

# A Catalogue of Inclosure Maps in the Berkshire Record Office

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## *Introductory*

IN the *Guide to the Berkshire Record Office* (Berkshire County Council, 1952) Dr. Felix Hull drew attention to the series of inclosure maps and awards enrolled with the Clerk of the Peace, stating that 101 awards were so enrolled and that 95 of these were accompanied by maps.<sup>1</sup> In 1943, Mr. W. E. Tate published his *Handlist* of Berkshire inclosure awards and acts in vol. XLVII of this *Journal*<sup>2</sup> but did not state whether the awards in question were accompanied by maps. A notable piece of pioneer work on Berkshire records, Mr. Tate's list was produced at a time when access to the original records was difficult and unavoidably it contains errors, which a more intimate knowledge of the documents themselves would have prevented. From both these sources, it will be seen that there is available in the Berkshire Record Office, in readily accessible form, a quantity of material for one facet of English economic and social history which few other English counties can rival. The topographer, geographer, students of land utilization and even of cartography also have an interest in this material and it has been thought worth while to publish this list of Berkshire inclosure maps, compiled as part of the routine work of the Record Office, as a further help to those whose researches may lie within fields where inclosure material will be of value.

## *Sources of maps*

The provisions of private inclosure acts and of the General Inclosure Acts, 1801-1845, enjoined enrolment of both awards and maps with either the Clerk of the Peace or in one of the central Courts of Justice in Westminster and another copy was to be deposited amongst the parish records in the custody of the incumbent and churchwardens. As a result, inclosure maps may be found in any of these three places and, in some cases, in private hands when they have strayed from the keeping of the parish authorities. From all these four sources this catalogue has been compiled and it is, as far as the compilers are aware, a complete list of those maps in the Berkshire Record Office. Additions may be made from time to time as other collections are received but these will not be substantial. Those maps deposited with the Clerk of the Peace are denoted by the class mark Q/RDc followed by their serial numeration; those from parish collections by the class mark D/P followed by their serial numeration; and those from private collections by the class mark D/E followed by the identifying letters of the particular collection and then by the catalogue mark assigned them therein. The fourth class are photostats of the maps annexed to awards

enrolled in the central Courts, whose records are now in the Public Record Office in London, or deposited amongst the records of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, also in the Public Record Office. These are distinguished by the class mark T/P (or T/F in the latter case), followed by the identifying letters of the Court concerned and a serial numeration. In this way, users of this catalogue can distinguish the source of any particular map listed.

*Supplementary notes on inclosure awards*

Generally, the existence of a map may be held to denote the existence of an accompanying award and the catalogue mark of the map will serve to identify the award as well. The converse is not, however, true and users of Mr. Tate's list in vol. XLVII of the *Journal* should not assume that the existence of an award indicates the existence of a map. Cross-reference between this *Catalogue* and Mr. Tate's list is, therefore, essential. As a corollary to the compilation of this *Catalogue*, an interleaved copy of Mr. Tate's list has been annotated with such corrections and additions as have come to light and a card index with additional information, notably the areas enclosed and the names of commissioners and, at a later date, valuers, has been instituted and will be kept up to date. Both these are available for consultation in the Berkshire Record Office.

*Other inclosure material available in the Berkshire Record Office*

In view of the large quantity of material which supplements the maps listed here and the awards listed by Mr. Tate, it seems worth while giving an outline of this material so that both *Catalogue* and list may be of maximum utility to users. This supplementary material is generally to be found in collections deposited by private individuals or by solicitors and, unless otherwise stated, it should be understood that the references quoted are to materials in the office and that all are available for consultation by students.

(1) *Inclosure by Chancery decree.* Before the introduction of inclosure by Act of Parliament, it would seem that an official character was given to an inclosure by the issue of a Chancery decree in which the terms of the agreement were recited and given legal cognizance by enrolment in Chancery. The editor of this *Catalogue* is not aware of any study of this procedure and cannot do more than note the existence of four instances in Berkshire. They are at Buscot in 1614<sup>1</sup>; Gt. Coxwell<sup>2</sup> and Shrivenham<sup>3</sup>, 1659; and at Milton, 1661<sup>4</sup>. In the case of Gt. Coxwell and Shrivenham, the decrees of 1659 are supplemented by 18th century materials, which include rough sketch maps of the reputed effects of inclosure in these two parishes<sup>5</sup>.

(2) *Confirmations by Act of Parliament of inclosure by private agreements.* The earliest examples of "Parliamentary" inclosure in Berkshire are of this class. The majority of landowners within a parish or manor agreed amongst themselves to inclose lands, and drew up a formal agreement which was afterwards confirmed by Act of Parliament. Three of the first four Acts quoted by Mr. Tate<sup>1</sup> are of this class and in two of these cases the original agreements are in the Berkshire Record Office, those for Earley, 1743<sup>2</sup>, and Inkpen, 1736<sup>3</sup>.

