# Coats of Arms in Berkshire Churches.

#### ASTON TIRROLD.

South Chapel. South End. East Side. Mural Stone. William Sambourne, Esquire; d. 1697, aged 81.

I. Argent a chevron sable between three molets gules pierced [or]. SAMBOURNE.

He was the second son of Sir Henry Sambourne, of Moulsford, by his wife Dorothy, daughter and heir of John Stampe of Aston, Co. Berks. By his will he left to the poor of Aston, Moulsford and Streatley £5 a year for ever derived from two closes of 3 acres in Streatley. He also gave £5 a year charged upon Aston farm to be given to the poor on St. Thomas' day and a hundred pounds to the poor of Streatley. The Manor of Aston Danvers was given to his mother Dorothy by her father John Stampe about 1610 and it appears to have remained with the Sambourne family until at least 1650. His father Sir Henry was knighted in 1609 and was Sheriff of Berks, 1631 and "set an example to the whole country in refusing the use of his pigeon house at Moulsford the best of all the County' for the making of saltpetre." He was the third son of Sir Hungerford Hoskyns (d. 1862) 7th Baronet, high sheriff of Herefordshire 1814, by his wife Sarah (d. 1860), youngest daughter of John Philips of Bank Hall, Co. Lancs. He was a Fellow of Magdalen College, Oxford, Honorary Canon of Christ Church, 1880, J.P. for the County, and Rector of Aston Tirrold 1845–1911. In 1846 he married Phyllis, daughter of Sir John Peyton. The issue was six sons and three daughters of which Sir Chandos (d. 1914) succeeded as 10th Baronet, Leigh (d.s.p.m.s. 1923) as the 11th Baronet and the Rt. Rev. Sir Edwyn (d. 1925), Bishop of Southwell, as the 12th Baronet through whom the present line descends. [Burke, Peer; Papw. Ord., 388, 628; M.I.]

#### BASILDON.

The Rev. Edward John Sykes, M.A., 32 years Vicar of this parish. 1827–1891.

I. [Argent] an eagle rising between three sykes on a canton gules a Caduceus or. SYKES.

He was the third son of the Rev. William Sykes (d. 1875) of "The Grotto," Basildon, by his wife Anna Maria Heath (d. 1871) only daughter of Edward Gattey of Harefield House, Devon. He married in 1866, Constance Mary, (d. 1919), daughter of Edward Brown and had issue Arthur, who succeeded as 7th Baronet, two other sons and two daughters. The Rev. Edward John Sykes's great-grandfather was Francis Sykes (1732–1804), M.P. for Shaftesbury 1771–4 and 1780–1 and for Wallingford 1780–1802, who was created a baronet in 1781 and c. 1768, purchased the manor of Basildon which remained in the family until 1838. In 1763 a grant of arms was made by Stephen Martin Leake, Garter, and Thomas Browne, Norroy, to Francis Sykes, afterwards the 1st Baronet, in which it was stated that the family had its origin in Cumberland "as appears by an entry in the last Visitation of Yorkshire, who bore Argent a chevron sable between 3 fountains or sykes proper." ## 4. SYKES.

