, by whom he had issue, with four other sons, Thomas (*d.* 1656) who married Cecily, daughter of William Wilmot (*d.* 1618; see Wantage No. 24) of Wantage; Thomas was a Royalist and according to the "Articles of delinquency against Thomas Gerard, Senior, of Chipping Lamborn, he persuaded his tenants to take arms for the King, promising to put a son into the place of any who fell, and allowed his tenants to pay contributions for the King's army, but none for the Parliament"; he lived at the Parsonage in Lambourn and held the great tithes of the parish on lease from the Dean of St. Paul's. (*M.I.*; *Harl. Soc.*, lvi. 213; Footman, *Hist. of Lambourn Church*, 162, *et seq.*; *MS. Ashm.* 850, 150).

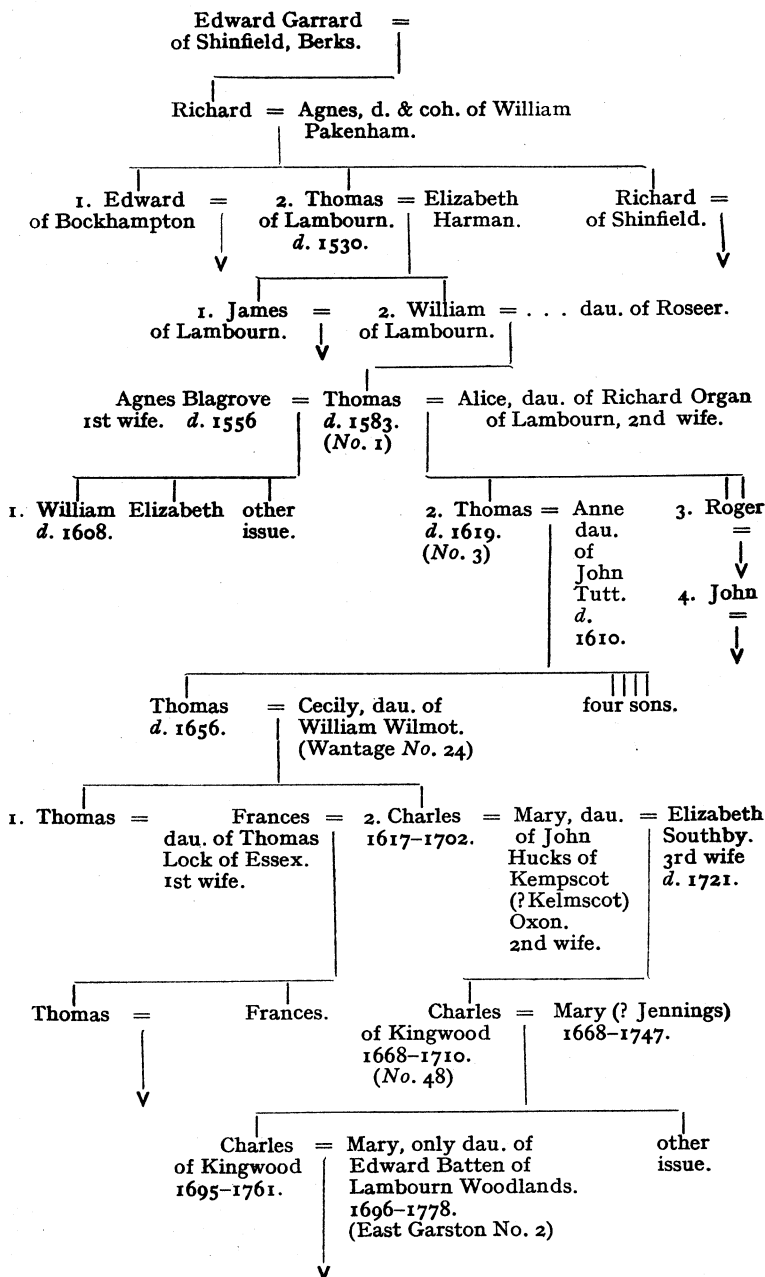
Mural Brass.

The east window of this church was erected in memory of Robert Milman, D.D., eleven years Vicar and afterwards Bishop of Calcutta; *d.* in India, 1876.

5. Dexter: Gules a crosier argent over all an open book argent on a chief indented ermine two branches of palm saltirewise surmounted by a mitre gold. SEE OF CALCUTTA.
6. Sinister: Azure a snake nowed proper between three sinister gauntlets argent, the badge of Ulster. MILMAN.

