

### XIII.—THE PIPE ROLLS OF EDWARD I.

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*(Continued from Vol. XXXII, p. 340.)*

In the first article of this series the Northumberland Account on the Pipe Roll for 13 Edward I was translated and printed in full. Many of the Debts enrolled on the Pipe Rolls, especially the small Farms and Rents, occur virtually unchanged from year to year; it would therefore be very uneconomical to print the full text for each year. Mr. C. A. F. Meekings, of the Public Record Office, suggested that a Calendar of 5 or 10 year periods might be the solution; such a Calendar had been suggested for the whole of England in a prospectus issued by the Public Record Office in 1949, but it has not been proceeded with. It has therefore been decided to calendar the Northumberland Accounts covering the period 14 to 26 Edward I.

The Northumberland Account was not audited each year; consequently in some Pipe Rolls there is no Northumberland Account while in others the Account covers two years. The Accounts in the Pipe Rolls for 14, 15, 16, 19, 22, 25 and 26 Edward I are each for one year; the Accounts in the Pipe Rolls for 18, 21 and 24 Edward I are each for two years, 17-18, 20-21 and 23-24 Edward I respectively. The method of calendaring the Rolls which has been followed in the present case is based on the Public Record Office proposals, but is of course entirely unofficial.

The entries in the Rolls are of five types: (1) the County Farms; (2) other Farms by the Sheriff or Individuals; (3) Debts owed by Individual Debtors including ex-Sheriffs; (4) Debts of Individuals finally accounted for by the Sheriff and

(5) Debts not separately entered on the Pipe Roll accounted for by the Sheriff. There are three County Farms, the Farm proper, the Profits and the Increase; these are given in full each year as the details vary. Some of the other Farms, such as the Farm of Newcastle when it was in the King's hands during the *Quo Warranto* proceedings, are also repeated in full each year. Others, such as the small Farms at the beginning of the Accounts, are only given once, all the variations which occur in them in subsequent years being given below each item under the heading 'Account'; a similar procedure is adopted for Debts of types (3), (4) and (5). Besides the great saving in space which this method achieves the subsequent history of each item for the period can be seen at a glance. For convenience each Debt or group of Debts is numbered, the numbers being used in subsequent Accounts in the Calendar to show the position of each entry.

Instead of the regnal year the year of grace of the end of each accounting period has been used throughout. Thus the Account for 14 Edward I, which ran from Michaelmas 1285 to Michaelmas 1286 has been called '1286' and so on; the Accounts for two years, mentioned above, are thus those referred to as '1290', '1293' and '1296'.

The Sheriffs for the period were as follows:

THOMAS DE DYVELSTON (Dilston), until Easter 1288.

RICHARD KNOUT, from Easter 1288 until his death about December 1291; his widow, EVA DE BOLTEBY, accounted for the financial year 1291 and the first quarter (ending Christmas 1291) of the financial year 1292.

HUGH GOBIUN, appointed 2 Jan. 1292, accounted for the rest of the year 1292 and until the first half (ending Easter 1296) of the year 1296.

SIR JOHN DE KIRKEBY, appointed 11 March 1296, accounted for the rest of the year 1296 and for the whole of 1297.

ROBERT DE BALLIOL, appointed 14 Oct. 1297, accounted for the years 1298 and 1299.

Where necessary the individual Sheriffs have been referred to by their Christian names.

The 'f' in the margin of some entries stands for 'farm'; the 'p' in the margin of numbers 39, 41 and 45 refers to partial payments in the following year, the Roll for 14 Edward I being used to make up the Roll for 15 Edward I. The use of the letter 'T' has been referred to in the previous article, a development of the same system is shown by number 27, to save writing the outstanding debts again and again in the Pipe Roll, the Rolls of Amercements or Estreats had their left hand margins annotated. The first year the debts paid were marked with a 'T' as explained previously, the outstanding debts were, at the same time, marked with a 'D', the following year these outstanding debts were treated in a similar manner, those paid being marked with a 'T' in front of the 'D' and those still outstanding being marked with a dot and so on for succeeding years. Thus debts paid the first year were referred to as debts marked with letter 'T', for the second year as debts marked letter 'T' letter 'D', for the third year as debts marked letter 'T' letter 'D' with one dot and for the fourth year as debts marked letter 'T' letter 'D' with two dots.
