

SUMMARY

A Level 1 standing building survey was carried out on 31 Jan and 10 February 2020. The hall was built in one phase in 1951 by the Brethren as a meeting house, replacing a wooden shed which had been in use for the purpose. The main entrance is in the NE wall on New Pier Road and this leads to a corridor with male and female cloakrooms and toilets on each side of the corridor. Above the door into the hall is a painted plaque 'IT IS TIME TO SEEK THE LORD'. The Hall is one main room with dais at the SW end with a full immersion font lined with sheet steel and with copper fittings. There is a painted plaque above the dais 'GATHER MY SAINTS TOGETHER UNTO ME' and there is a wooden lectern with an bible and 'THY WORD IS TRUTH' on the NE panel facing the congregation. The door in the SE end of the room leads to a small kitchen and a door to the rear.

Excavation of the garden has revealed surfaces and finds dumped in the grounds prior to the hall being constructed and this has added information to the history of this area of Footdee.

1 INTRODUCTION


- 1.1 The site (Illus 1) is located on the S side of New Pier Road, Footdee. It is centred on NGR NJ9573805779, at 0-5m OD (Illus 1) and in the parish of Aberdeen.
- 1.2 The work was commissioned by the Footdee community group. A planning application 190033/DPP for demolition of vestibule to rear; existing access gate removed and infill opening; formation of ramped access to newly formed doors and installation of air source heat pump was approved on 23 April 2019. No archaeological condition was attached but this work is being carried out to add the information to the HER.

2 BACKGROUND

The Gospel Hall appears on the Aberdeen City HER (NJ90NE0582). Hall, built 1951 as a place of worship, on the site of an earlier hall depicted on the OS 2nd edition map. From 1990 to 2014 it was in use as an artist's studio and is now in use as a community hall.




3 THE LEVEL 1 STANDING BUILDING SURVEY

A level 1 standing building survey was carried out on 31 Jan and 10 February 2020. Architects plans and elevations were checked and annotated and a full photographic survey carried out. The hall is 14.6m long and 8.1m wide with an extension at the SW end 2/9 x 2,.3m in size and 3.2m high. The hall is constructed from concrete blocks which are visible on the front NE façade; the other walls are harled and the roof is asbestos concrete roofing material. The sills, skewputts and other elements are all in concrete.

The main room of the hall (Room 1) has large windows 1.5m wide and 2m high on the NW wall (W6-8) and the SE wall (W9-11). On the SW wall there is a painted bible quote 'GATHER/MY SAINTS/TOGETHER/UNTO ME/PSALM 50 V 5'. There is a full body immersion font which has been built into a dais in the centre of the SW wall. It is 2.62m wide and 2.34m long with a cast iron sheet lined font F1 which is 2.14m long, 0.9m wide and 0.9m deep. The cast iron is 1-2mm thick and the edges have been overlapped by 3.4cm and rivetted with rivets 0.7cm diameter. There is a cast iron drainage pipe in the NE corner 5cm diameter which allowed the water to be drained out and a cast iron pipe in the Se corner which could be attached to a pipe and a tap for filling the font.

On the NE side of the dais is a dark wood lectern with 'THY/WORD/IS/TRUTH/JOHN 17 V 17' (F2). It was known as the double-sided lectern as it had the bible placed on the top and an image of a bible facing the congregation.

Room 2 is the extension on the SW end of the building which houses a kitchen. It has a door (D2) on the SW wall and window (W14) on the SE wall. In the NE end of the building are Rooms 3 and 4 ladies and gentlemen's toilet and cloakroom each with windows on the NW

(W4, W5) and SE (W12, W13) walls and small windows on the front NE façade (W1, W2). Room 5 is a corridor from the front door (D1) through to the hall. Above the internal door into the hall (D4) is a painted bible quote 'IT IS TIME/TO/SEEK THE LORD/HOSEA 10 V 12' (F4).



APPENDIX 1 GRAHAM GUYAN (GG) REMINISCENCES


GGG grandfather lived at 23 North Square, one of the first families to occupy the squares, Open Brethren and worshipped at the East Coast Mission 'the schoolie' in the centre of the squares. There was no communion or baptism and so he started preaching in the loft above Thomas Walker's shed – a wooden tar shed on the site now occupied by the 1951 hall. The shed was rotten. He broke away from the strict Brethren. Thomas Walker's mother was a Guyan – many of the families were interrelated. The land belonged to the Harbour Board but the building belonged to the Brethren.

F1 Full immersion font. GG pointed out the copper alloy tap fitting which was attached to a hose and to the tap, and the copper pipe which was removed to allow the tank to drain. There were always 3 people in the font – the preacher and 2 people holding the person to be baptized. Oversight – 'steering committee' equivalent to elders. There were about 2 baptisms per year. They heated the water with a coil heating element which was dropped into the font. They only baptized adults as they had to be saved and at an age of understanding.

F2 Double-sided lectern as it had the bible placed on the top and an image of a bible facing the congregation. GG preached there when he was young.

Cast iron gate on NE wall – GG painted it when he was a youngster.