She was the only daughter of Sir Francis Sykes (d. 1804) 1st Baronet of Basildon by his second wife, the Hon. Elizabeth Monckton (d. 1835) eldest daughter of William 2nd Viscount Galway. She married, in 1797, Richard Benyon (d. 1822) who assumed the name of de Beauvoir and had purchased, c. 1792, the house in Basildon named "The Grotto" which he gave to his nephew the Rev. William Sykes (d. 1875), the father of the Rev. Edward John Sykes mentioned in No. 1 above. Mr. Benyon de Beauvoir was M.P. for Wallingford 1806-7, for Pontefract in 1802 and high sheriff of Berkshire 1816; his principles were conservative and he "voted, when in the House of Commons, in favour of a criminal prosecution against Viscount Melville, on account of his misconduct while treasurer of the navy, and in 1810 with the minority against the committal of Sir Francis Burdett to the tower." The moiety of the manor of Braemores and the moiety of the rectory and advowson of Basildon also descended to Rev. Edward John Sykes and passed on his death in 1891 to the trustees of Sir Francis Sykes until 1898 when they were sold. [V.C.H. Berks. She was buried in West Ilsley Church. The issue was four sons, Hugh, John, Francis and William, and four daughters, Mary, Margaret, Christian and Elinor. "Hugh Keate of Hagbourne no gent:" disclaimed at Abingdon in the Visitation of 1623. In 1612 Hugh Keate and his wife Christian and Hugh Keate, their son, conveyed the manor of East Hagbourne and the tithes of East and West Hagbourne to William Viscount Knollys. He was the King's carpenter at Windsor Castle and in 1762 bought the Great Manor and in 1769 the manors of Upton and Upton Russells, all in Blewbury Co. Berks. The Great Manor passed on his death to his brother, William, for life and then to his nephew John and to the latter's son John Shawe Phillips of Culher who sold it in 1872 together with Upton and Upton Russels in 1866. Clarice, daughter of John de Drokensford, married, as her first husband, Richard de Windsor (d. 1367) of West Hagbourne, Co. Berks and Knight of the Shire in 1340; she was his third wife and on his death received in dower a portion of the manor; she re-married John York (d. 1413) who became Lord of West Hagbourne in her right. By Richard de Windsor

she appears to have had no issue; by John York she had issue John, through whom the line descended until Thomas York, of Heldrope, Co. Wilts, Sheriff of that County, d.s.p.m.c. 1542. The York family also held the manors of Chilton and West Lockinge, Co. Berks in the latter half of the 15th century. There are now in the north aisle three floor brasses. One, formerly in the chancel, shows that Clarice Windsor, sometime Lady of West Hagbourne and wife of John York, built (or probably enlarged) the south chapel; she died in 1403 seised of one messuage, two acres of land, ten acres of meadow and five shillings rent in West Hagbourne. West Hagbourne then descended to Richard Windsor (d. 1428), fourth in descent from Richard Windsor, the first husband of Clarice. The second brass commemorates John York who reconstructed the south aisle and may have provided the font; he died in 1413. The third brass is to John York and his wife Joan who (? both) died in 1445; he was probably the son of John and Clarice York. In the Cherry MSS. (ii. 594), the arms of York are given as Gules (sic) on a fesse cotised sable a crescent gold between two bezants; alternatives, found eslewhere, are Argent on a fesse sable a crescent argent. 

Margaret, the widow of Gaveston, Earl of Cornwall, received the grant of the manor of Princes Harwell from Edward II. in 1316. Two years later the manor was in the hands of the Lords Ordainers but after her marriage with Hugh Audley, the younger, the grant was reconfirmed to her. Margaret was the second daughter of Gilbert de Clare, 5th Earl of Gloucester, by his wife Lady Joan of Acre, second daughter of Edward I. It appears from MS. Ashmole 850 that in 1667 there were in the east window six shields of arms of which "tricks" are given; in addition to two shields of Gaveston, the arms of England, England with a label of five azure, and two shields of Plantagenet, Earl of Cornwall were in existence. Richard, Earl of Cornwall, King of the Romans, died seised of Harwell manor in 1272 and his son Edmund (d.s.p. 1300) succeeded, the manor passing on his death to his widow, Margaret de Clare, daughter of Richard, Earl of Gloucester. Christopher Smith, Esquire, a native of this parish; Alderman of London for 28 years, Sheriff, Lord Mayor 1817 and 1818, M.P. for the Borough of St. Albans in three successive Parliaments; d. 1835, aged 84. Buried in St. Antholme's, London. Monument erected by his widow.

He was probably a member of the family of Hopkins of Tidmarsh, Co. Berks, who held the lease of the manor of Bishop's Harwell early in the 19th century, and who traced founder's kin to St. John's College, Oxford. #### NORTH MORETON.

