Sir Gilbert East Clayton-East, 2nd Bt. was the son of Sir George East (d. 1851; see Nos. 8 and 9 below) by his wife Marianne Frances (d. 1876) eldest daughter of Charles Bishop of Sunbury. He married in 1845 Emma Jane Lucretia (d. 1872), eldest daughter of Sebastian Smith of London and had issue Sir Gilbert Augustus Clayton-East (1846–1925), 3rd Bt. of Hall Place who succeeded as 7th Bt. of Marden on the death in 1914 of his cousin Sir William Robert Clayton, 6th Bt. of Marden. Sir Gilbert East 2nd Bt. of Hall Place (d. 1828; see Nos. 6 and 7 below) was the son of Sir William East (1738–1819), 1st Bt. of Hall Place by his first wife Hannah, second daughter of Henry Casamajor. Sir Gilbert East (d. 1828) married Eleanor Mary (d. 1838), eldest daughter of William Jolliffe of Petersfield and d.s.p., the baronetcy becoming extinct; he was succeeded by his nephew Sir George East (d. 1851; see Nos. 8 and 9 below) who was the second son of Mary East, his sister and wife of Sir William Clayton (1762–1834) 4th Bt. of Marden. [Burke, Peer.; Burke, Gen. Arm.; V.C.H. Berks., iii. 157].

Richard Lovelace (1542-1601) was the son of John Lovelace (d. 1558; of Stockwell, Surrey, who purchased Hurley in 1545) by his second wife Grace (d. 1579), daughter of Robert Sampson of Binfield, Co. Berks., He married Anne, fourth daughter of Richard Warde of Hurst, Co. Berks., by whom he had issue Richard (d. 1634). Richard was "aged 30 or more" at his father's death in 1601 and had matriculated at Merton College, Oxford, in 1584, aged 16; he was in command of troops in Ireland in 1599 and is said to have been knighted by the Earl of Essex in 1599; he was M.P. for Berks., 1601, for Abingdon, 1604-11, for Windsor, 1614 and for Berks. again, 1620-22; High Sheriff of Berks., 1610-11 and for Oxon., 1626-27. In 1627 he was created Baron Lovelace of Hurley and married firstly Katherine, widow of William Hyde of Denchworth, Co. Berks., and daughter of George Gyll of Hertfordshire, by whom he had no issue. He married secondly, about 1615, Margaret (d. 1652), daughter and coheir of William Dodworth, citizen and merchant tailor of London, by whom he had issue John, the Royalist, (d. 1670) and Francis, Governor of New York, 1668-73, and two daughters [See Radley No. 27, Berks. Arch. Yourn., xxxiv (1930), 54]. Richard Lord Lovelace "though he was born to but 400 l. a Year, yet he left to his only [sic] son now [1634] twenty near 7000 l. a Year: All got by a fortunate Marriage with a rich Citizen's Daughter, she was worth to him 50,000 l." [Compl. Peer., viii (1932), 230, note f.] The quartered arms No. 13 are said to be those of Einsham (or Lovelace) but I have been unable to trace any evidence to substantiate this. [Compl. Peer., viii (1932), 229-31; Gent. Mag. Libr., Berks. (Ed. Gomme 1891), 177-9; V.C.H. Berks., iii, 155; Quart. Inl. Berks. Archaeol. and Architect. Soc., ii (1891), 32-3; Harl. He was the eldest son of Henry Skrine (d. 1853) of Warleigh, Somerset, by his wife Caroline Anne, daughter of the Rev. Benjamin Spry, Vicar of St. Mary Redcliffe, Bristol, and Prebendary of Sarum. In 1843 he married Susanna Caroline (d. 1890), fifth daughter of William Mills of Saxham Hall, Suffolk, by whom he had issue eight sons and three daughters. He built this church in 1850. In 1837 he bought the manor of Great Bradley in Cookham from Edward Francis Colston and in 1849 the manor of Cookham from Mrs. A. M. Vansittart. He was High Sheriff of the County in 1876. He was the son of George Sawyer by Anne, daughter of Elezins Hill of Blofield. He married Anne (d. 1651), daughter of Sir William Whitmore, Kt. of London, by whom he had, with other issue, an eldest son George (d.v.p. 1655). He was one of the auditors of the Exchequer and held the manor of West Waltham or Heywood in White Waltham in 1633 and dealt with the manor by fine in 1651 and was succeeded by his grandson Edmund; the manor remained in the family until 1924. He held the lease of the manor of Windsors or Waltham Place in White Waltham which his father Sir Paul Neile had purchased from Roger Gardiner, a citizen of London and who had rebuilt the house in 1634. William Neile was an astronomer and mathematician and became a F.R.S. in 1663 having in 1657 discovered an exact rectification of the cubical parabola; he built an observatory at Hill House where he is said to have died "of a broken heart over an unhappy love affair." Elizabeth, d. 1702. James Theobald of Waltham Place, Esquire, erected the monument and who retired here in 1744; d. 1759, aged 71. Elizabeth his wife; d. 1759, aged 54.

The M.I. states "She [i.e. Elizabeth wife of Peter] with two daughters and serving maid lost their lives in passing under London Bridge leaving behind four sons and one daughter. Thomas who married Martha, daughter of Thomas Turner of Ileden, Kent. James, married first to Sarah, daughter of Josiah Kingsman of Horndon on the Hill, Essex, and afterwards to Elizabeth, daughter of James Whitchurch of London, merchant. Peter who married Eliza, daughter of John Middlemarsh of Lambeth, Gent. John who has hitherto lived single and Ann married to Nathaniel Pramatt of Hampton."
