The Hoby Window. Glass.

Part of an inscription in this window indicates that it was erected in 1609 to the memory of Sir Philip and Sir Thomas Hoby, and of Elizabeth, the mother, and Margaret, the wife, of Sir Edward Hoby. See pedigrees II and III on pp. 124-5.

Henry Carey was said to be the son and heir of William Carey (*d.* 1529) Esquire of the Body to Henry VIII, by his wife Mary (*d.* 1543), daughter and coheir of Thomas Boleyn, Earl of Wiltshire and Ormond. His mother's sister Anne was mother of Queen Elizabeth and Henry VIII is even said to have been his father. [*Compl. Peer.*, VI (1926), 627-8]. He was created Baron of Hunsdon, Co. Hertford in 1558, K.G. in 1561, and died in 1596, aged 72, and was buried in the Chapel of St. John Baptist in Westminster Abbey. He married Anne, daughter of Sir Thomas Morgan, Kt. of Arkestone, Co. Hereford, by whom he had George Carey (2nd Baron), three other sons and two daughters Catherine and Margaret. The latter married Sir Edward Hoby (*d.* 1617) as his first wife. The crest of the silver swan may have derived through the marriage of James Butler 1st Earl of Ormonde (*d.* 1337) with Eleanor de Bohun second daughter of Humphrey, Earl of Hereford, whose badge it was. The 7th Earl of Ormonde's daughter and coheir Margaret married Sir William Boleyn who was the grandfather of Mary Boleyn, the mother of Henry Carey, Lord Hunsdon.

Sir Edward Hoby (*d.* 1617; Nos. 80-91) was the son of Sir Thomas Hoby (*d.* 1566; Nos. 64-77, 309-316, 352-359) by his wife Elizabeth (*d.* 1609; Nos. 71-77, 332-338, 360-368), daughter of Sir Anthony Cooke, Kt. He married firstly in 1582 Margaret Carey, daughter of Henry, 1st Baron of Hunsdon (*d.* 1596; Nos. 3-18) when she was 18 years of age. She died *s.p.* in 1605 and Sir Edward erected the "Swan monument" (Nos. 147-219) in her memory. For his second wife, see Nos. 92-103. He was the favourite of James I. For details of his life, see *D.N.B.* and the paper by E. A. B. Barnard "The Hobys of Evesham, and of Bisham" in *Trans. Worc. Arch. Soc.*, 1935. For a reproduction of his portrait (*c.* 1578) see Barnard's paper (*op. cit.*), *Berks. Arch. Jour.*, 38 (1934), 33 and *The Connoisseur*, September 1922.

For coats Nos. 21-32, see Wotton, T., *English Baronets* (1727), II, 449: *Misc. Gen., et Her.*, I (1868), 141-3. No. 31, Oldcastle, appears to have been inserted as a quartering of Hoby with reference to the legend given in Wotton (*op. cit.*), 450, that William Hoby (grandfather of Sir Edward Hoby (*d.* 1617)) took Sir John Oldcastle prisoner—in spite of Camden's dictum that "No Christian may bear undifferenced the arms of a Christian whom he taketh in War" (*Remaines.*, (1870), 246). But perhaps Oldcastle as a heretic was not regarded as a Christian.

This shield represents the marriage of Giles Hoby (*d.* 1625; No 145), son of William Hoby (*d.* 1603), with Elizabeth, daughter and heir of Thomas Paulet (*d.* 1585), fourth son of John, 2nd Marquis of Winchester. He married secondly Ann (*d.s.p.* 1630; No. 146), daughter of Sir Thomas Clarke of Avington, Co. Southampton. [*Collins, Peer.*, II, 375; *Berks. Bucks. and Oxon. Arch. Sir Philip Hoby (*d.s.p.* 1558 ; Nos. 268–279), half-brother of Sir Thomas (*d.* 1566 ; Nos. 64–70, 238–245), was the son of William Hoby of Leominster, Hereford, by his first wife Catherine Foster. He married Elizabeth (*d.* 1560), daughter and heir of Sir Walter Stonor of Stonor, Oxon. He was English ambassador at the court of the Emperor Charles V and was granted the Bisham estate in 1552 by the King. His portrait by Holbein is at Windsor and a reproduction of Bartolozzi's engraving thereof appears in Barnard's paper (*op. cit.*). Details of his life are in the *D.N.B.* and in Barnard's paper. On his death Sir Philip bequeathed Bisham to his half-brother Sir Thomas. [Lipscomb, *Bucks.*, IV, 609.]

