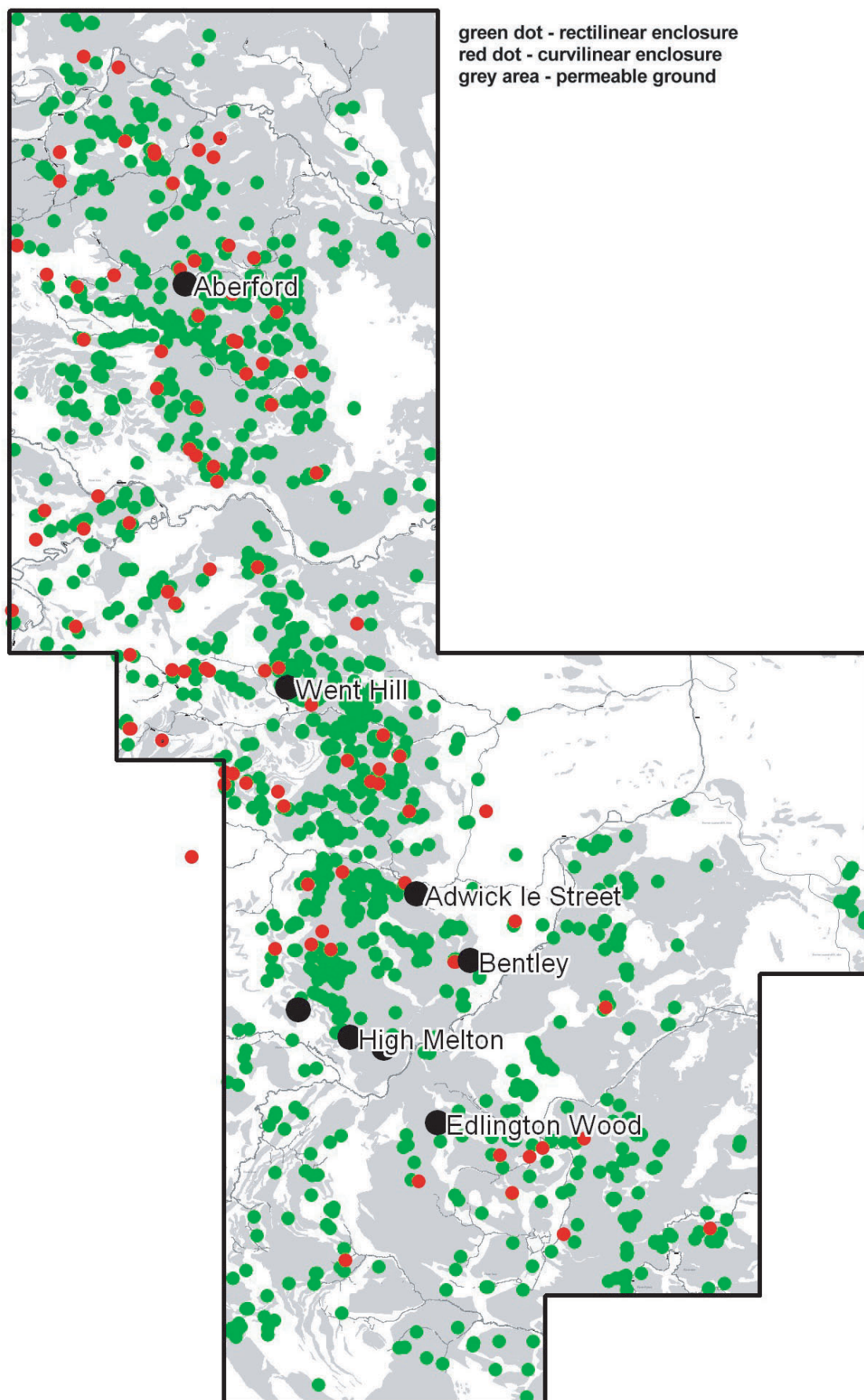


Fig. 6.11. Distribution of rectilinear and curvilinear enclosures

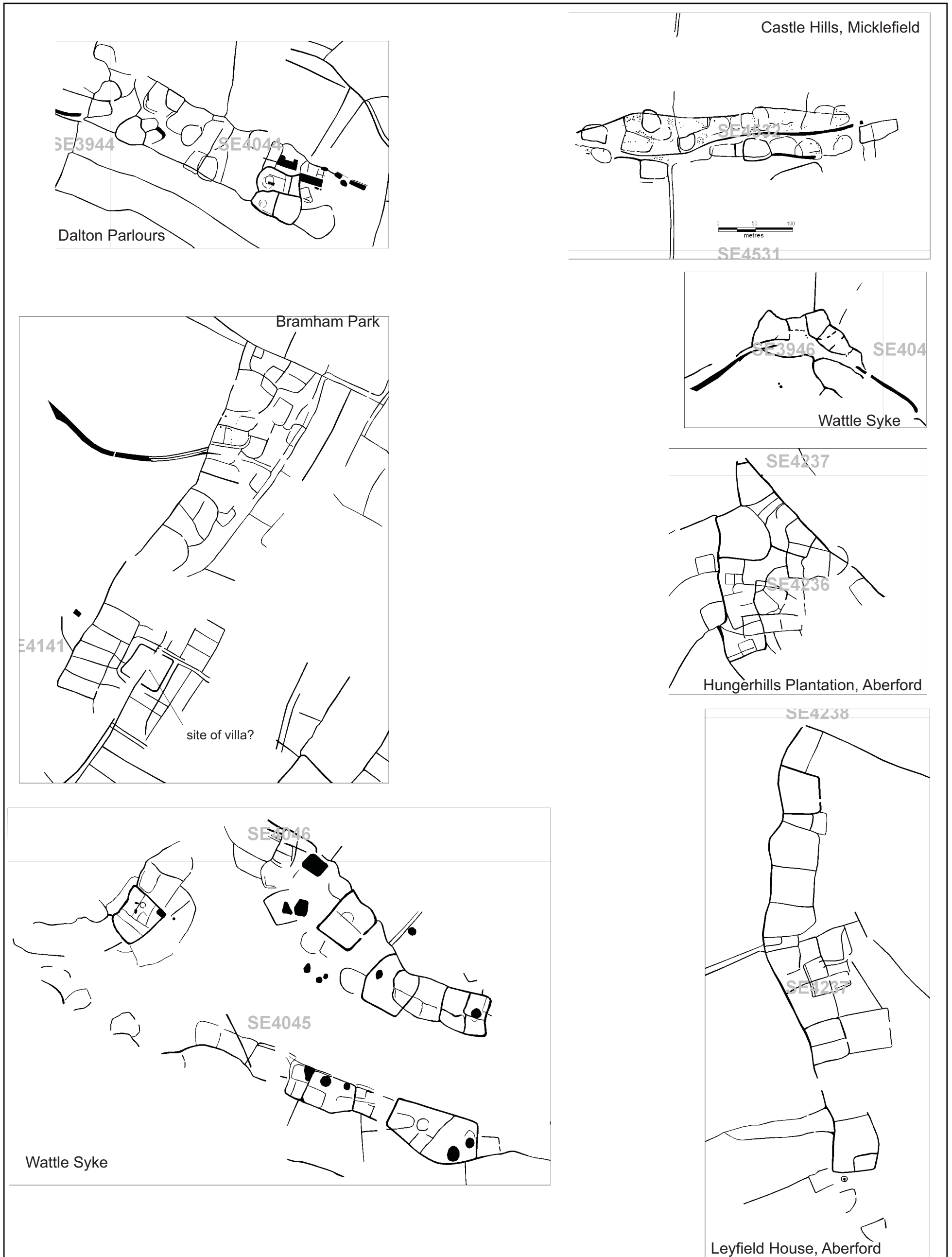


Fig. 6.12. Examples of extensive enclosure groups



