Assessment of the Pottery from Goodenough's Bakery, Castleford, West Yorkshire (OSA06 WB39)

A small assemblage of pottery was recovered from Goodenough's Bakery, Castleford, West Yorkshire, during an archaeological watching brief carried out by On-Site Archaeology Ltd (Site Code: OSA06 WB39). The finds consist of a group of Roman pottery including several substantial vessel fragments, dating to the early 2nd to early 3rd centuries.

Description

Pottery

Twenty-one fragments of Roman pottery, representing no more than 17 vessels and weighing in total 3.962 Kg, were recorded using the classification used at York by Monaghan (Monaghan 1997).

The wares present are mainly typical of pottery from Romanised settlements in the north of England with a number of vessels imported from other provinces (AP25, S0) or other parts of Britannia (e.g. B1, M15 and P8). The imports include sherds from a globular amphora with a stamp on the handle (Fig 1).

Dr P Tyers comments that the stamp is known from Germany, Mainz and Rottweil, and that Callendar 1176 is probably the same although it is an old CIL record with no drawing of the stamp.

Drawings of both the Mainz and Rottweill stamps are present in the CEIPAC database maintained by the University of Barcelona (<u>http://ceipac.gh.ub.es/</u>).



Observations: -

The Dorset Black Burnished vessel is an everted rimmed jar of mid 2nd to 3rd-century type (Gillam 1957, 132-3) and it is this vessel which provided a terminus post quem for the assemblage.

The vessel forms represented in the assemblage include storage vessels (amphora); drinking vessels (two flagons, a Samian form 27 cup and a beaker); food preparation vessels (two mortaria) and jars, none of which show signs of use.

Assessment

The pottery all comes from a single context, 007, and could form a contemporary assemblage dating to the mid 2nd century to early 3rd century. However, three of the vessels are abraded and may be residual. All are quite small sherds.

The lack of Nene Valley colour coated vessels may suggest that a date towards the beginning of this range is most likely.

Retention

All of the pottery should be retained for future study.

Further Work

No further work is recommended although if the site is to be published then a report on the Samian ware should be commissioned.
