BESSELS LEIGH.

On the triptych in the church at Burford in Shropshire [Trans. & Page 46 Proc. Birmingham Arch. Soc., xlix (1923), 69 & Plate 28] these Nos. arms appear as Sable a bend fusilly silver and named for LAUTON and Silver on a bend cotised sable three pierced molets silver, for LENTHALL of Hampton in Shropshire. In a pedigree by Francis Lenthall dated 1849 in MS. Top. Berks. B.2. in 7-8. Bodley Silver on a bend cotised sable three pierced molets silver is ascribed to the heiress of Jones. The bend is gules cotised sable on the quartered shield of William Lenthall (d. 1596) in North Leigh Church, Oxon. [Oxford Rec. Soc., xi (1929), 231] and in Haseley church, Oxon. is was recorded by Lee in 1574 as Silver on a bend sable cotised gold three molets silver. on a bend sable cotised gold three molets silver. [Harl. Soc., v (1871), 26.] As Sable a bend fusilly silver now used for Lenthall is named on the Burford triptych for Lauton (and by Dingley in Hist. from Marble for Lanton) it seems that neither coat is originally that of Lenthall. Dingley (in Hist. from Marble) sketched two shields in windows at Monkland, near Leominster, in one of which Silver on a bend cotised sable three pierced molets silver impales Sable a bend fusilly silver and in the other shield quarters it as in the shield sketched at Hampton and impales Grey of Codnor (Barry silver and azure). Dingley does not name the coats but his editor, Gough Nichols, describes, p. 105, the shields as Lenthall impaling and quartering Lanton.

WYTHAM.

Page 59. This shield represents William Dormer (son of Michael Dormer (d. 1545), Lord Mayor of London, 1541) of Dorton House, Bucks., and his wife Elizabeth Scriven "daughter and heir of Scriven of Calais." No. 2 should be Silver gutty gules a lion sable. Presumably the craftsman misread his copy. The marriage is closely connected with Bertie for the great-grandson

of the above William Dormer, Robert Dormer (d. 1695) of Dorton House, married Catherine Bertie (d. 1659), daughter of Montagu Bertie, 2nd Earl of Lindsay (d. 1666). [Lee, F. G., Hist. etc. of Prebendal church of Thame (1883), 447, 452, 510; E. A. Greening Lamborn, note to author.]

Page 61. Nos. 16-41.

This shield of 26 quarterings is shown by the pedigree to be not earlier than 1608, when Robert Bertie, 1st Earl of Lindsay, had issue by Elizabeth, daughter of Elizabeth heiress of Sir John Jeffray, nor later than 1653 when their son Montagu had issue by Bridget Wray, heiress of Norreys and added the Norreys quarterings. Since Wytham came to the Berties with her the shield was not here originally nor could it have come from Rycot or Cumnor as other glass is said to have done. It may have been made for Edenham, the Lincolnshire burial place of the Berties, or more probably for their London house. The coat No. 27, in the 12th quarter, is FitzAllan of Bedale whose arms even in Dugdale's time had "for some ages past been attributed to Fitzalan of Clun" (Baronage, I, 54) [and as such quartered by their descendants the Howards, Dukes of Norfolk, etc., and Brownes, Viscounts Montagu] though, as he points out, the two families were from "several originals." But it so happened that the person whose birth is commemorated by this shield actually became entitled to quarter the coat through his marriage with the Norreys' heiress who was descended from FitzAllan of Bedale through Lovel and Grey of Rotherfield. Coat No. 38, the 23rd quarter, probably represents the belief of the Tudor heralds that the wife of the first Baron Welles was the heiress of Engaine, which was held by Doyle and G.E.C. until challenged by Chester Waters (G.E.C., viii, 525). Both Burke "General Armory" and Papworth "Ordinary" ascribe the coat to Graynsby as well as to Engaine; and Graynsby was a Lincolnshire manor acquired by Welles at a very early period (Dugdale, ii, 82). The received accounts of the early descendants of Ufford were also doubted by Chester Waters (Hist. of the Chester family of Chicheley, 1, 244, 253) and Harris Nicolas "Historic Peerage" makes Isabel de Creke die s.p. (Vide Foster, Some Feudal Coats, 115). See also Misc. Gen. et Her., 5th Ser., IX (1935), 48. [Note from E. A. Greening Lamborn to author, 1938.]

FYFIELD.

Page 126. Nos. 1-10. In August 1937, at the charge of the Master and Governors of Christ's Hospital in Abingdon, all the shields on the Golafre tomb were cleaned and the arms of Golafre, Fyfield, De La More and Lovell were repainted on four shields by G. Nutt of Oxford under the supervision of E. A. Greening Lamborn. The arms are given in Ashmole MSS. 850.

Page 137. This glass was inserted in c. 1854. No. 6 is for Cley or Claye Nos. 6 of Criche, Derby. The coheir married Clarke (Burke, Gen. Arm.); the connexion with Sutton is not clear. No. 7 is for Clarke of Shrewsbury; the impalement not yet indentified. (Burke, Gen. Arm.). Nos. 8 & 9 for Gregson quartering Roberts.

The Rev. J. Gregson, Vicar of Sutton Courtenay, resigned 1855 He was a member of the Council of Culham College, 1852; arms in the hall there re-(?)painted:—Gules with bars and molets silver quartering Silver a cheveron azure with molets silver. The workmanship, like the design, of the glass, here in the church, is so bad that most of the tinctures have changed colour and many of the charges have lost their form. [Note from E. A. 

Ashmole (MSS, 850, 137) gives a trick, one of 12 shields in Childrey manor hall, as Per fesse (1) Silver five escutcheons in cross each charged with five roundles silver in cross azure: (2) Sable five crescents in saltire silver, impaling: Fettiplace with a martlet for difference. The dexter side of this shield and this corbel represents Beatrix Pinto (?) (d. 1447), widow of Gilbert, Lord Talbot (d. 1419) and wife of Thomas Fettiplace (d.c. 1442). The tinctures of these arms were given by a great grand-daughter of Sir Francis Wilder who was the son of Peter Bigot Wilder and Elizabeth Connor: he had three sons (the third son Charles being buried at Binfield) and five daughters of whom three married three brothers Pigott). Sir Francis was also Governor of Malta.
