WINDSOR BOROUGH.

WINDSOR ST. JOHN BAPTIST.

West End. North Vestibule. West Wall. Mural Marble with Bust.

Rebecca Southcott, youngest daughter of Sir George Southcott of Dartmouth Castle, Devon; d. 1642, aged 20. Monument erected by Richard Braham, Esquire, who married her elder sister.

1. On a lozenge: [Silver] a cheveron gules between three coots [sable]. SOUTHCOT.

Mural Marble.

Matthew Day, Gent., five times Mayor; d. 1661 [aged 87]. His surviving widow with whom he lived 63 years, 7 months and 16 days; d. 1667, aged 86.

2. [Per cheveron gold and azure] three molets countercoloured in chief a molet [gules] for difference. DAY.

He was the son and heir of William Day of Eton, Co. Bucks., and of the manor of Sunninghill, Co. Berks, by his wife Anne Worrall of Co. Warwick. He married Mary, eldest daughter of George Dowdeswell of Eton, Gent., by whom he had issue six sons and six daughters. William Day, his father, bought the manor of Sunninghill in 1583 which remained with the family until 1668 when it was sold to John Blagrave. [Harl. Soc. Ivi, 84; V.C.H. She was the daughter of Besells Fettiplace (d. 1609) of East Shefford and Besselsleigh, Co. Berks, by his wife Eleanor, daughter of Richard Covert of Slaugham, Sussex. Her husband William was son of Lionel Bostock of Fitzharris in Abingdon, Co. Berks, by his wife Joan, daughter of Thomas Wolley of Henley. [Misc. Gen. et Her., ii (5th S., 1916–17), 189; Harl. 3. LEIGH.

Mural Marble. Male and Female busts with two amorini.
Sir Thomas Reeve of Plumton in Northampton, d.s.p. 1736, aged 65. He married in 1712 Arabella, daughter of John Topham, Esquire of this parish and widow of Samuel Foot, merchant of London; she d. 1732.

11. Silver on a fesse between three escallops sable three eagles gold. REEVE.

He was the son of Richard Reeve, Esquire of London and Dagnall, Co. Bucks.; educated at Trinity College, Oxford, he became a K.C. in 1718 and a Bencher of the Middle Temple in 1720, Attorney General in 1722 and Chief Justice of Common Pleas in January, 1736; he was knighted in 1735. His brother-in-law was Richard Topham of New Windsor, Keeper of records in the Tower, who in 1730 bequeathed the manor of Clewer Brocas to his sister Arabella. [Burke, Gen. Arm.; M.I.; V.C.H. South Wall. Large mural monument with two draped figures. Inscription defaced.

13. Above 1. Quarterly 1 & 4. [Sable] a cross flowered at the ends gold. BRAHAM.

14. 2 & 3. [Azure] in chief a fleur-de-lys and in base two trefoils [gold] a bordure engrailed [gold]. PALMER.

15. 2. BRAHAM.

17. Centre. Dexter: BRAHAM.

The inscription is now illegible but the monument commemorates Richard Braham (d. 1618, aged 33) and his daughter-in-law, Susan (d. 1640, aged 22), the first wife of his son Sir Richard Braham. He married Elizabeth, second daughter of Nathaniel Giles of New Windsor, by whom he had issue Richard, John and Elizabeth. See pedigree on p. 37. [Harl. Soc., Ivi, 74, 178; Burke, Gen. Arm.; V.C.H. Berks., iii, 67; Ashmole MSS. 850, 316-17].

Tower. North Wall. Mural Monument with Male and Female busts.

Nazareth, daughter of Robert Harris of Reading, Esquire; d. 1666, aged 88.

- 23. (? Sable) a cheveron ermine between three arrows points downwards (? gold) on a chief (? gold) three ravens sable and a canton gules charged with a molet (? gold) and in pretence:
- 24. Quarterly 1 & 4. ... 3 (?) molets and on a chief a (? roundle).

 25. 2 & 3. Azure a lion (? silver).

The inscription on the monument states that she married firstly Richard Vaughan (d. 1608), citizen and cloth worker of London by whom she had Edward, Elizabeth, Nazareth and Rachael; secondly, Zephaniah Sayers (d. 1628), citizen and haberdasher of London by whom she had Elizabeth, Nazareth and Sarah; and thirdly, James Pagett (d. 1638), one of the Barons of the Exchequer, whom she survived 28 years. The arms No. 23 were, according to Papworth, borne by the family of Dawson. [M.I.; Papw. Ord., 473-4].

South Wall. Mural Marble with Male bust.

Topham Foot, Esquire, d. (with mother, aunt and uncle) 1712, aged 23.

26. [Vert] a cheveron between three martlets [silver]. FOOT.

North Wall. Wooden Hatchment.

