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SUMMARY

A visual inspection of the site was carried out on 4 April 2018 and a photographic survey was carried out on 20 April 2018 with watching briefs on the service trenches 30 August and 6 September 2018.

A pit and post-hole were excavated; it is possible that post-hole base F1 is medieval in origin but the pit F3 was backfilled in the late 19th or 20th century. This site is on the line of medieval High Street and the buildings may have been wood or this might have been the remains of an internal partition or fitting. Parson Gordon's map of 1661 (Illus 13) shows stone buildings along the frontage with rigs to the E. Medieval pottery of the type recovered on this site have been found all over Aberdeen and Old Aberdeen.

The building work is now complete and so it is recommended that no further archaeological work is required during the current planning application.

1 INTRODUCTION


- 1.1 The site (Illus 1) is located on the E side of High Street, Old Aberdeen opposite the Old Town House. It is centred on NGR NJ 93932 08474, at 20-25m OD and in the parish of Aberdeen.
- 1.2 The work was commissioned by Andy Farquhar, Squire Associates for Harry Miller. An Aberdeen City Council planning application 170524/DPP for change of use from old public toilets to form new coffee house/café was approved on 20.7.17 with an archaeology condition and there is a requirement for a photographic survey and a watching brief during all ground disturbance.
- 1.3 All the archaeological work was carried out in the context of Scottish Planning Policy (SPP) Planning Advice Note (PAN 2/2011) and Scottish Historic Environment Scotland's Policy Statement (HESPS), which state that archaeological remains should be regarded as part of the environment to be protected and managed.

2 BACKGROUND


This single storey granite-fronted unlisted building dating from 1932 and formerly used as public toilets fronts onto 112 High Street to the W and Market Lane to the N. It is within Old Aberdeen Conservation Area. The front elevation is of ashlar granite and has the word 'SHELTER' engraved above the door. It is not on the Aberdeen Sites and Monuments Record or the National Monuments Record.

3 THE PHOTOGRAPHIC SURVEY

A photographic survey was carried out on 4th and 20th April 2018. The N, E and S walls of the building had been demolished by the date of the first visit and so the W front façade and the stumps of the N and S walls were photographically recorded.



4 THE WATCHING BRIEF

A visual inspection was carried out on 4 April 2018 and an area which had been stripped of rubble was hand-cleaned. A pit and a possible post-hole base were uncovered and excavated.

4.1 Post-hole F1

F1 was 0.3m diameter and 0.15m deep and had steep sides. The fill was 2 a black loam, gravel, modern wood fragments and late medieval pottery (Illus 8,9). It is possible that this is the remains of a medieval post-hole with modern material pressed into the top fill.

4.2 Pit F3

F3 was 0.9m diameter and 0.10m deep and had shallow sloping sides. The fill was 4, a black loam, gravel, mortar, stone and sherds of 19th/early 20th-century pottery (Illus 8, 10).

4.3 The Pottery

The base of a late medieval jug was found within the fill of F1. It has a pinched base, green lead glaze on the exterior and rilling and pinch marks on the interior of the base. It is local east coast redware typically made in Aberdeen and Aberdeenshire.

4.4 Electric cabling

A trench was dug on the W façade of the building to connect the electricity to the mains on 30 August 2018 (Illus 3). The material excavated had been removed previously and no *in situ* deposits were recorded or finds recovered.

4.5 Gas cabling

A trench was dug on the N side of the building to connect the gas to the mains on 6 September 2018 (Illus 3). The material excavated had been removed previously and no *in situ* deposits were recorded or finds recovered.

5 CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

It is possible that post-hole base F1 is medieval in origin but F3 was backfilled in the late 19th or 20th century. This site is on the line of medieval High Street and the buildings may have been wood or this might have been the remains of an internal partition or fitting. Parson Gordon's map of 1661 (Illus 13) shows stone buildings along the frontage with rigs to the E. Medieval pottery of the type recovered on this site have been found all over Aberdeen and Old Aberdeen.

The building work is now complete and so it is recommended that no further archaeological work is required during the current planning application.

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


Illus 13 Parson Gordon's map of 1661 showing site circled (copyright National Library of Scotland).
