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Land to North East of Whiteknowes (Piperwell), Craigievar, Alford, AB33 8LT Report on Standing Building Survey

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
Summary

A Level 2 standing building survey was carried out on 23 August 2012. The poorly preserved ruins of a 19th-century farmhouse and steading not lived in since the 1940s was recorded. It is recommended that no further work is carried out at this site during the current development but this is subject to advice from Aberdeenshire Archaeology Service.

1 INTRODUCTION

The applicants Mr & Mrs Graeme Robertson received Full Planning Permission for Erection of Dwellinghouse and Change of Use of Land to Domestic Garden Ground on 28/06/2012 with standard archaeology condition (APP/2012/1434 condition no 5). A Level 2 standing building survey was required prior to removal of the foundations to create the new house. The site is in Leochel-Cushnie parish, the NGR for the site is NJ 53922 09125 which lies at 260-270m OD.

The standing building survey was carried out in the context of Scottish Planning Policy (SPP) Planning Advice Note (PAN 2/2011) and Scottish Historic Environment Policy (SHEP), which state that archaeological remains should be regarded as part of the environment to be protected and managed.

2 BACKGROUND


Piperwell (NJ50NW18; Illus 1) is a small complex of farmhouse on the east side of a courtyard with an L-shaped steading on the north and west and with an enclosed garden to the east. It lies east of Whiteknowes and 1km east of Hallhead a late medieval Laird's House and 2km NNW of Corse Castle and was in the Corse Estate. In the field immediately to the north of Piperwell is a complex including a ring ditch, other linear cropmarks and also possible rig and furrow overlying earlier rigs (NJ50NW52) survive as cropmarks.

The McLaren family lived in the house at Piperwell until the 1940s when they moved to Whiteknowes and the roof was removed from the house. At that time the steadings had already been removed (Mr McLaren, Whiteknowes, pers comm).

3 THE STANDING BUILDING SURVEY

A standing building survey was carried out on 23 August 2012. The buildings were being removed for the construction of a new house and stone had been removed from on top of the walls and the site scraped within the footprint of the proposed building. The remainder of the plot is remaining undisturbed during this building project.

The remains of the house stood to 1.4m high and the building was 5.8m wide and 12.8m long. The walls were c 0.7m wide and the foundations c 1m wide. The walls were constructed of large grey granite quarried blocks and the quoins of pink granite blocks (Illus 5).

In the centre of the south wall is a fireplace (F4) with stone hearth (F5) and this room latterly had a concrete floor (Illus 5). All the walls of Building 1 were poorly preserved with no surviving mortar which had been replaced by soil from plant growth and the use of the ruin as a stone dump. The east and west walls survived as 1m wide large stone foundations only.

The south wall of Building 1 (Wall 3; Illus 6) survived as one course of large grey granite blocks only and the large stone foundation was clearly visible. The building had been divided into at least 2 rooms with a smaller kitchen at the south end and a larger room at the north which may have been divided into two.

Building 2 had been the byre; the wall foundations survived as soil filled trenches c 1m wide with some stone surviving in the base of the trenches indicating that this building had been systematically demolished and the stone removed from the site prior to the 1940s (Mr McLaren, Whiteknowes, pers comm). The floor of the byre (greep; Illus 7) survived as a series of stone-lined runnels F1 along the interior face of the south wall and F2 along the


interior of the west wall. These were 0.85m wide lined with larger flat granite field stones and the base lined with small pebbles (Illus 8). F2 sloped down to the north and presumably out through the north wall into the midden whilst F1 ran down to the east across the courtyard and into a stone drain F3 (not excavated). A layer of demolition material on top of this floor included grey slates and sherds of pottery of 19th or early 20th-century date.

The garden area was not being disturbed during the current development

4 CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This small farmstead showed no evidence of being earlier than the 19th century and no earlier archaeological remains were uncovered during this work. No evidence of an extension at the south end of the byre (on the First Edition Ordnance Survey map; Illus 9) was uncovered.

It is recommended that no further archaeological work is required during the current development subject to agreement by Aberdeenshire Archaeology Service.