He was the third son of Sir William George Milman (*d.* 1857), 2nd Bt. of Levaton, Co. Devon, by his wife Elizabeth Hurry (*d.* 1853), only daughter of Robert Alderson, Recorder of Ipswich. He was educated at Westminster (1824-1833; Arms up School) and at Exeter College, Oxford, B.A. 1838, M.A. 1867, B.D. and D.D. 1867; he was Vicar of Chaddleworth, Co. Berks, 1840-51, of Lambourn 1851-62 and of Marlow, Co. Bucks, 1862-7.

KEY PEDIGREE OF GARRARD.



He was a good linguist and while at Chaddleworth he wrote the "*Life of Torquato Tasso*" and at Lambourn he built a new church and schools at Eastbury and restored the chancel of Lambourn church mainly out of his own resources. In 1867 he was appointed Bishop of Calcutta; in 1876 while travelling from Calcutta to Peshawar he became ill and after being moved to Rawal Pindi he died there on March 15th. "He was a man of great accomplishment, a good classical scholar, well versed in modern languages and and a poet of no mean capacity." He died unmarried. (Burke, *Peer*; *D.N.B.*; *Record of Old Westminster*, ii. 649; Footman, *Hist. of Lambourn Church*, 148-50; information from Ecclesiastical Commission; *Trans. Newbury Dist. Field Club*, i. 142).

He was the son of Thomas Seymour of Up Lambourn by Anne his wife, daughter of Toby Richmond of Purton, Co. Wilts. By his wife Charlotte he had issue John-Richmond (*d.* 1848; see No. 16 below) and three daughters, Alethea (*bapt.* 1783), Mary Ann (*bapt.* 1784) and Charlotte (*bapt.* 1786). He inherited from his uncle, Toby Richmond (*d.* 1761; see No. 10 below), Inholmes and other lands. He was a friend of Henry James Pye (*d.* 1813), Poet Laureate, who wrote the epitaph on the monument, See pedigree on p. 70. There is no evidence at present to show the descent of this family from the Seymours, Dukes of Somerset, who bore the arms Nos. 7 and 8. (*V.C.H. Berks.*, iv. 257; Footman, *Hist. of Lambourn Church*, 175; *Papw. Ord.*, 800, 1026, 1123).