Sir Thomas Hoby (*d.* 1566; Nos. 253-260, 309-316, 352-359), half-brother of Sir Philip (*d.s.p.* 1558; No. 51), was the son of William Hoby of Leominster by his second wife, Catherine, daughter and heir of John Forden. He married Elizabeth (*d.* 1609; Nos. 71-77, 246-252, 261-267, 332-338, 360-368) and died in Paris while ambassador to France. His diary has been published.¹ He was the father of Sir Edward (*d.* 1617; Nos. 21-32, 80-91) and of Thomas Posthumous (No. 19), Anne (Nos. 339-341) and Elizabeth. For details of his life, see *D.N.B.* and Barnard (*op. cit.*). For Nos. 71-76, see Pedigree on p. 123. No. 73 was brought in by the marriage of John Cooke, father of Sir Anthony, with Alice daughter and heir of Sanders of Sanderstead, Surrey. It was derived from Saloman through the marriage of Ralf Sanders with a coheir of Sir Roger Saloman of Horley, (Burke, *Gen. Arm.* (1883), 891, 895; Manning & Bray, *Surrey*, sub. Saleman) and the Sanderses differed the coat by changing the metal of the field and substituting a lys for a leopard's face on the breast of the eagle. [Wotton, *T., Engl. Bts.* (1727), App. III, 338; *Harl. Soc.* 13, 564; Wright, *T., Co. of Essex II* (1836), 440].

Henry, Lord Danvers was the second son of Sir John Danvers (d. 1594) of Dauntsey, Co. Wilts. and of Danby, Co. York., by his wife Elizabeth, fourth daughter and coheir of John Nevill, Lord Latimer. He was created Baron Danvers of Dantsey in 1603 and Earl of Danby in 1626 and instituted K.G. in 1633. For details of his life, see *D.N.B.* and *Compl. Peer.*, IV (1916), 48-9. He died unmarried in 1643. His sister Elizabeth (92-103) married Sir Edward Hoby (d. 1617 ; 80-91) as his second wife. The quarterings of his coat are accounted for as follows :—

