

Birrens Cottage, Ecclefechan, Dumfries & Galloway: Archaeological Monitoring Works

1 Introduction





Figure 3b – proposed plan & elevations (kindly provided by Monica Wilson)

This data structure report presents the findings of a programme of archaeological undertaken in respect of proposed works at Birrens Cottage, located near Ecclefechan in Dumfries & Galloway (NGR: NY 21816 75066) (Figure 1). The proposed works comprised an extension to the existing Birrens Cottage planning application no) (18/0315/FUL) (Figures 2 & 3a-b).

Archaeological works were required as the proposed works were to be undertaken within an area recognised as being of national importance and designated as a scheduled monument under the Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Areas Act (1979) relating to Birrens to Broadlee, Roman forts, camps & henge (SM666; HER ref MDG7432). The monument comprises the upstanding remains of a fort and later enclosures, visible as a series of turf and stone banks and ditches and likely to date to the later prehistoric period (Figure 4).

As the proposed extension had the potential to affect any surviving sub-surface archaeological features or deposits of national significance, archaeological works were required to ensure that any impacts upon the scheduled monument were minimised and that archaeological information is recovered and recorded to a satisfactory standard. As the works will involve disturbance within the scheduled area, Scheduled Monument Consent (SMC) was required from Historic Environment Scotland (HES).

The proposed works comprised the excavation of three foundation trenches (Figures 6b & 8). The monitoring works indicated a fairly sterile silted topsoil above a clean silted clayey or gravelly subsoil. No significant archaeological deposits or finds were noted during the course of the monitoring works.

Rebecca Shaw Archaeological Services was appointed to act with regard to the archaeological condition by Monica Wilson.

2 Project Works

The archaeological monitoring works were undertaken at Birrens Cottage on the 22nd May 2019. The works were undertaken as agreed with Historic Environment Scotland though an SMC application and a written scheme of investigation (9th November 2018). A further written scheme of investigation was also agreed with Dumfries & Galloway Council Archaeology Service (Shaw, 18th November 2018).

Although the original works comprised an extension the length of the northern elevation, it was established when on site that the footprint of the proposed development had been reduced in size and now only comprised the eastern half of the northern extension (Figure 8b).

All works complied with the Chartered Institute for Archaeology's Standards and Policy Statements and Code of Conduct, and Historic Environment Scotland Policy Statements.

3 Findings

Prior to commencement of on site works the existing structure (utility room) had been removed to floor level (Figure 6a).

Foundation trench A was aligned N / S and measured 5.9m x 0,6m in (approx) and was excavated to a depth of between 350mm (S end) to 600mm (N end) (Figures 7a & 7c). Foundation trench B was aligned E / W and measured 5.3m x 0.6m (approx) and was excavated to depth of between 400mm (W end) and 600mm (E end) (Figures 7b & 7d). In both trenches A & B, below the existing gravel, the topsoil comprised a mid to dark brown gritty silt [102] averaging 300mm in depth - a single sherd of 20th century china was recovered from trench A. The subsoil varied between a bright red silty clay [103] and a reddish brown gravelly silt with frequent stones [104] in trench A and a bright red very compact silted boulder clay [105] in trench B. Trench C was aligned N / S and measured 1m x 0.6m and was excavated to a depth of

400mm (approx) (Figure 8a). Below the gravel the topsoil comprised a mid brown dirty silt containing a moderate to frequent amount of small stones [101] averaging 250mm in depth. The subsoil in trench C comprised a bright red very compact silted boulder clay [105].

4 Discussion

Early sound cartographic sources depict remains of banks and ditches relating to Birrens Roman Fort within the southern garden area of Birrens Cottage (Figures 5b & 5c) and although the banks and ditches are probably less prominent today than in the nineteenth century, they are still visible.

The archaeological monitoring works for the proposed extension revealed a fairly sterile topsoil with a single sherd of 20th century china [101] [102] above either a silty clay [103]; gravelly silt with frequent stones [104] or a compact boulder clay [105] (Figures 7a-d & 8a). Trench A did exhibit some disturbance from a services pipe as well as from the foundation trench for the existing cottage (Figure 7a). The depth of topsoil from the south to north end of trench A and from the west to east end of trench B indicated the ground sloped from east to west and the ground had been levelled at some point - probably when the cottage and / or subsequent extensions were built.

This therefore suggests that when the fort was occupied this area was probably sloped ground and therefore an unlikely location for fire pits / ovens or other significant features. However, although there was a chance that unstratified finds (such as pottery; leather; coins etc) could have been recovered only one sherd of 20th century china was observed. This perhaps signifies the ground may have been cleared to the natural previously, possibly when the cottage was built and a topsoil bought in from elsewhere to level the ground.


5 Conclusion


A programme of archaeological works was undertaken on the 22nd May 2019 in respect of proposed development works at Birrens Cottage near Ecclefechan in Dumfries & Galloway. The works comprised monitoring of excavation foundation trenches in relation to a small extension to the north of the existing cottage.

In general the monitored excavations revealed a relatively sterile topsoil above an undisturbed fairly compact subsoil. Given the close proximity of the banks & ditches to the cottage there was potential to uncover archaeological features or finds relating to the occupation and use of Birrens Roman fort. However, no archaeological remains that pre dated the 19th century were uncovered during the course of the monitoring works.

Figure 5a - Roys Military Survey Map of Scotland (1747-55)






Figure 5b – 1st Edition Ordnance Survey Map 1:2500 (1858) © Crown Copyright and Landmark Information Group – not to be reproduced without permission (912739984)




Figure 5d - Ordnance Survey Map 1:2500 (1971) © Crown Copyright and Landmark Information Group – not to be reproduced without permission (12739984)