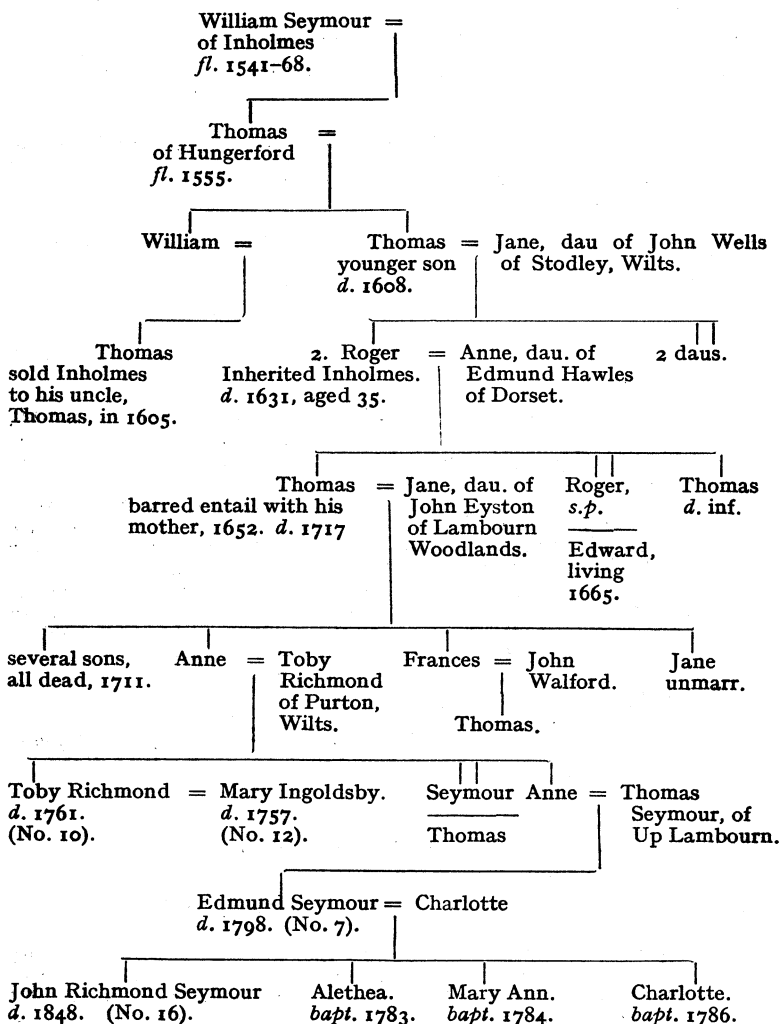

12. Ermine a saltire engrailed sable. INGOLDSBY.

He was the son of Toby Richmond of Purton, Co. Wilts, by his wife Anne, daughter of Thomas Seymour (*d.* 1717) of Inholmes in Lambourn. He married Mary, daughter of Richard Ingoldsby, Esquire of Waldridge, Co. Bucks, and appears to have had no issue. In

1720 he was holding all the lands in Berkshire which had belonged to the Seymour family, Inholmes coming to him through his mother. He left his estates to his nephew Edmund Seymour (*d.* 1798; see No. 7 above and pedigree on this page) who erected the monument. It is to be noted that the arms of Seymour impaling Ingoldsby have been placed on the monument, presumably by his nephew. (*V.C.H. Berks*, iv. 257; Footman, *Hist. of Lambourn Church* [1894], 173-5; Burke, *Ext. Bt.*, 277).

He was the only son of Roger Fettiplace (*d.c.* 1698) by his wife Hesther, daughter of William Northey of Old Ford, barrister-at-law of Middle Temple. He married Charlotte, daughter of Charles Collins (*d.* 1734) of Betterton in Lockinge, Co. Berks. ; she remarried in 1721 John Saunders of Woolston, Co. Berks. By his will he left £5 to the poor of Lambourn and devised his manors to his wife for life with remainder to George Fettiplace of Letcombe Regis, Co. Berks. (*Misc. Gen. et Her.* 5th Ser. ii. 289 ; Collins pedigree, Coll. of Arms).

Ledger Stone.

Margaret Wilmot, only sister of William Wilmot, Esquire, late of Up Lambourne, son and heir of Sir George Wilmot, Kt., and Dame Margaret, his wife ; *d.* 1694.

15. On a lozenge : [Argent] on a fess [gules] between three eagles' heads rased [sable a unicorn sitting enclosed by] two fleurs-de-lys [or]. WILMOT.

She was the daughter of Sir George Wilmot (*b.* 1601) of Charlton in Wantage, Co. Berks, by his wife Margaret, daughter of Richard Aldworth (*d.* 1623), citizen of London. (*Harl. Soc.*, lvi. 142, 311 : lviii. 50).

John Richmond Seymour, Esquire of Crowood, Ramsbury, Co. Wilts, and of Inholmes, Co. Berks ; *d.* 1848, aged 66.

18. Party or and argent a crosslet fitchy between four fleurs-de-lys sable. (READE).

