Assessment of Finds from Barton-upon-Humber (BARF06)

A fragment of window glass and four pieces of coal were recovered from archaeological

fieldwork carried out at Barton-upon-Humber by Pre-Construct Archaeology (Lincoln) Ltd.

Description

**Glass** 

A single fragment of window glass was recovered from context 803. It is made from a clear glass and has one plain face and one ribbed. Similar glass was in use in the late 19<sup>th</sup>/early 20<sup>th</sup> century and later, for example for windows within domestic doors and toilets where light

was required but without providing a clear view.

**Stone** 

A group of 4 fragments of coal were recovered from context 523. Thin coals occur in the middle Jurassic of Lincolnshire and North Yorkshire but these are probably Carboniferous coal from the Coal Measures. Without analysis it is impossible to identify the source of such

pieces.

Assessment

The window glass is of modern date and the coal is undateable.

Retention

It is unlikely that further study would be ever be worthwhile for either find and therefore there

is no reason to retain them.

**Further Work** 

No further work is recommended.