Fig. 6.13. Examples of enclosures with trackway entrances



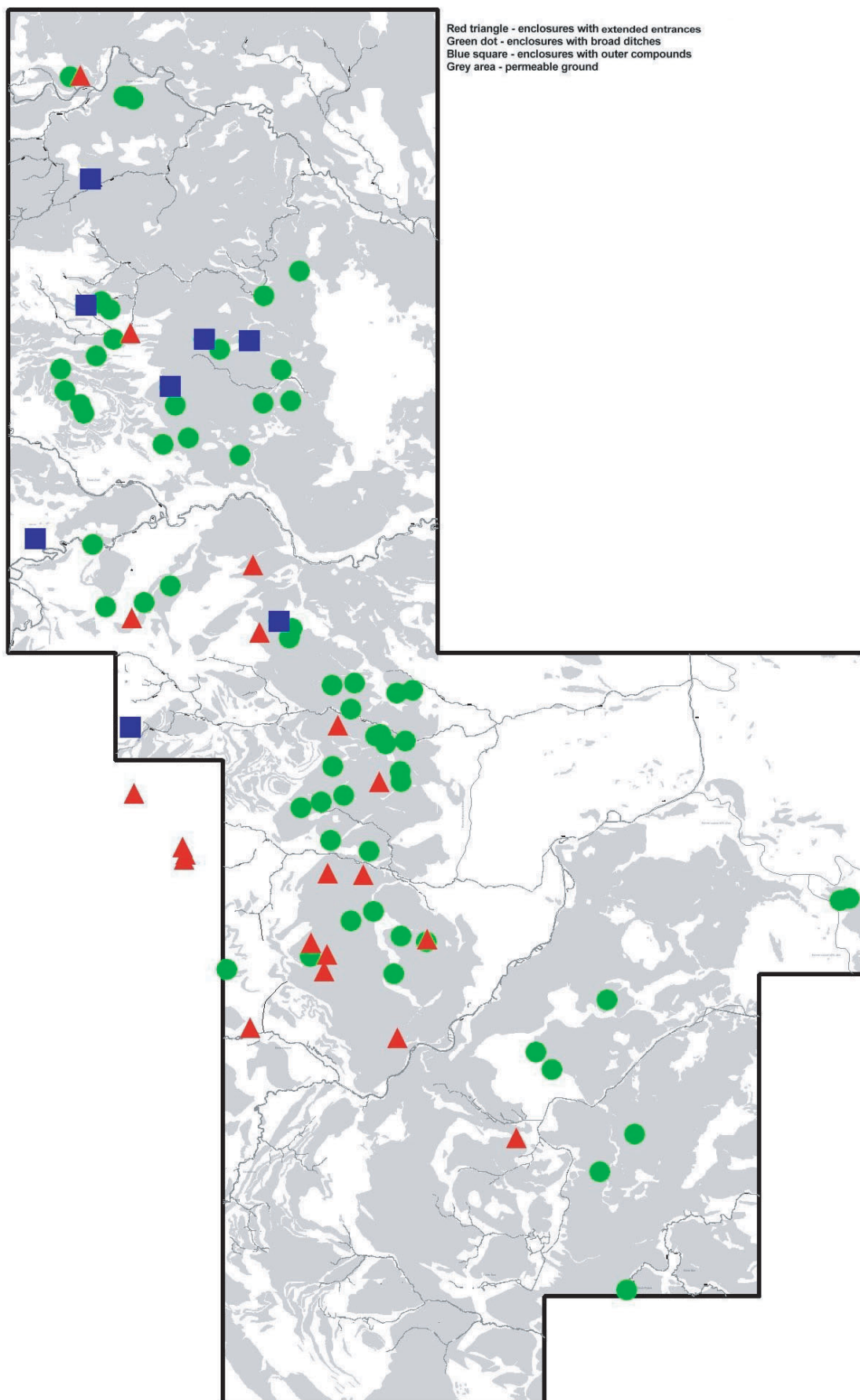


Fig. 6.14. Distribution of different types of enclosures

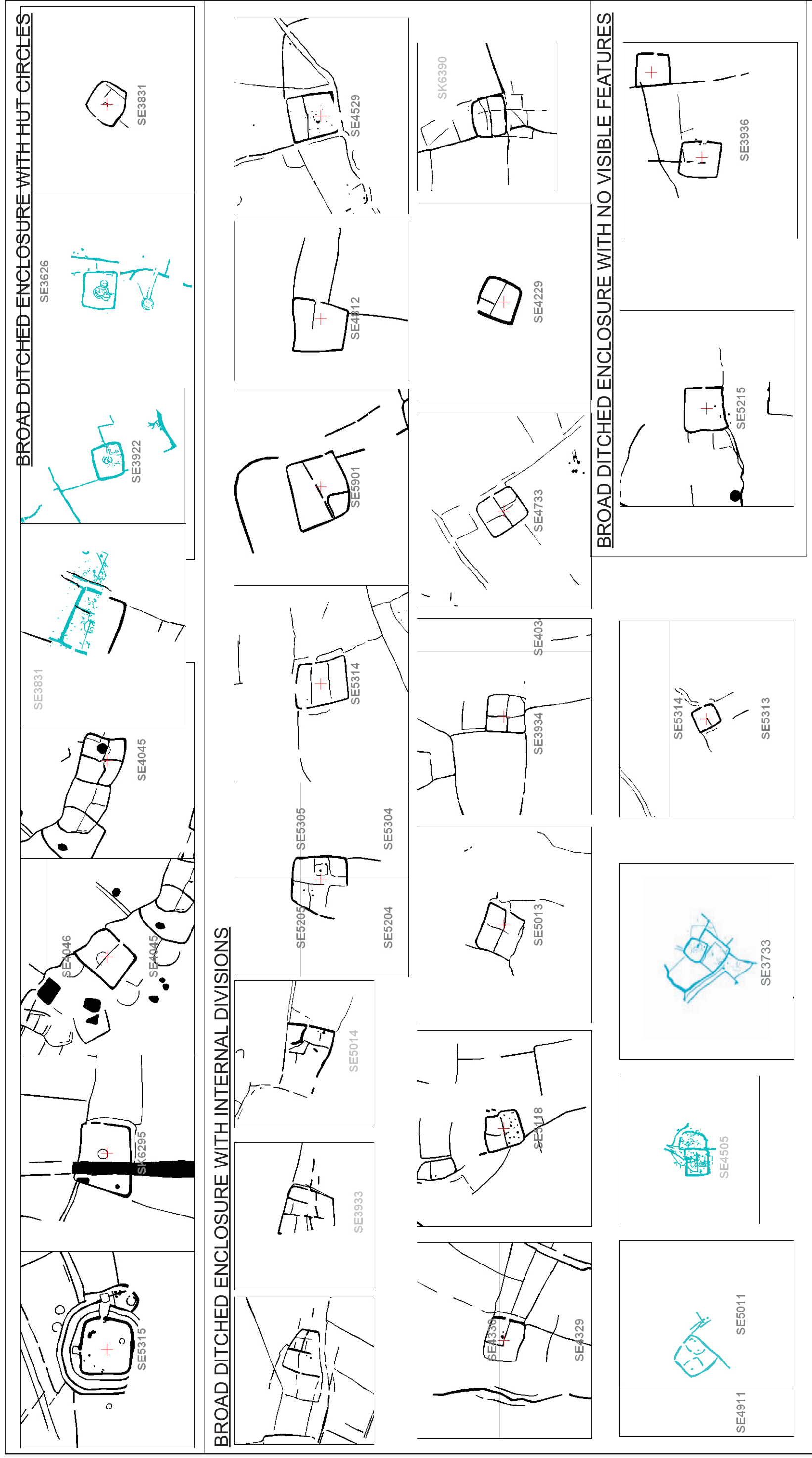