He was the son of Edmund Seymour (*d.* 1798 ; see No. 7 above and pedigree on p. 70) and on his death in 1848 the estate of Inholmes was sold. There is at present no evidence to show who he married but the arms in No. 18 may be assigned to Reade. (Papw. *Ord.*, 641).

According to the pedigree in the Cherry MSS. (*Bercheriensis Prosopiae*, now in the library of the Institute of Historical Research, I., 78) the family held land in Essex and Kent in the latter half of the 12th century and in Middlesex, *temp.* Edward IV. and Elizabeth. Sir Thomas was the son of Sir William Essex, Kt. of Berkshire, by his wife Elizabeth, sole daughter and heir of Thomas Rogers (*d.* 1488) and also heir of John Shottesbroke (see pedigree on p. 75), and by this marriage the manors of Charlton in Hungerford, Plukenets (formerly Chipping Lambourn) in Lambourn and Brightwalton. Sir Thomas married Margaret, second daughter of Sir William, Lord Sandys of the Vine in Sherborne St. John, Co. Hants, who was Chamberlain of the Household to Henry VIII., 1530-35; the issue was William, eldest son who died *s.p.* in his father's lifetime and, with four other sons and five daughters, Thomas (*d.* 1575) who was High Sheriff in 1572-3, and married Jane, daughter of Robert Browne of Walcot House, Barnack, Co. Northampton and had issue. The grandson of Thomas Essex (*d.* 1575) was Sir William of Beckett and Lambourn who was created a baronet in 1612; he was taken prisoner at the battle of Edgehill and died *s.p.s. c.* 1645 when the baronetcy became extinct. According to the Cherry MSS., I. 79, "Indulging himself in a licentious course of life, he wasted his great fortune and in his old age, compelled by his wants and on his son's invitation, he accepted the command of a company of foot in the Parliamentary army." He resumed the ancient arms of the family, "*Argent an orle gules.*" (*Harl. Soc.*, lvi. 7, 24; : lvii. 104, 124-5; Cherry, *Berch. Prosop.*, i. 77-9; *V.C.H. Berks.*, iv. 49, 105, 194, 253-4, 508-9, 535; *G.E.C., Compl. Peer.*, vii. [1896], 56; *Papw. Ord.*, 999, 1035; *Burke, Ext. Bt.*, 187; *Footman, Hist. of Lambourn Church*, 63-4).