The shield in all probability represents Sir Miles de Stapleton who in 1299 obtained a licence to alienate lands in North Moreton for the endowment of two priests in the chantry of St. Nicholas which was in the south chapel enlarged and extended eastwards at this date. Sir Miles was the son and heir of Nicholas de Stapleton (d. 1290, a judge of the King's Bench who held the manor of North Moreton in 1279) by his wife Margaret, daughter of Miles Basset, who held lands in North Moreton. Sir Miles married, as his first wife, Sibell, daughter and coheir of John Bellew and, through this marriage, was connected with the elder line of the Bruces of Skelton; he married secondly Cecilia (d. 1363) daughter of Peter de Tyndale. He was steward of Edward II's household 1307–8 and an adherent of Thomas of Lancaster and summoned to Parliament in 1313; in 1310 he settled the manor on his second son Gilbert. Sir Miles was killed at the battle of Bannockburn in 1314. Her husband Richard (b. 1632) was the son of Henry Pount of South Moreton by his wife Dorothy, daughter of Richard Whistler of South Moreton. She was his first wife and apparently d.s.p. 

By his will proved in 1817, Henry Fludger (d. 1817) left £900. the interest on which was to be distributed among thirty poor persons; this bequest was merged with the municipal charities of Wallingford regulated by the Charity Commissioners. He also appears to have bequeathed £700 for the benefit of twenty poor men and women of Longworth, Co. Berks. The monument was erected by his cousin Harriet Mundy, grand-daughter of Mrs. Blackhall who was his father's sister. The family appear to have purchased the estate of Sherwoods in Brightwell, Co. Berks, in 1755. The arms of Bunce are found on the monument to Daniel Bunce (d. 1754) in Longworth church (see No. 17, p. 50, Berks Arch. Journ., xxxvi). [M.I.; V.C.H. In the election of 1701 his return was petitioned against by William Dunch but no determination appears; in his turn he petitioned in 1705 against the return of William Jennings and Clement Kent but no determination appears; in 1709 "on the petition of Edward Leigh Esq., praying that the return of this election should be amended in his favour and complaining that Mr. Blackhall, an attorney, had got into possession of the office of mayor, contrary to the charter and returned Thomas Renda Esq., the House resolved, 'that the right of election for this borough is in the mayor, aldermen, bailiffs, and eighteen assistants, together with the inhabitants of the said borough, paying scot and lot, and not receiving alms or charity.' In 1713 his return was petitioned against by Henry Grey, Esq., an unsuccessful candidate, but no determination appears; he was an unsuccessful candidate in the election of 1715. "In 1702, he opposed the lords' amendments to a bill for the further security of the Hanoverian succession, and in 1704, the bill for tacking on the occasional conformity to the land tax bill. He subsequently voted in support of Dr. Sacheverel's interests; and in 1713, in support of the French commerce bill." See pedigree on this page. 

He left a sum for the poor which yielded £26 paid by the Governors of the grammar school and distributed among ten aged persons; he also made a benefaction which enabled a free grammar school to be erected in Wallingford. He was the eldest son of Charles Blackstone, Esquire of Cheapside, London, a silkman by trade, by his wife Mary (d. 1735), eldest daughter of Lovelace Bigg, Esquire of Chilton Foliat, Co. Wilts. He was educated at Charterhouse school and Pembroke College, Oxford, where he became a Fellow of All Souls' in 1744 and the first professor of English Law, 1758-66; he was Recorder of Wallingford and M.P. for Hindon, Wiltshire, 1761-6, and for Westbury, Wiltshire, 1768; solicitor-general to the Queen in 1763; between 1765 and 1769 he published "Commentaries on the Law of England" which is considered the best general history of English law. He married Sarah, eldest surviving daughter of James Clitheroe, Esquire of Boston House, Co. Middlesex, and had issue Henry (of Priory Place, Wallingford, d.s.p. 1826, aged 63), James (barrister of Middle Temple, d. 1831 having married Elizabeth Flamank (d. 1842), daughter of Richard Jenkyns, Esquire of Cornwall, by whom he had issue one son and two daughters), William (d. unm. 1814), Charles (d. unm. 1815, Fellow of Worcester College and Rector of Worting, Co. Hants) and four daughters. He lived at a house known as Castle Priory in Wallingford and was buried under the church to the rebuilding of which in 1769 he largely contributed. On the death of his grandson, William Seymour Blackstone, of Castle Priory, Wallingford, M.P. for Wallingford, the family became extinct. [D.N.B.; Berry, Berks. Pedigrees, 97; Papw.