Fig. 6. 15. Examples of broad-ditched enclosures

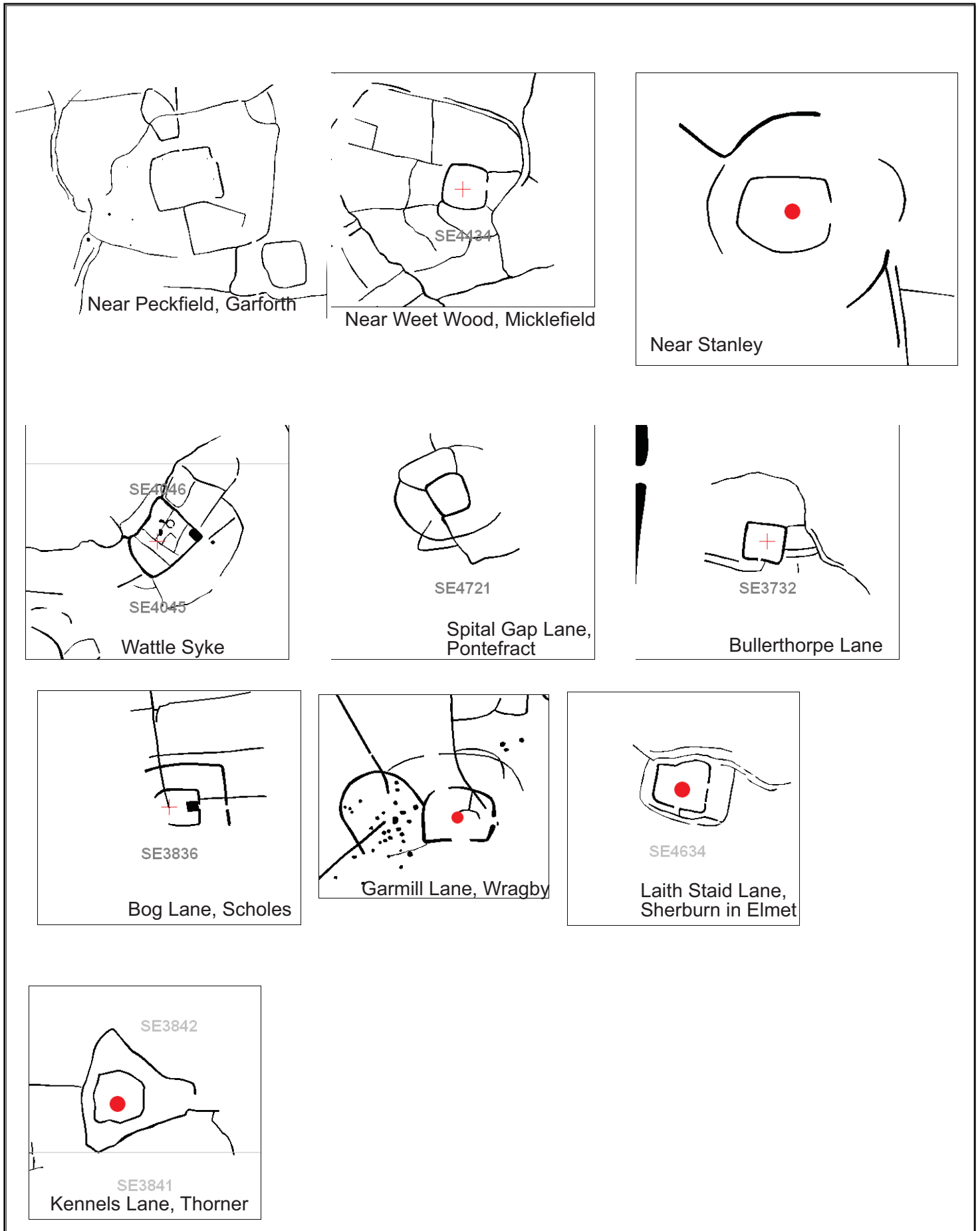
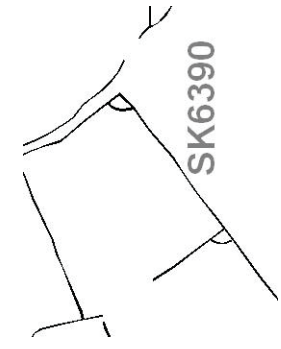
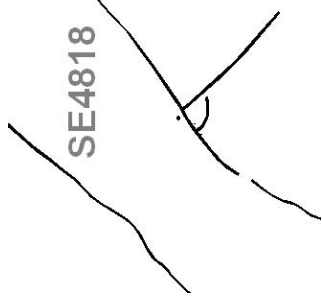