He was the son of Charles Garrard (*d.* 1702 ; see pedigree on p. 68) by his third wife Elizabeth Southby (*d.* 1721) and grandson of Thomas Garrard (*d.* 1656), the Royalist. He married Mary who died in 1747, aged 79, and was buried in the chancel. The arms "*Argent a chevron gules between three plummets sable*" were borne by Jennings (see Standford-in-the-Vale, No. 2). (Papw. *Ord.*, 463 ; Footman, *Hist. of Lambourn Church*, 166-7).

John Estbury was the son of John Estbury (*d.* 1365) and was the founder of St. Mary's chapel ; he married Katherine (*d.* 1375), the issue being John (*d.* 1406 and who married Agnes, Edith, Joan (who married . . . Tremayne and was buried in Lambourn church) and Thomas who is also commemorated on this brass. John died seised of Eastbury vill-lands and tenements in Bockhampton, Lambourn, Peasemore, the Manors of Blagrove and Hadley in Lambourn and lands in Newbury, Speen, Speenhamland, Benham and Kintbury, all in Co. Berks. It appears from the *inq. p.m.* that he died on 25 October 1374. (Cherry, *Berch. Prosop.*, i. 80 ; V.C.H. *Berks*, iv. 259).

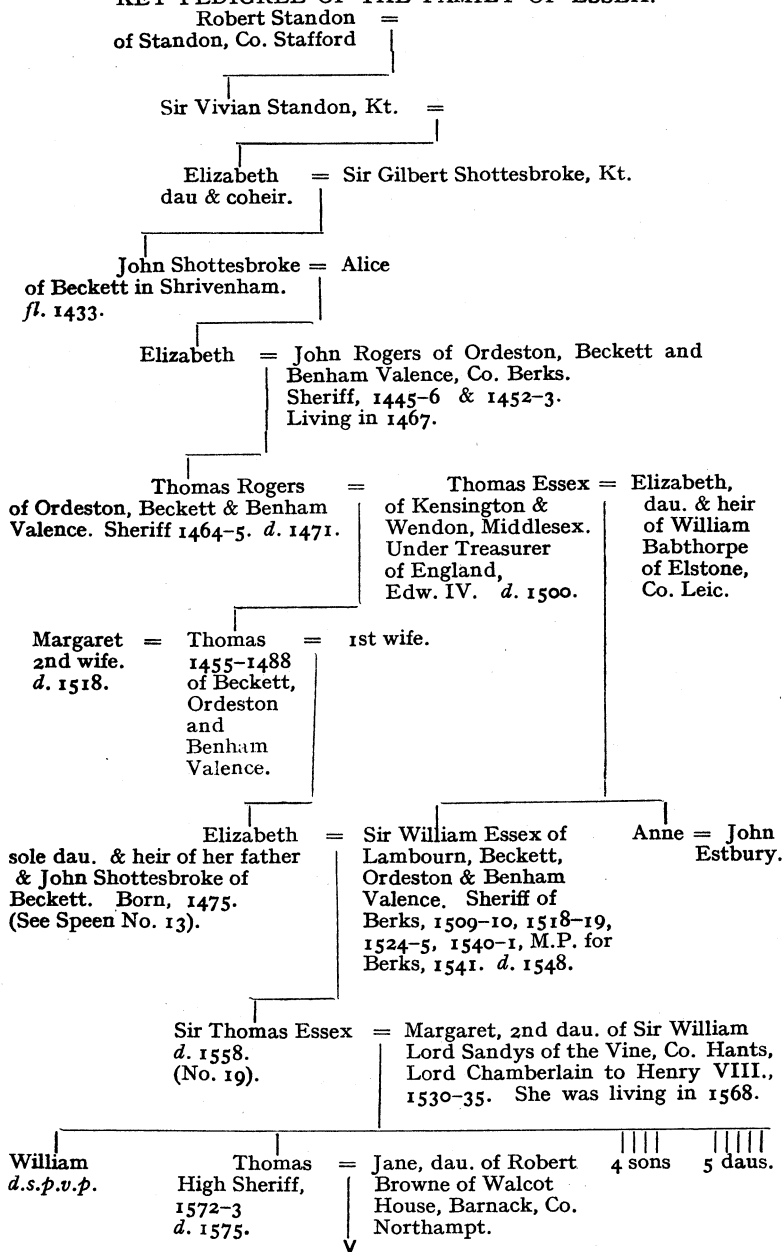

He was the son of Richard Hippisley (*d.* 1666) by his wife Anne Orlebar and married firstly Catherine, daughter of Richard Southby, Esquire of Carswell, Co. Berks, by whom he had issue John (*d.* 1708), Richard (1768-1707), Charles (*d. inf.*), Christopher, Gabriel (*d.* 1688), Ann (born 1676) and Catherine (born 1680); by his second wife Mary, daughter of Samuel Wild, Gent. of Rochdale, Co. Lancs., he had issue Bridget (born 1704); he was Sheriff of Berkshire in 1679 and a J.P. for fifty years. His eldest son John (*d.* 1708) married Cotton Bowles and had issue Organ (*d.* 1735) and John (*d.s.p.* 1769, having married Maria, only daughter of Joshua Odam). The arms of Organ were brought in by the marriage in 1603 of Elizabeth, daughter and coheir of John Organ of Lambourn, with John Hippisley of Ston Easton, Co. Somerset; see pedigree on p. 78) (Burke, *Land. Gent.*; Footman, *Hist of Lambourn Church*, 176-9 *Harl. Soc.*, lvi. 116-17; Cherry, *MS. Berch. Prosap.*, i. 468-70; *M.I.*).

