## Finds from Richmond Priory (Site RGF:98)

The non-ceramic finds from Richmond Priory are consistent with its function as a medieval priory. The jeton was used for accounting and the decorated window glass would have come from one of the windows of the church or one of the other main structures. The other glass fragments are of post-medieval and early modern date.

## Coins

SF 5 S.13-S.12 West End. X-Ray RGF:98.1.1999 Jeton. 26mm diameter. X-Radiography reveals that detail is well-preserved on both sides of the piece, although in its uncleaned state it is not possible to see anything at all. Nevertheless, the X-Ray suggests that the piece has a shield on the obverse and a quadrilobe on the reverse. This suggests that it is a French jeton of the later 14<sup>th</sup> or 15<sup>th</sup> century. However the precise identification would require investigative conservation.

## Glass

**SF10.** Wall 30. Roughly oval fragment of window glass with two red painted lines. Part of a decorative pane, broken at either end but retaining original grozed shape on longer sides.

**SF11 Context 34.** Neck of moulded bottle in apple green glass. Probably 19<sup>th</sup> century.

**SF13 S.13-S.12.** Base of wine bottle. Possible of 'onion' form (dating c.1680-c.1720) or, more probably, 'mallet' form (dating c.1700-c.1760).