Fig. 6.16. Examples of enclosures with outer compounds

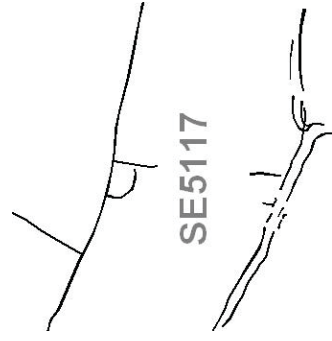

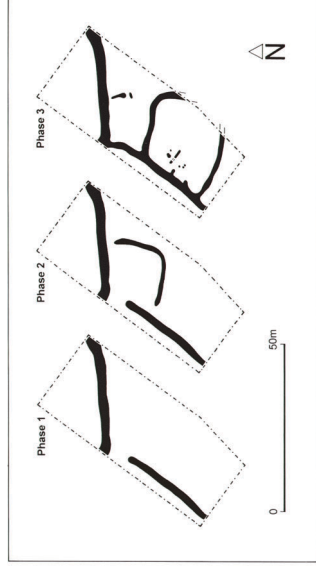

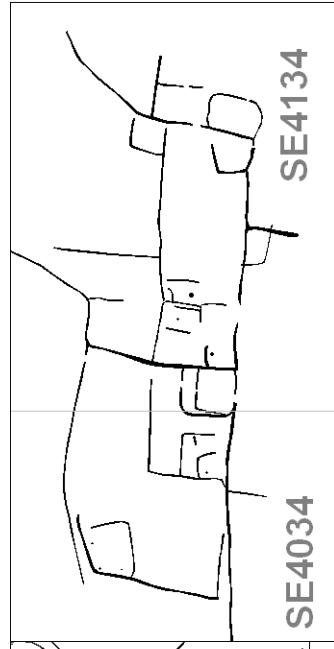
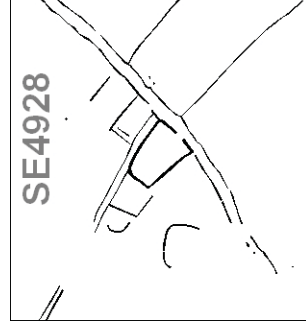
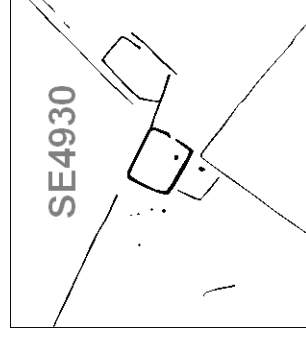
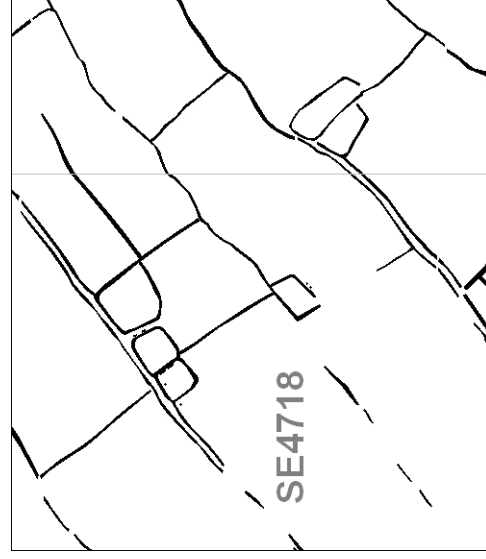
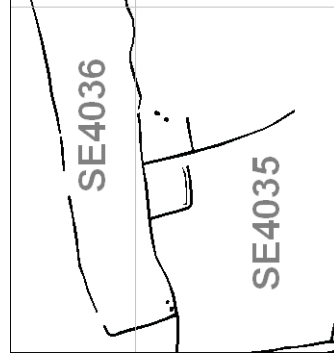
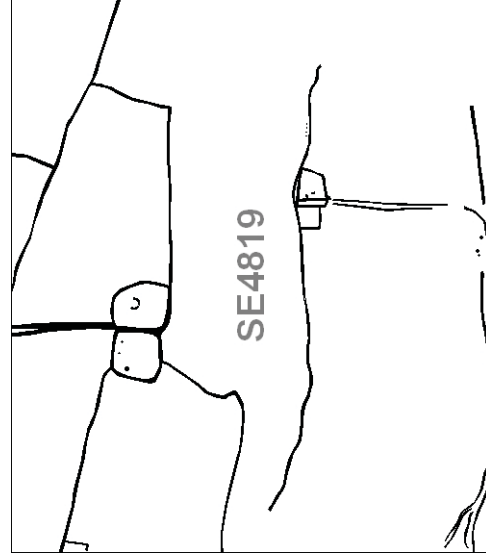
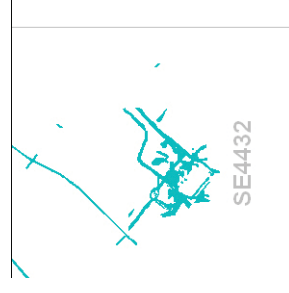
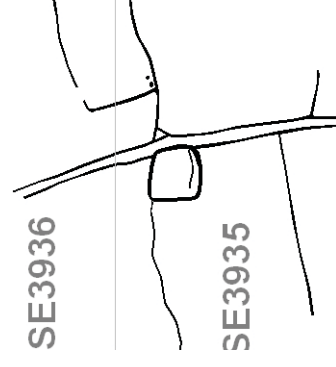