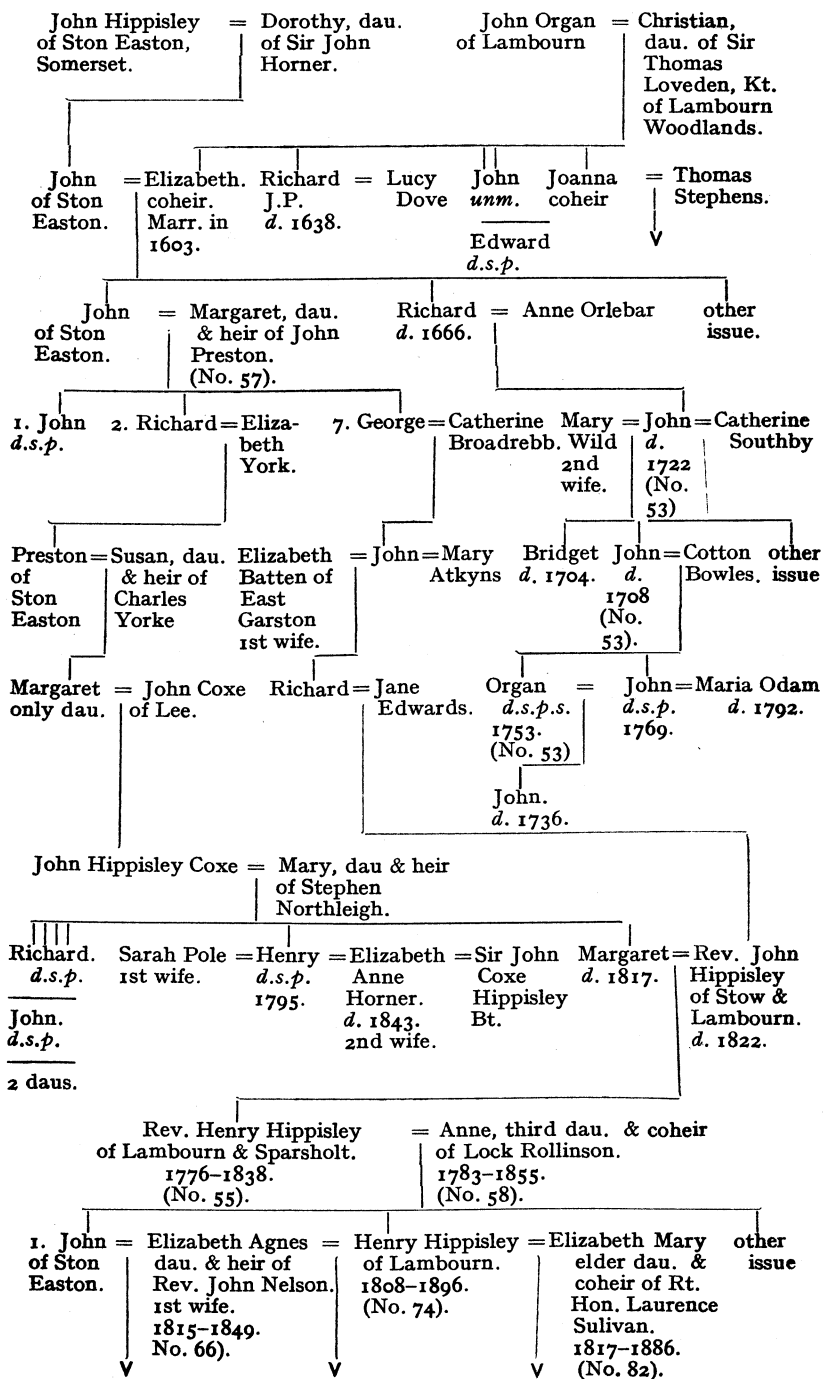

The Rev. Henry Hippisley was the son of the Rev. John Hippisley (*d.* 1822) by his wife Margaret (*d.* 1817), daughter of John Hippisley Coxe. He married Anne (*d.* 1855), third daughter and coheir of Lock Rollinson of Chadlington, Co. Oxon, the issue being John (of Ston Easton), Henry (*d.* 1896; see No. 74 below), Robert-William (born 1818; patron and rector of Stow-on-the-Wold, Co. Glouc.) and eight daughters. He rebuilt Hardrett's almshouses in 1827; in 1807 his father bought the manor of Sparsholt which passed, with that of Lambourn, to him in 1822. The arms of Preston were brought in by the marriage of John Hippisley of Ston Easton with Margaret, daughter and heir of John Preston of Cricket St. Thomas, Co. Somerset. See pedigree on p. 78. He was the second son of the Rev. Henry Hippisley (*d.* 1838 ; see No. 55 above) and married firstly in 1839 Elizabeth Agnes (*d.* 1849), daughter and heir of the Rev. John Nelson, D.D., Prebendary of Heytesbury, by whom he had issue Henry Nelson Hippisley (1839-1894) and four daughters ; he married secondly in 1851 Elizabeth Mary (*d.* 1886), elder daughter and coheir of the Rt. In 1501 John Estbury was granted a licence from the King to found a perpetual chantry and an almshouse for ten poor men ; in addition to the duties of the chantry the chaplain, whose stipend was derived from John Estbury's manor and advowson of Whatcombe,

was to provide instruction in a free grammar-school in the house adjoining the churchyard; the poor men of the almshouse were commanded to attend service each day in the chapel and it is still used by the almsmen at the present time. John Estbury built the chapel wherein lies his tomb on which appear the words "*Fundator istius nove capelle et cantarie . . .*" and in his will he described himself as of "Lettemcombe Regis." He married Elizabeth who survived him and re-married . . . Swayne; she presented chaplains in 1512, 1514, and 1534; their daughter Agnes married John Latton, Esquire of Chilton, Co. Berks, which family quartered the arms of Estbury. Ashmole (MSS. 850, 151; see plate) in his drawing shows, on the south side of the tomb, a shield (now missing) giving Estbury impaling *Ermine three fleurs-de-lys and a bordure [gules]* (for Fabian) which he also shows (p. 137) as being in a window in the manor halls of Childrey and East Shefford (p. 164). The arms of Fabian are also found in Childrey church (see Childrey No. 47); Joan, daughter of Edward Fabian, married, as her third husband, John Estbury of Letcombe Regis, some time after 1464 in which year her second husband, John Fettiplace of East Shefford, died.
