

The non-pottery finds from the Gilwern to Hafodyrynys Pipeline (GIH02)

The non-pottery finds from the Gilwern to Hafodyrynys pipeline were submitted for identification and assessment (Site Code: GIH02). They consist of ceramic building material, copper alloy artefacts, iron artefacts, plaster, glassware and stone artefacts.

A total of 296 fragments were submitted, representing no more than 201 objects and weighing 18.328 Kg.

Description

Ceramic Building Material

Eight fragments of ceramic building material were recovered. All are likely to be of early modern date and, within that period, probably all date to the later 19th or 20th centuries.

Flat roof tiles

Three fragments of flat roof tile were recovered from plot 3A/17 (303). All have the same red sandy fabric and are probably all from the same roof. One fragment has a semicircular gully moulded into it, interpreted as a gutter constructed into the tile. These tiles are probably 20th-century.

Bricks

Four bricks were collected.

Two come from site 12/64. These bricks have a mixed red-firing fabric and are both made in double-frogged moulds which include the name EBWR VALE. The bricks were made in different moulds however. They are likely to be of 20th-century date.

Two bricks were recovered from site 11/118. These are both frogged bricks of Coal Measures Whiteware. They probably date to the late 19th/early 20th century. White bricks of this type were used mainly as decorative features, such as coursing or to surround windows and doors. Their location on the site suggests that one had been reused as paving (context 1135). The other is a small chip found in the yard area.

Wall tiles

A fragment of a white-bodied moulded wall tile was found at site 3A/17 (303). The tile has a light brown glaze and may have been used in a washroom, kitchen or perhaps in an agricultural outbuilding such as a milking parlour.

Copper alloy

Two copper alloy artefacts were recovered from site 11/118 (1139). They are a plain button with loop attachment and white metal plating and part of an appliance, consisting of a tube with a long oval slot in the side to introduce air and a distributor at the top. It appears to be part of a lamp or stove fuelled by paraffin. It is probably of late 19th or early 20th century date. The glass cover of such a lamp was found spread through contexts 1132, 1134 and 1152, all in the area of the outhouse.

Glass

Two hundred and twenty-eight fragments of glass were recovered, from five separate sites and representing no more than 161 vessels.

3A/17

Three groups of glass were recovered, all of late 19th or 20th century date.

That from context 3005 includes light green and dark green window glass and moulded vessels, probably jars, in clear and light green glass. The dark green window glass may have been used decoratively, for example in a panel in a door or window.

That from context 302 also includes a fragment of light green window glass, a light green Codd bottle, a clear meat paste jar with moulded decoration and a brown beer bottle, moulded 'MACLE' and '...N' around the bottom of the bottle and 'K22' 'C 14 UGB' on the base. The vessel is probably from a Macclesfield, Cheshire, brewery.

The assemblage from context 303 consists solely of vessel glass (Table 1). The identifications and suggested dating of these pieces is the work of Dave Marshall, LAS, who would date the assemblage to the 1940s. It is notable that much of the glassware contained nationally-marketed products with only two vessels having clear Welsh origins, 303/08 from Brynmawr and 303/14 from Cardiff and even in these cases the glass itself was manufactured in England. Crosswells Cardiff Brewery Ltd ran from 1897 to 1977 (<http://www.genuki.org.uk/big/wal/GLA/Cardiff/business.html>). Shippams paste (303/11) was manufactured in Chichester from 1892 onwards (<http://www.geocities.com/localhistories/chichester.html>). Pond's vanishing cream was initially an American product, manufactured first in the 1910s but the base of the jar from this site (303/17) states that it was made in England and a date in the 1940s is likely.

10/57

Eight moulded bottles of late 19th/20th century type. They include fragments of two Codd bottles in a light green glass as well as light pink and dark green vessels.

11/58

One fragment of clear bottle glass. Probably late 19th or 20th century.

11/118

One hundred and ninety-four fragments of glass were recovered from site 11/118. They represent no more than 130 vessels.

Only a small fraction of this glass might be earlier than the late 19th century. This consists of 15 fragments of thin light green window glass (which D Marshall, alternatively, suggests from their thickness might be picture glass), all of which came from context 1139 and 10 fragments from 6 tall dark green bottles, all of which appear to be hand blown and marvered rather than blown into a mould. These come from several contexts including, again, 5 fragments from a single vessel from context 1139. A brown glass bottle from the same context was identified as being of an early 19th-century type. In every case these potentially early pieces occur alongside late 19th or early 20th-century pieces.

The remainder of the assemblage consists mainly of mould-blown bottles and jars many of which are of distinctive forms or include moulded details which allow their original contents to be ascertained. Table 2 summarises this information for the three main areas of the site: the main building (1103), the area to the north, where most finds come from the midden, 1139, located just outside the north door (area 1115) and the yard and outbuildings to the west (1130). Thirteen of the vessels in that area come from an area of ashes which are presumably rakings from the fire within the main structure.

The glassware found within the building, 1103, is more fragmentary than that from the two other areas, where the fragmentation of the material is similar (average fragment weights of 11.7gm, 27.7gm and 27.1gm respectively). This suggests that rubbish disposal was limited to the midden and yard areas and that the finds from building were either lost during the life of the building, incorporated into the structure or, in the case of the metal polish jar, for example, probably left in the building when it was abandoned.