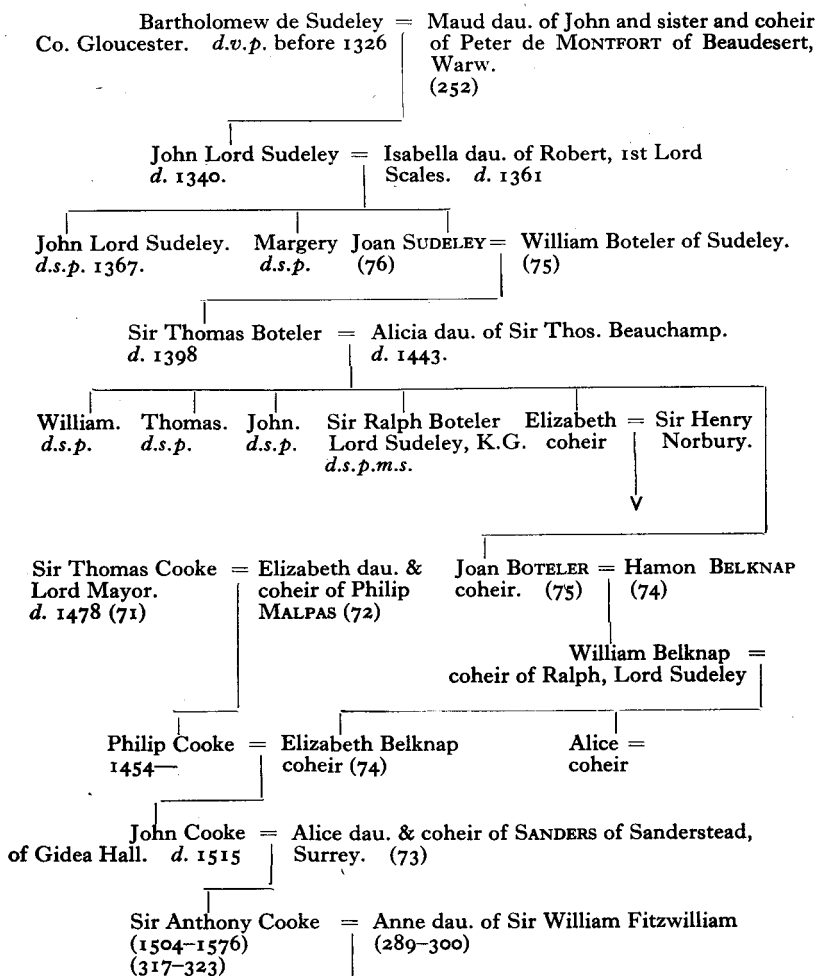

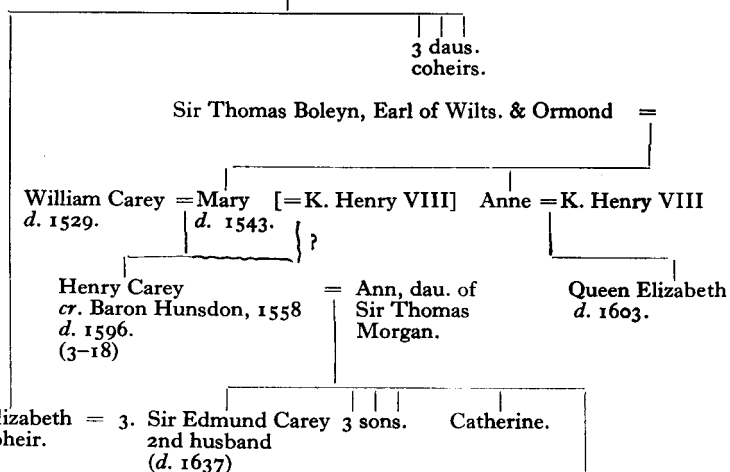

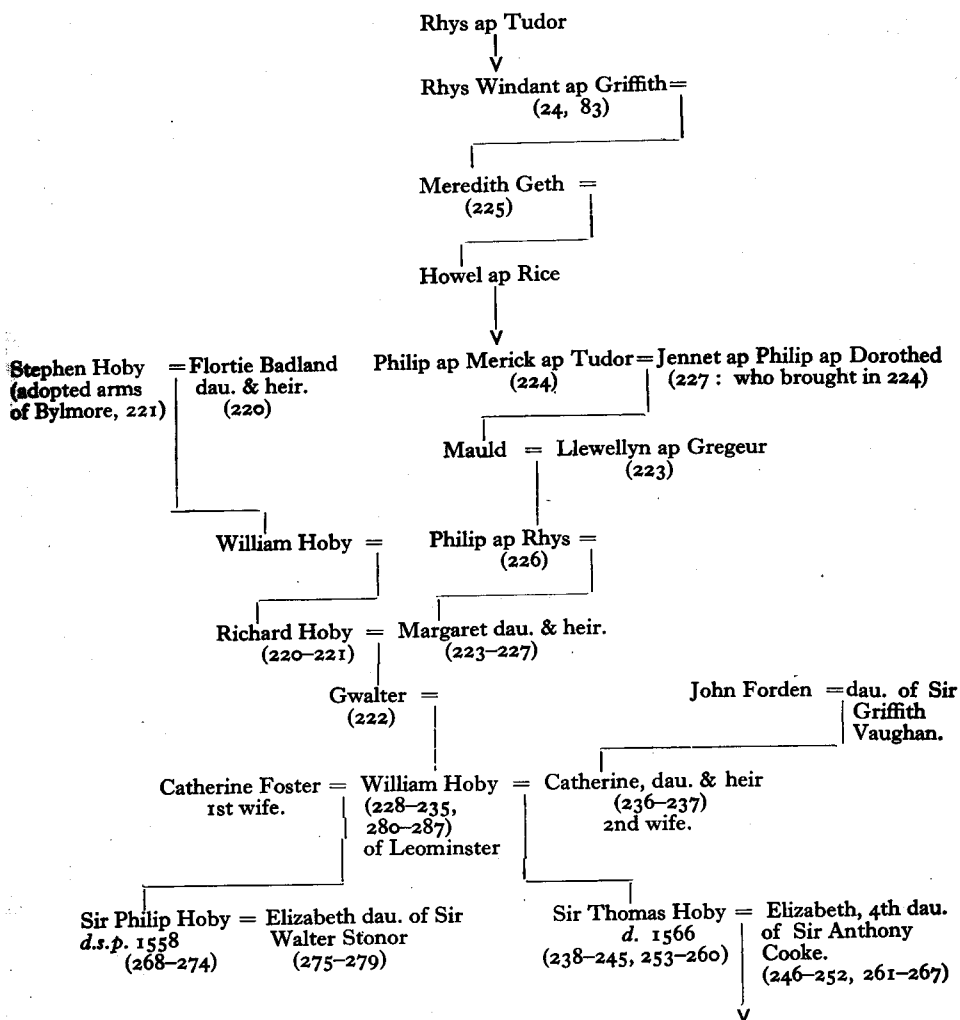

The Earldom of Plymouth and the ancient name of Windsor has become extinct. Monument erected by his widow Ann Countess of Plymouth, *d.* 1850, aged 75.

George Vansittart was the sixth son of Arthur Vansittart (1691-1760) of Clewer and Moat House, Windsor, High Sheriff of Berks., by his wife Martha (*d.* 1782), eldest daughter and coheir of Sir John Stonhouse, Bt. He was M.P. for Berks, 1784-1812, purchased Bisham soon after 1780 from Elizabeth Hoby Mill and married in 1767 Sarah (*d.* 1819), daughter of the Rev. Sir James Stonhouse Bt. by Ann his wife, daughter and coheir of John Neale of Allesley. See also notes on Maidenhead St. Andrew No. 1 on p. 131 of *Berks. Arch. Journ.*, 43 (1939). Their eldest son was General George Henry Vansittart (*d.* 1824) who married in 1818 Ann Mary (*d.* 1875), daughter and coheir of Thomas Copson of Sheppey and Sutton, Co.