(3) *Inclosure by private agreement unconfirmed by Act of Parliament.* Before the era of "Parliamentary" inclosure, it was always open to landowners and tenants to agree to inclose common lands, arable, meadow or pasture, or wastes by private agreement for better agriculture and more amicable husbandry, and numerous examples of such inclosures are illustrated from private collections of records. As a supplement to inclosure carried out by Parliamentary procedures at a later date, these earlier inclosures by "private enterprise" are of considerable interest. Unfortunately, few of the agreements are accompanied by maps. Examples of this class are Hadley and Cobindon in Lambourn, 1614<sup>4</sup>; Waltham St. Lawrence, 1596-7<sup>5</sup>; Chaddleshworth, 1635, 1637<sup>6</sup>; Donnington Field in Shaw, 1606<sup>7</sup>; Ashbury 1710, 1758, 1759<sup>8</sup>; Inkpen and Kintbury, 1733-4<sup>9</sup>; Brightwalton, 1721<sup>10</sup>; Weston in Welford, 1727<sup>11</sup>; Marcham, 1714<sup>12</sup>; Blewbury, 1767<sup>13</sup>; Ufton and Padworth, 1803<sup>14</sup>; Aldermaston, 1803, 1808<sup>15</sup>. Other examples will doubtless come to light on further listing of collections already deposited and in collections yet to be received.

(4) *Inclosure Commissioners' Minutes.* These may prove of value in providing additional information on the progress of any particular inclosure, but in the case of late 18th and early 19th century inclosures the detail recorded in the minutes tends to be purely formal and is more often than not recorded, substantively or in abstract, in the recital of an award. They should not, however, be neglected for that reason. Minutes of commissioners of the following inclosures are

to be found in the Berkshire Record Office:— Barkham, 1814-15<sup>1</sup>; Englefield, 1809-15<sup>2</sup>, 1827-29<sup>3</sup>; Letcombe Regis, 1801-07<sup>4</sup>; Longcot, 1796-1800<sup>5</sup>; Newland, 1814-17<sup>6</sup>; Sandhurst, 1815-18<sup>7</sup>; Warfield, 1814-18<sup>8</sup>; and Winnersh, 1814-21<sup>9</sup>.

(5) *Papers of Clerks to Commissioners, of Commissioners or Valuers.* For more detailed information on the procedures and progress of any inclosure, these categories of document, where they have survived, are invaluable and give a clear insight into the workings of "Parliamentary" inclosure. They are usually to be found amongst the papers of firms of solicitors, whose predecessors acted as clerks or commissioners themselves, but their survival rate is not high. Four such groups survive for Berkshire, those for Chipping Lambourn and Blagrove, 1802-07<sup>10</sup>; Englefield, 1809-29<sup>11</sup>; Shinfield (Hartley Dummer, Moor Place and Diddenham), 1846-58<sup>12</sup>; Steventon, 1878-84<sup>13</sup>.

(6) *Inclosures of common land to preserve timber.* Under the Act of 29 Geo. II, c.36, the lord of a manor and his tenants might mutually agree to inclose common land and waste for the better preservation of timber, such agreements being subsequently enrolled with the Clerk of the Peace. In view of the heavily wooded nature of East Berkshire, it is not surprising to find that many such agreements were made and enrolled. These will be found in a class by themselves in the Quarter Sessions records<sup>14</sup> and also in the miscellaneous "Enrolment Books" of the Clerk of the Peace<sup>15</sup>.

### *Conclusion*

One final word of caution might not be without value to users of the list. The inclosure award sets out the new arrangements of land holding and it is this new arrangement which the accompanying map illustrates and not the picture of land holding prior to the inclosure of open or common fields and lands. For this reason, unless there exists a pre-inclosure map showing the division of the fields and lands into strips or other very small units it is difficult indeed to say what the effects of inclosure were on the face of the land.

In publishing this *Catalogue* and prefatory remarks on supplementary material, the purpose is to draw attention to the large bulk of records existing and readily available not only to the student of Berkshire inclosures but also to all those for whom inclosure maps in particular may prove of value in their own special fields of study and, not least, to the wider public. The editor wishes to acknowledge his sincere thanks to his colleagues, Mr. R. F. Dell, B.A., (now Archivist, Leeds Public Libraries) and Mr. W. J. Smith, M.A., on whom the onerous task of compiling the entries fell, a task both have accomplished with vigour, enthusiasm and at times, fortitude. For errors of omission and commission, the editor remains solely responsible.

*Notes on the form of entry*

1. The size of the map is given in inches, vertical measurement first.
2. The surveyor's name and place of residence or business is copied from the map or the award. Where none appears it may be taken that it is not stated and cannot be inferred on the basis of style.
3. It may be assumed that a map is of the whole area of the modern civil parish named in the title unless otherwise stated.
4. All maps show the lands to be enclosed and the boundaries of the allotments; the areas of allotments and the names of allottees are usually stated, but are in any case given in the award.
5. Most maps give the names of owners and areas of existing enclosures; in a few cases (which are specially noted) owners of lands adjacent to the area covered by the map are also named.
6. All maps show public and private roads and footways and (except as otherwise stated) buildings.
7. Maps of areas bordering or spanning the Thames, Kennet, or other rivers usually show secondary channels, backwaters, and islands.
8. Scales, usually stated on the maps in chains to the inch, have been uniformly reduced to inches to the mile.
