
### **Report on the Archaeological Evaluation**

# Proposed housing development, west side, Knockhall Road, Newburgh, AB41 6DZ

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#### SUMMARY

Seven trenches totaling 5% of the proposed development (1750m²) were evaluated on 8-10 September 2014 by Stuart Farrell for Cameron Archaeology. The topsoil was up to 1.1m deep but no archaeological features were identified. Seven flints and one sherd of prehistoric pottery were recovered from the topsoil and two waste flints from gravels at the east end of trench 1. It is therefore recommended that a watching brief be maintained during the soil strip for the east end of the new road and SUDS basin.

#### 1 BACKGROUND

- 1.1 The site is located on the west side of Knockhall Road, Newburgh north of St Clair Wynd. It is centred on NGR NJ 9967 2554, at 5-20m OD, on land sloping steeply uphill to the NW.
- 1.2 The work was commissioned by Martin Forbes, Scotia Homes Ltd the Aberdeenshire Planning application APP/2014/1408 is pending. Aberdeenshire Archaeology Service would require a 5% archaeological evaluation.
- 1.3 All the archaeological work was carried out in the context of Scottish Planning Policy (SPP) Planning Advice Note (PAN 2/2011) and Scottish Historic Environment Policy (SHEP), which state that archaeological remains should be regarded as part of the environment to be protected and managed.

#### 2 ARCHAEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND

- 2.1 There are no Scheduled Ancient Monuments within 1km of the proposed development site. There is one known historic site within the proposed development boundary; a small quarry (NJ92NE 117) 590m SE of Little Haddo farmsteading appears on the First Edition OS map (Illus 7) which has gone out of use by the Second Edition (Illus 8).
- 2.2 The Burgh and town of Newburgh on the spreading estuary of the Ythan, was a significant port for fish and Ellon-bound cargo and also was a resort of retired seamen (Aberdeenshire SMR NJ92NE0036). The town was the site of a market cross (NJ92NE 14). The cross of Newburgh was referred to in a service before the Sheriff of Aberdeen on 10 January 1558: the cross was broken by a cart some years ago but the site is well known (Name Book 1866, 32, 30).
- 2.3 Alexander Comyn, the Earl of Buchan, founded a hospital at Newburgh c1261 for six poor men and a chaplain (NK 0001 2543; Easson 1957). Monks from the Cistercian Abbey of Deer lived at the Monkshome. The site of the Monkshome was occupied by an inn where the Old Pretender lodged on his journey south from Peterhead in 1715. (Walton 1966, 45-7) At the end of the 18th century the inn was known as 'Monkshome' and was believed to be on the site of the hospital

(Ordnance Survey Name Book [ONB] 1866, 32, 31).

- 2.4 Remains of an area of denuded rig and furrow, visible in low light (NK02NW30) is located on Newburgh Golf Course.
- 2.5 650 ENE of the proposed site there was a chapel of the Holy Rood which belonged to the Abbey of Deer in Foveran parish. (H Scott et al 1926) A charter of 1474 confirms earlier grants of annual rents, lands and fishings to the chapel. (K Walton 1966) The remains of the chapel were still visible within a burial ground in 1840 (NSA 1845) but the cemetery has been levelled off and the chapel was removed (Scott et al 1926, 193; K Walton 1966, 44; New Statistical Account 1845, 12, 699; Third Statistical Account (TSA) 1960, 446).
- 2.5 A watching brief was carried out in November 2004 during the upgrading of the waste water treatment plant. The site is located at the eastern extremity of Inch Road, immediately adjacent to the 18th-century churchyard and the Udny family burial vault. This was the location of the Chapel of the Holy Rood which belonged to the Abbey of Deer and probably dated to the 13th century. Although no archaeological features associated with the chapel or graveyard were evident, two pieces of medieval pottery were recovered. One is a portion of medieval redware jug handle, probably of local manufacture, while the second is a rim sherd of lustrous green-glazed Scarborough ware imported from North Yorkshire (Murray 2004, 16).
- 2.6 Mesolithic cores and blades of flint have been recovered from a surface below estuarine mud at 17 ft (5.2m) OD, at a meander scar cut by Foveran Burn immediately to the south of Newburgh (NK02NW 21; Kirk 1958, 30). A flint flake from Newburgh is in Cambridge University Museum of Archaeology and Ethnology (Z.32791). A collection of flint flakes, mostly unworked, from an old bed of the river Ythan at Newburgh, was presented to the National Museum of Antiquities of Scotland (NMAS) on 13 March 1905. (Proc Soc Antiq Scot 1905, 245). The river is constantly making minor changes of course at its estuary. No more accurate siting could be obtained from these finds, but occupation sites have been noted in the area on each side of the river (NK02NW 5).
- 2.7 An 'axe-hammer' (NJ92NE 9) of diorite, 13" long, 5" wide and 3" thick, was found near Newburgh (NJ 99 25) and donated to the National Museum of Antiquities of Scotland (NMAS) (Proc Soc Antiq Scot 1893, 49). Three worked flints found in the vicinity of Newburgh (NJ 99 25; NJ92NE 11) are in the Mrs Irvine collection at Barra Castle.
- 2.8 Knockhill Castle (NJ92NE2) is just over 1km to the NNW of the proposed site and is the remains of an L-plan towerhouse of 3 storeys with projecting staircase on the N side. Above the doorway in the re-entrant angle is a stone dated 1565. Basic fabric is 16th century, the re-construction is late 17th century, being confined to windows, internal details and probably the square projecting tower at the N side. It was accidently burnt in 1734 when it fell into ruins. There is a vaulted ground floor, E vault intact, the W kitchen vault has fallen. A courtyard lay to the S, in the SE corner of which stood a circular tower with vaulted basement and shot-holes. The upper storey was a dovecot. Now only a stump remains. The castle also has Remains of a 17th to 19th century designed landscape (NJ92NE2; Shepherd 1994, 212).

#### 3 THE ARCHAEOLOGICAL EVALUATION

Seven trenches totaling 5% of the proposed development (1750m²) were evaluated on 8-10 September 2014 by Stuart Farrell for Cameron Archaeology. The topsoil was up to 1.1m deep but no archaeological features were identified. Seven flints and one sherd of prehistoric pottery were recovered from the topsoil and two waste flints from gravels at the east end of Trench 1.

#### 4 CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Although no features were recorded in the trenches, six flints and a sherd of prehistoric pottery were recovered from topsoil and two flints were recovered from gravels at the south edge of the site adjacent to the burn. It is therefore recommended that a watching brief be maintained during the soil strip for the east end of the new road and SUDS basin.



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