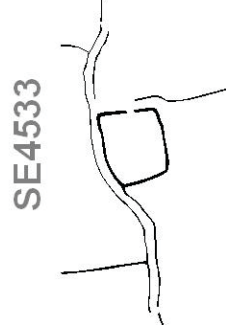
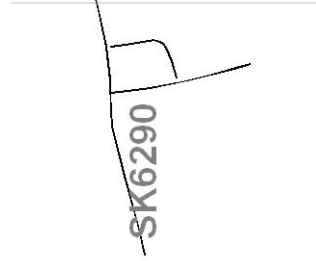
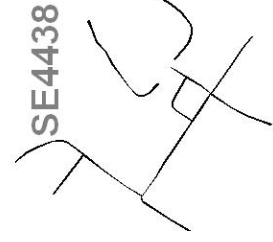
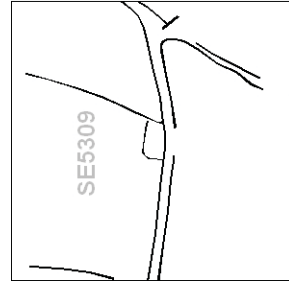
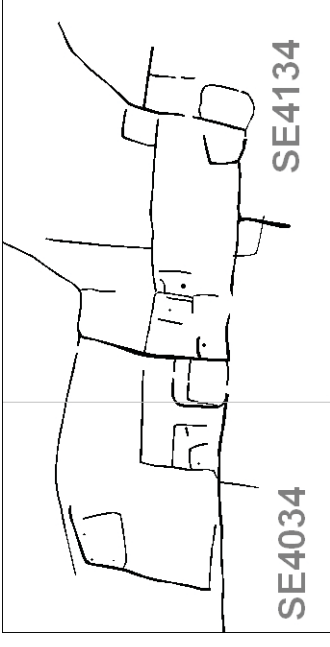
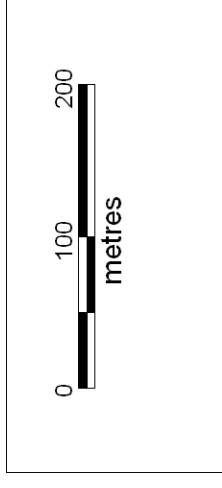
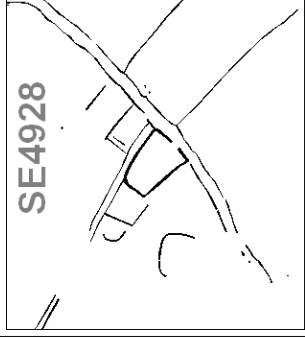
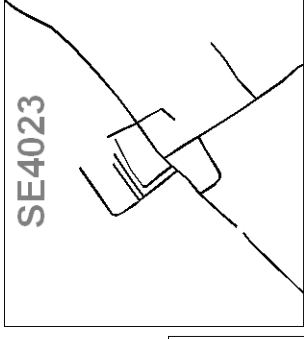
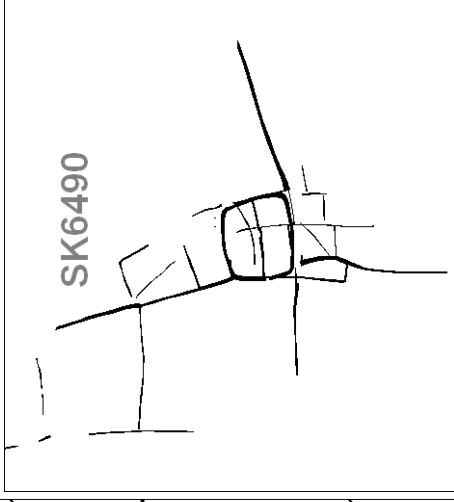
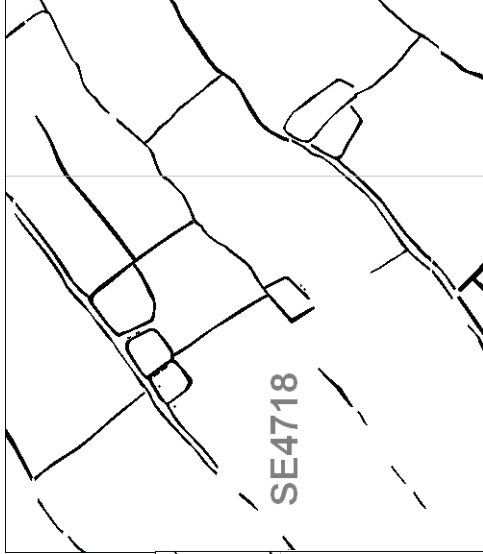
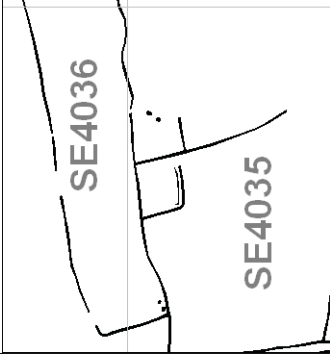
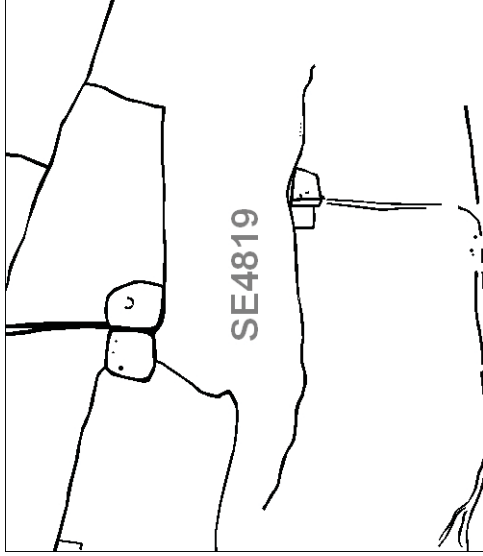