Richard Galis, Gent., Mayor of New Windsor; he gave to the poor £3 yearly; d. 1574, aged 68. Alice his wife by whom he had ten sons and two daughters, d. 1580, aged 57. "Perfected the 16 of October 1606."

27. Sable three bars gold and in chief two swords silver in saltire with (?) drops of blood thereon.

Impaling:

28. Sable between six molets gold two crescents silver.

Ashmole records "On the pillar, whereunto the Pulpit is fix'd, are the aforesaid Arms and Inscription drawn on a Tablet and hung there, with this Addition: Perfected the 16 of October 1606." In a roll of arms from the margins of wills registered in book "Martyn" (1574) and proved in the Prerogative Court of Canterbury the arms of Richard Galys of New Windsor, gent., are given as Azure a fesse fretty. [Genealogist (NS). xiii, 104; Ashmole MSS. 850, 323].

Richard Hale, Doctor of Physic, F.R.C.P., London and Physician to the Hospitals of Bethlem and Bridewell; d. 1728, aged 57.

Mary, wife of John Dugdale (eldest son of William Dugdale of Blith Hall, Co. Warwick, Esquire), daughter of Alexander Baker of New Windsor; d. 1670. Also Elizabeth, her mother (daughter of Thomas Farrer of Harolt (Harrold), Co. Bedford, Esquire) and Elizabeth, aged 3 and John, d. inf.

o. [Silver] a cross moline [gules] in dexter chief a roundle

[gules] and a label of three. DUGDALE.

The Victoria County History states that the "tablet was erected by Penelope his only surviving child and wife of Robert Lytton, to the memory of her father, Alexander Baker of Windsor who died 4 August 1685." [V.C.H. Berks., iii, 67; Harl. Soc., lvi., 161-2: lvii., 47].

South-west corner. Mural Marble.

Mrs. Margaret Woodruff, spinster; d. 1805, aged 70.

36. On a lozenge: Gules on a cheveron silver three stags' heads razed [sable] a chief battled sable. WOODRUFF.

South Aisle. East Wall. Mural Marble with figures.

Edward Jobson and Elynor his wife by whom he had issue six sons, Edward, Frances (sic), Humfrie, James, William, Richard, and four daughters, Elizabeth, Elizabeth, Katherine, Sara.

37. (? Sable) three leopards' faces gold. Impaling:

38. Ermine a cheveron gules.

Choir. North Wall. East End. Mural Brass.

Henry John Ellison, M.A., Vicar of Windsor, 1855–1875. Founder, Church of England Temperance Society, Prebend of Lichfield, Hon. Canon, Oxford and Canterbury, Chaplain in Ordinary to the Queen in Windsor Castle; d. at Canterbury on Christmas morning, 1899, aged 86. Brass placed by his son, John Ellison, also Vicar of Windsor, 1902.

39. Above: Dexter: CHAPTER OF WESTMINSTER.

40. Sinister: [Silver] a cheveron between three roses

on a chief [gules] a leopard [gold] between two bibles. TRINITY

North Aisle. North Wall. Mural Marble.

John Kirkpatrick, Esquire, Commander of the Henry Addington, East Indiaman; d. 1816, aged 49.

43. [Silver] a saltire azure on a chief [azure] three [cushions gold]. KIRKPATRICK.

West End. Mural Marble.

Hartgill Baron, Esquire, a Clerk of the Privy Seal, Secretary to His Highness Prince Ruport (sic), Constable of Windsor Castle; d. 1673 [aged 47]. Also Hartgill, Penelope and Lucy, his children. Also Ann, his wife, daughter of Phillip Barret, Esquire of Hamsteed, Middlesex; d. 1687.

44. Defaced. (? two eagles).

He was the eldest son of John Baron (d.c. 1642) of Meere, by his wife, Margaret, daughter and coheir of . . . Stut of Co. Lincoln. By his wife Ann, he had issue John, son and heir aged 12 in 1665, four other sons and three daughters. His arms may have been a cheveron between three sheaves. [Harl. Soc., lvi., 166-7: lvii. 47, 66].

Mural Marble.

John Hickmote of Aylesford, Co. Kent and of Cliffords Inn in London; d. 1655, aged 65.

45. Per pale indented gold and [azure] six roundles countercoloured [in dexter chief a molet for difference].

Impaling:

46. [Azure] a cheveron [gold] between three stars gold and the sun in splendour.

He was the filacer of the Court of Common Pleas in Westminster; by his wife Joan, daughter of Charles Sunnybank, S.T.P. of Brunswick in Germany, he left a son Charles (who placed the monument) and other issue. The arms on the monument appear to have been repainted. [M.I.; V.C.H. Berks., iii, 66; Ashmole MSS. 850, 320).
