

ART. I.—*The Diary of Edward Jackson, Vicar of Colton, for the year 1775.* By T. E. CASSON, B.A., B.LITT.

THIS diary is the property of my Aunt, Miss Margaret Ashburner and has been entrusted to me to transcribe. It formerly belonged to my grandfather, Thomas Ashburner, of Pennington, but how it came into his possession, I have no idea. There is a tradition that he used it as a pocket-book for fly-fishing, but there seems to be no sign of this, and it is probably a fable.

Edward Jackson was incumbent of Rusland 1756, vicar of Colton, 1862, and died vicar of Ulverston, 1789. According to the "North Lancashire Magazine" for April, 1897, he contributed a few botanical notes to Withering's "Botanical Arrangement," and also made a Herbarium.

The Diary speaks for itself, and should be intelligible as it stands. I have omitted nothing that I could decipher, except certain hieroglyphics, in the shape of capital letters, which occur notably after the texts on Sundays, and which I have quite failed to fathom. It is hoped that this chronicle may be of interest, as throwing light on clerical activities and social conditions in a country parish and neighbouring market-town in the latter half of the eighteenth century—another (how immeasurably distant!)—

## DIARY FOR THE YEAR 1775.

## January.

1. Matth. ii, 16. "Then Herod when he saw that he was mocked of the wise men, etc." Snow upon the mountains.—Baptized James son of George Topham. Cold. Sleet and frost.

2. At Kendal. bargained with Mr. Shaw. Heavy rain in the P.M. Rain and sleet at night. Sharp'd my horse in the A.M. home at night.

3. Home. Snow all gone in the morning. cloudy day and some showers. Begun a sermon.

4. Home. wrote part of a sermon. Din'd with Mr. Roper. Playing at cards there in the evening.

5. Went to U'ston. Fire in the playhouse\* there—Concert at Toby's—Mr. Machell's U'ston all night. showery.

6. At U'ston.—Din'd with Mr. John Jackson and spent the ev<sup>s</sup> with him. Heavy rain at night. won above 7<sup>s</sup> at whist.

7. Came from U'ston. Wrote to Jo. Seddon an acc<sup>t</sup> of my two purchases.—finished a sermon.

8. "But why dost thou judge thy brother, etc."†. fine pleasant day. Home at night. Din'd with Matty.

9. Din'd with Mr. Postlethw<sup>te</sup>. Carding. Home about 12.—lost 10½<sup>d</sup> at Bragg.—Showers.

10. Went in the forenoon to give pr. Bapt. to a child of John Croasdell's. Begun a sermon. cloudy and showers. (Anne.)

11. Rain all the day. Home. finished a sermon, and begun another. 2 quires of fancy paper yesterday from the mill.