Fig. 6.17. Examples of field corner enclosures

Fig. 6.18. Contexts of field corner enclosures

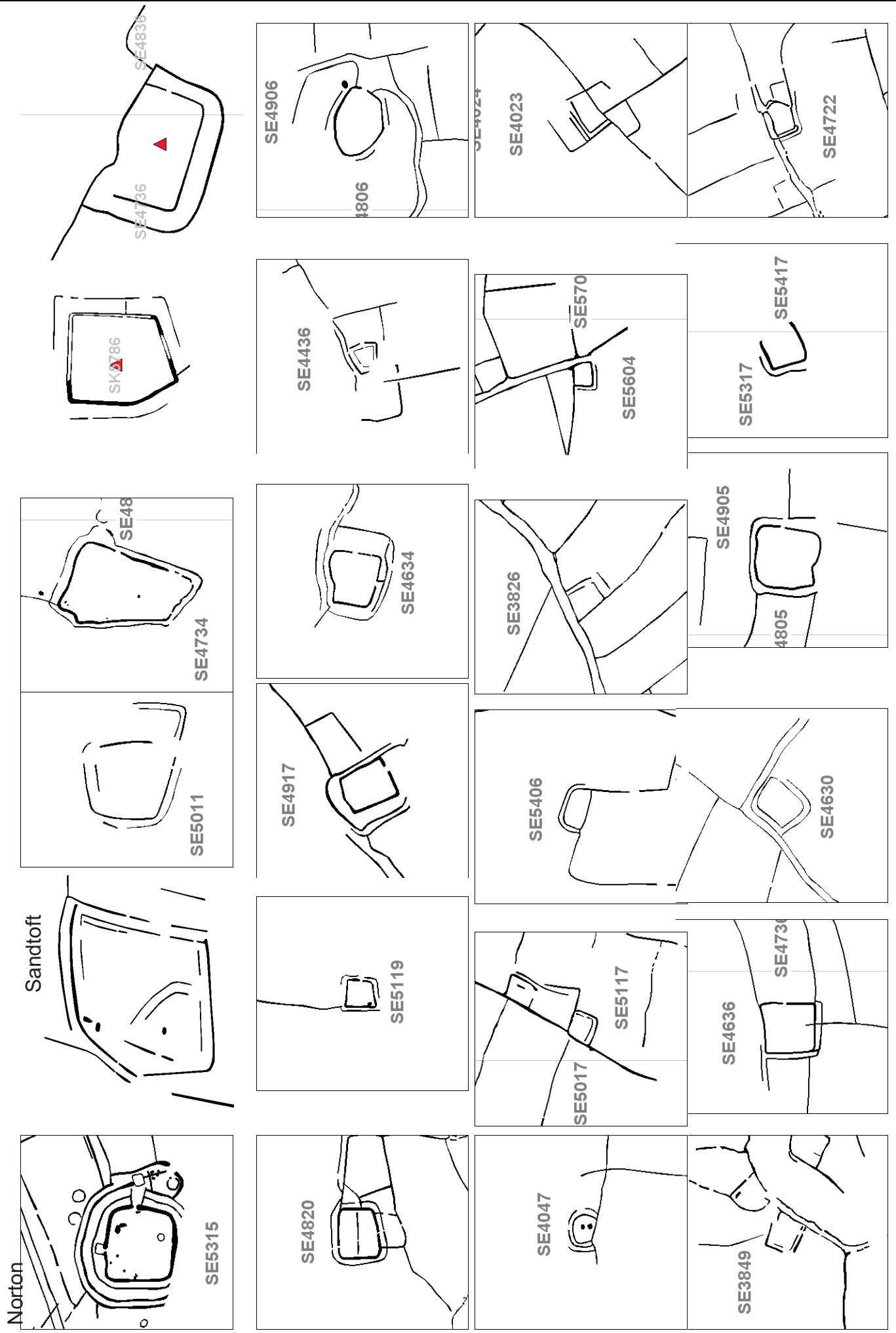


Fig. 6.19. Examples of enclosures with multiple circuits

