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#### Summary

An archaeological evaluation and standing building survey was carried out at Pitfodels, Craigton Road between 3-4 June 2010. No significant archaeological features were recorded during this work. The north boundary wall which is to be removed during the development was recorded.

#### 1 INTRODUCTION


This report relates to an archaeological evaluation and standing building survey carried out at Craigton Road, Pitfodels, Aberdeen (National Grid Reference NJ9067 0411). The work was commissioned by Roger Legge, Mackie Ramsay Taylor on behalf of The Trustees of the Nazareth Care Home. The work relates to Aberdeen City Council planning application reference P090141 granted for 54-bed nursing home on 24th March 2010.

#### 2 ARCHAEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND

A programme of archaeological works was requested by Aberdeen City Council. This greenfield site is c 100 x 90m in size and is open ground; there are no buildings on the site at present. There are no known archaeological sites within the development area. A number of sites of historical interest are known in the area. Various finds in the vicinity include a barbed and tanged arrowhead, flint flake and scraper found at Deeside Gardens (NJ90SW 51). Recent archaeological work at Pitfodels House (Cameron 2008, 13) revealed evidence of a post-medieval house 300m to the south of the current site. Craigton Road was one of the main roads from Aberdeen to the west and a number of boundary stones survive including Aberdeen March stones numbers 9 and 10 (NJ90SW 34, 35).

III 3 1867 Ordnance Survey map with site outline in red




III 4 Aerial photograph, 1946 with site outline in red

### 3 THE ARCHAEOLOGICAL EVALUATION

A 10% archaeological evaluation was carried out at the site using a tracked excavator with a ditching bucket. Seven trenches were excavated across the length of the site (III 1).

A number of field drains consisting of cut trenches filled with ceramic drain pipe (F1-F4, III 5) were uncovered and are recorded in archive. F7 (III 5) was a layer of sandy clay which had been laid 10cm below the current ground surface and above c10cm of buried soil. This deposit is relatively modern and may have been laid to create a temporary road surface during the construction of the neighbouring houses (187-189 Craigton Road). This surface was not seen in any other trenches.

#### 4 THE STANDING BUILDING RECORDING

As part of this development, the north boundary wall (F5) and the north end of the west boundary wall (F6) are to be demolished and were recorded as part of this archaeological work.

F5 is 39m long and 0.3m wide (III 8). It stands to a maximum of 0.6m high and is constructed of granite fieldstones capped with a granite pediment (III 9). It has been partially demolished in the central area (III 11). Feature F6 is the remains of a stone boundary wall which survives as a foundation course of stones with granite fieldstones roughly placed on top (III 12).

#### 5 **CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS**

No significant archaeological features or finds were recorded at this site.

It is recommended that no further archaeological work is required at this site during the current development. The final decision on the archaeological requirements at this site remains with Judith Stones, Aberdeen City Council.