As can be seen from Table 2 there is no obvious difference between the activities represented in the finds from the yard and those from the midden. The three 'lighting' items from the yard are groups of fragments from a single paraffin lamp with a crimson cover. Such an item would undoubtedly have been used in the main building and was decorative as well as functional.

The glassware indicates a range of domestic activities taking place in the complex in addition to eating (mainly preserves such as jam, pickles and sauses) and drinking (which included wine, beer, mineral water, soft drinks such as ginger beer and lemonade and spirits). They indicate that someone in the household could write (an ink bottle), that they had at least one picture on the walls and that they had at least one piece of ornamental glass, moulded in imitation of cut glass. This is likely to have been a sugar bowl (and relates to the strong evidence from the pottery for the drinking of tea).

Several of the vessels are of probable late 19th century date. These include two moulded beer bottles from context 1039 and a moulded beer bottle, a sauce bottle marked 'Shaw's Patent', a Lea and Perrins sauce bottle and a medicine bottle, all from the yard area.

Early 20th-century vessels were restricted to two contexts, 1139 and 1134. Both produced fragments of Abercarn mineral water bottles whilst the midden (1139) also produced a chemist's bottle.

Iron

7/13

A group of 11 iron objects was recovered from context 702. They have the appearance of being associated with heavy machinery or agricultural equipment (such as a tractor). There are 5 unidentified objects, 2 washers, 2 nails and 2 bolts. As a group the material is probably late 19th or 20th century.

3A/17

A large cast iron object with a circular hole at one end is interpreted as being either a door knocker or part of a piece of machinery (finds number 3011). An iron rod was recovered from the 20th-century rubbish dump, context 303.

11/118

Twenty four fragments of iron were recovered from site 11/118. They come from 10 objects.

From the site of the main building, a brown enamelled kettle was recovered from the rubble in the fireplace and was clearly in use at the time the building was abandoned. A circular ring with spike for attaching to a wall was found in context 1114 along with a cleat from the heel of a shoe or boot.

The midden, 1139, produced a tinned can base which appeared to come from a rectangular tin such as that used for corned beef. The tapering corned beef tin was invented in America in the 1870s and was standard rations in the British army by the time of the Boer war. At what point it entered the civilian diet in south Wales is not known.

The deposits around the northern outhouse produced three iron objects: a bolt, a binding strip and a nail.

Finally, the yard area produced a pintle, used to hang a door or gate, and another tin can (context 1134).

It is probably significant that the two tinned cans come from deposits containing early 20th-century glassware. The enamelled kettle, similarly, is of early 20th-century date from its context. The remaining items are only broadly datable from their context.

Plaster

11/118

Two fragments of wall plaster were recovered from site 11/118, both from deposits associated with the main structure. Both indicate that the walls were made of irregular stone rubble and that the internal surface of the building had a rough white plaster skim.

Stone

5/24

A fragment of unworked Coal Measures sandstone was recovered from site 5/24.

11/118

A large irregular fragment of Coal Measures sandstone, having the fossil of a large fern on one side, was recovered from context 1137, the collapse of the south wall, and is presumably part of the wall structure.

A fragment of micaceous sandstone from context 1114 appears to be burnt and might have been used in the fireplace or be part of a flagged stone floor.

Two small fragments of slate (probably north Devon) were recovered, from contexts 1134 and 1139. They indicate that either the outbuildings or the main building probably had a slate roof. The lack of larger pieces must therefore indicate the wholesale removal of the roof slates for reuse elsewhere.

Finally, a fragment of burnt Coal Measures shale from context 1138, the fireplace, indicates the use of coal on the fire.

Discussion

Most of the non-pottery finds from Gilwern to Hafodyrnis pipeline are of early modern date, like the pottery. They include two particularly interesting assemblages, from 3A/17 and 11/118. The former appears to be of mid 20th century date, and from a study of the glassware D Marshall suggests a 1940s date. The latter comes from a site which was clearly occupied for much of the 19th century but where most of the finds are of late 19th and early 20th century date. The finds allow us to reconstruct life in the complex in some detail and if the property could be identified in a study of the documentary sources it would make a valuable contribution to social history. Certainly, the sheer quantity of the material

culture present in this small complex is remarkable, as is the evidence for the reliance on the market to supply food, drink and most other goods. This is probably consistent with the male householder earning a wage, for example in the nearby quarry or coal mines, rather than farming. The assemblage is remarkable not only for what is present but for what was absent. There is no evidence for children, for example. The study of the pottery indicated a lack of vessels associated with cooking and food preparation. Presumably the cooking vessels were made of metal and have not survived, perhaps being taken away from the site on its abandonment for reuse elsewhere. There is still, however, a lack of mixing bowls and the general range of containers used for storage and preparation of food. The main pottery vessels of this sort were those used to sell jars, marmalades and, apparently, lard (J Young pers comm.). The glassware adds to the range of products consumed on the site but again these were mostly sauces and preserves, as well as a range of drinks. Towards the end of the life of the building tinned meat was being eaten. All of these features combine to suggest a household which was reliant on others to produce most of their food (there is no evidence for baking or roasting, for example, and presumably this indicates the lack of an oven). This is probably a sign of poverty. Despite this, there is clear evidence for the use of pottery and glass for display (a pottery figurine and the glass lamp and imitation cut glass bowl). As a whole, therefore, the finds suggest a poor late 19th/early 20th century household keeping up appearances.
