

SUMMARY

A level 1 survey was carried out on this 19th-century house. It is recommended that no further archaeological work is required during the current development subject to agreement by Aberdeenshire Archaeology Service.

1 INTRODUCTION


Aberdeenshire Council planning reference APP/2012/1895 for full planning permission for the reinstatement of the mansion house and erection of ancillary building was passed on 1.10.12 with an archaeology condition (condition 6) for a standing building survey of the upstanding remains. The site is at NJ85515 25470 in the parish of Udny and at 110-115m OD.

2 BACKGROUND

The current mansion Pittrichie House was built in 1818 for J W Mackenzie, a solicitor in Banff (NAS re GD36/311). Pittrichie in various forms appears on maps from the 17th century Petreichy 1632-52; Robert Gordon of Straloch; Blaeu 1654 and Roy 1747-55; all available online at the National Library of Scotland.

3 THE STANDING BUILDING SURVEY

The survey took place on 27 November 2013; the weather was sunny and cold.

BUILDING 1


The house (Building 1) has been a shell for many years and is overgrown. It is a T-plan two storey mansion. In several places access to the exterior was hindered by undergrowth and numerous holes created by excavations for inspection of the foundations or drainage. No roof or floors survive except for the lower ground floor which was accessed via the basement

stairs, now supported by cast iron beams and concrete block foundation. A lift was inserted into the central bay of the north side of the house and the foundation pit for the lift shaft is present. The staircase to the upper floors is not present. The internal walls of the lower floor have been coated with tar waterproofing.

The house is 17m long (E-W) and 9.m wide. The house was built in one phase from large pink and grey trimmed granite blocks with cherry cocking; the interiors are constructed of small and medium granite fieldstones. There are patches of grey harling surviving on the exterior of the walls, particularly the gable walls (Illus 7). The windows and doors are mostly original and feature granite surrounds, lintels and sills. A central mullion is present in the front basement window under the original front door (Illus 11); this window is now obscured by undergrowth. The front door (Illus 6) is now inaccessible but there was originally a set of wide steps up to the front door which are detailed on the OS maps (Illus 2 and Appendix 2); there is now no trace of these stairs.

There is a small projecting date stone (1818) at the centre of the north wall (cover and Illus 4).

There is a small (5.8 x 1.5m) extension just off centre on the exterior of the north wall in which the original stair would have been located. The stair to the basement lower ground floor level survives but is heavily shored up by steel and concrete blocks (Illus 8, 9, 12). The stairs are 1m wide and are constructed of granite tread and risers and at the top of these stairs is a threshold inside the back door which contains a socket (Illus 10) for a pillar to support the stairs to the upper floor (which have since been removed). There are scars on the walls adjacent to the back (north door where a lean-to extension has been sited (Illus 4); this can be seen on the First Edition OS map (Illus 2) coloured grey indicating that it was of wood or iron.

The basement/lower ground floor was lit with several lightwell windows (Illus 14); a concrete floor is still *in situ*. No internal fittings survive but there are two fireplaces in the south end of the east wall, presumably the old kitchen area. The fireplaces (Illus 13) are 1.5m high and the larger (northerly) one is 1.4m wide and the smaller adjacent fireplace is 0.75m wide. Two smaller fireplaces are visible in the wall above these features and the larger fireplace has also been relined with a brick surround and flue.

There is a central fireplace on the interior of the west and east gable walls on the ground floor indicating that there were two main reception rooms on that floor of the house; there are two fireplaces on the first floor, presumably indicating two bedrooms above each reception room and a small fireplace in the second floor attic room (Illus 15) as well as small arched windows in the upper floor gables.



BUILDING 2

Building 2 is c 6m long, 3.2m wide and surviving to 1.8m high. It is constructed of granite fieldstones bonded with pink mortar. The building is very poorly preserved and overgrown with no access to the interior.

BUILDING 3

Building 3 is a small brick shelter and was recorded photographically (Illus 17).