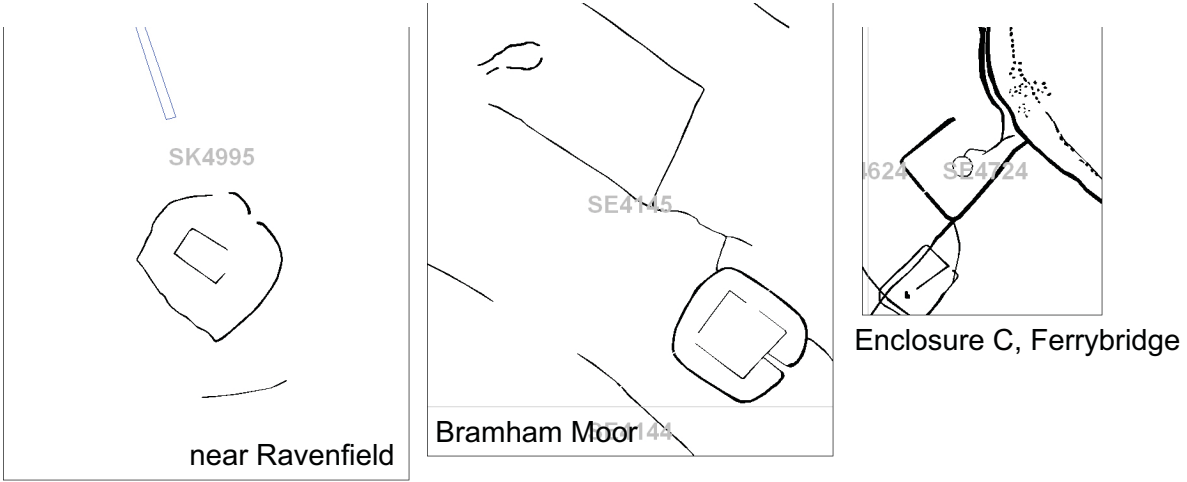


Fig. 6.20. Examples of possible shrines or ritual enclosures

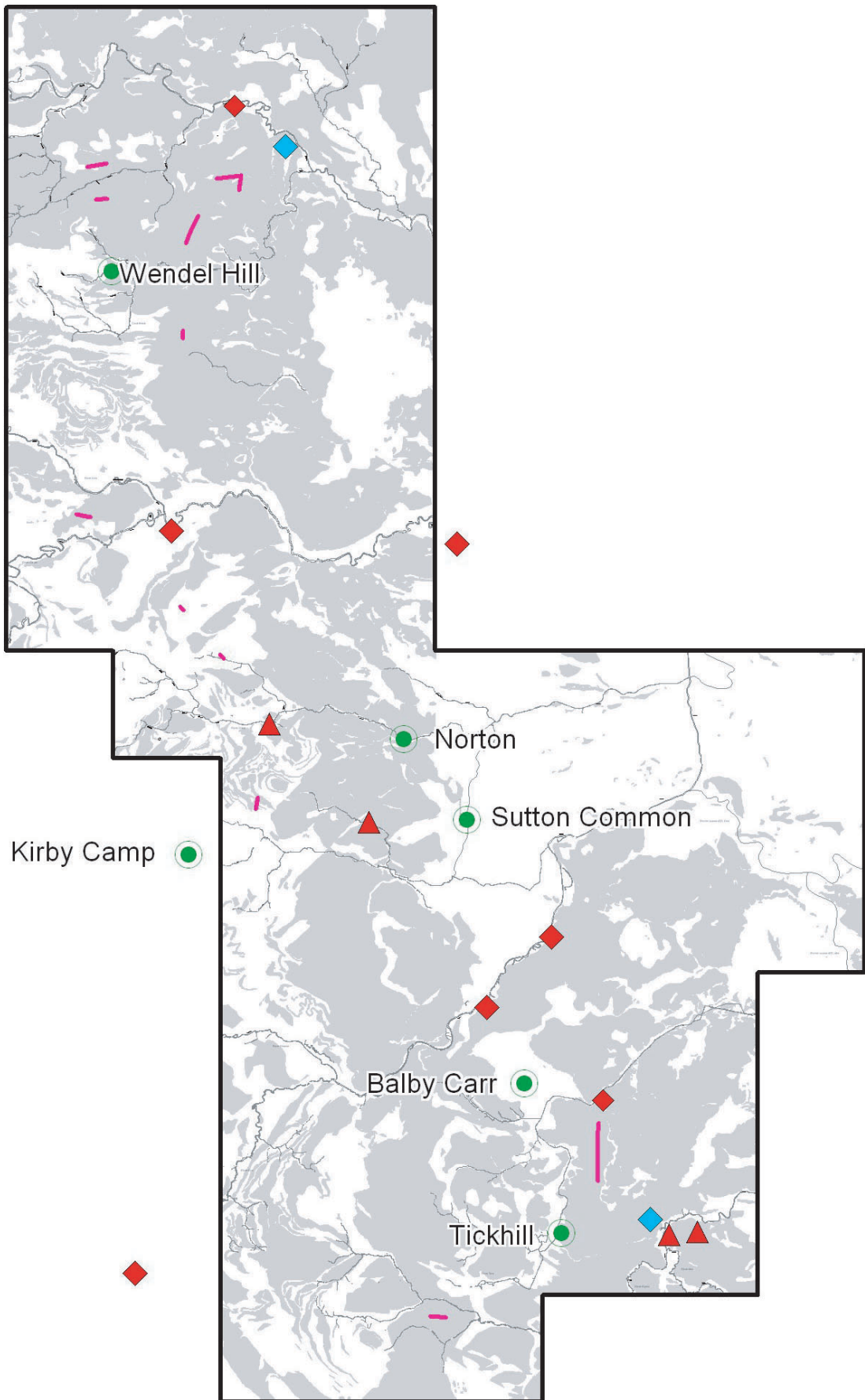


Fig. 6.21. Distribution of Iron Age forts, Roman forts and fortlets and Roman roads

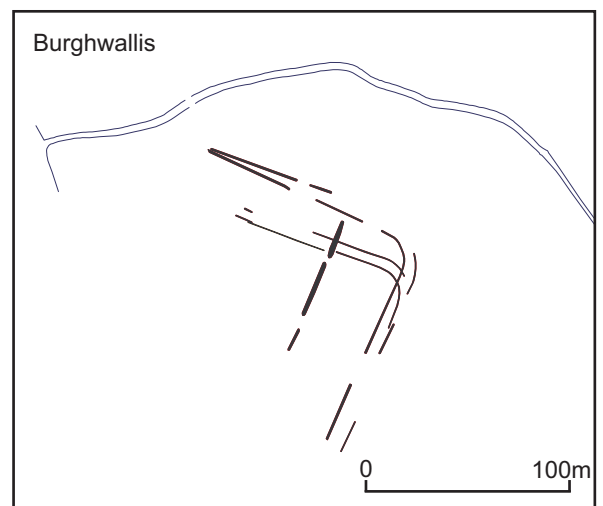
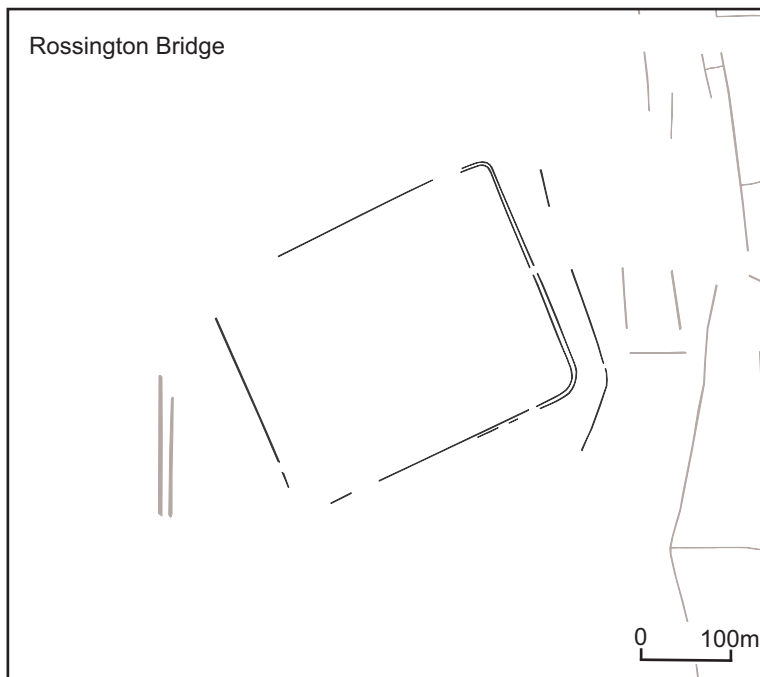
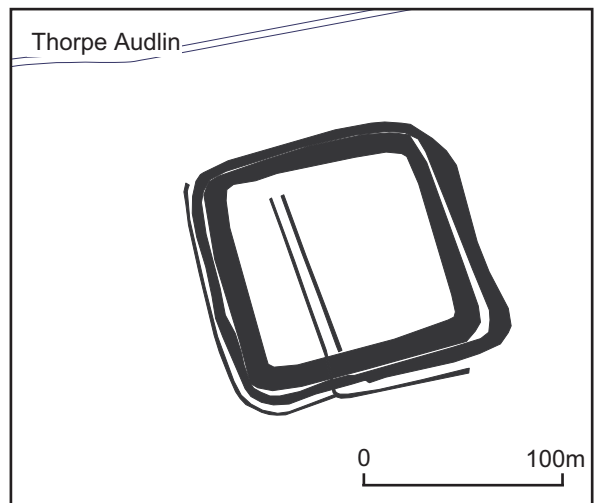
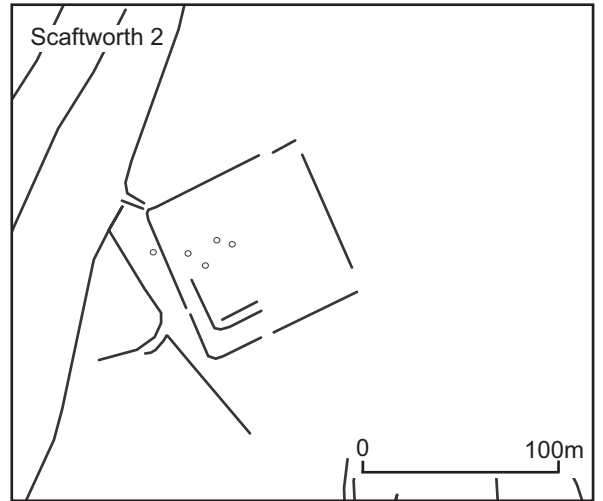
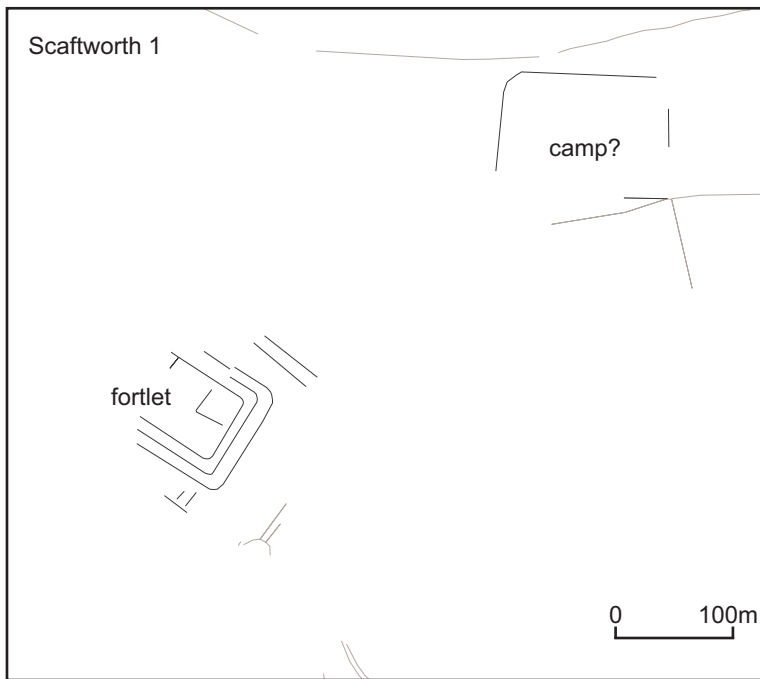
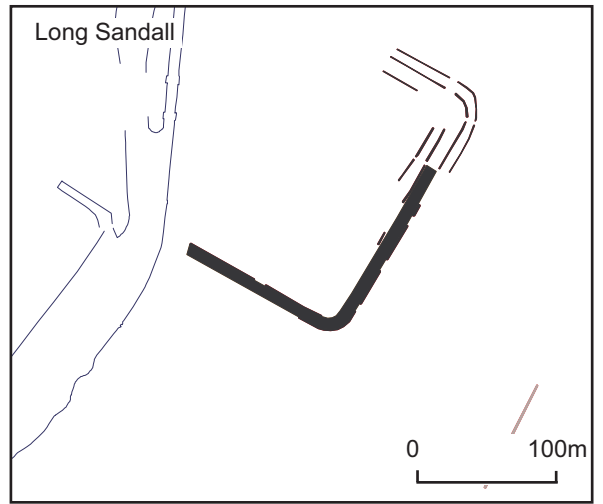
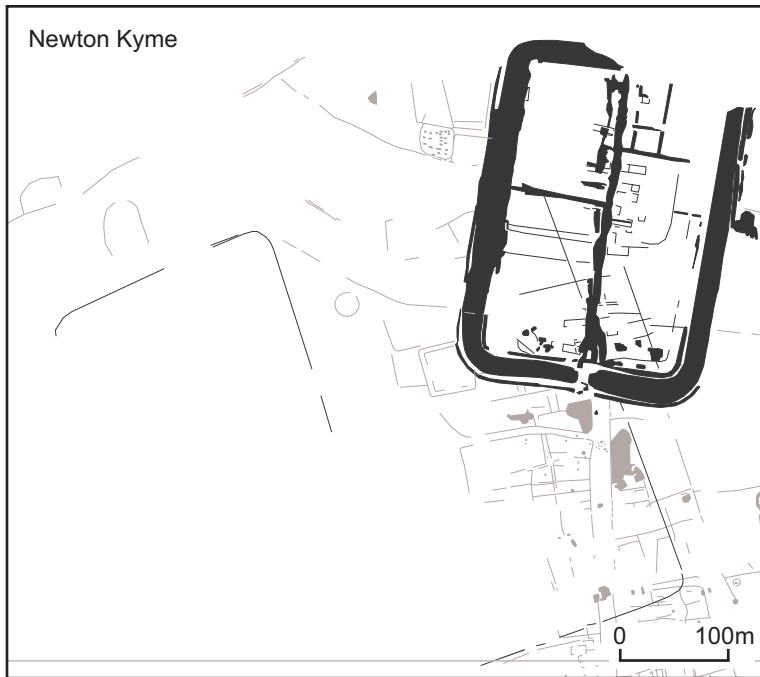


Figure. 6.22. Examples of Roman forts and fortlets
