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#### 1 NON-TECHNICAL SUMMARY

Pre-Construct Archaeology (PCA) was commissioned by CgMs Consulting to undertake an archaeological watching brief during the ground work for service trench associated with the installation of a biomass heating facility at Milton Abbey School, Milton Abbas, nr Blandford Forum, Dorset. This report details the results of the watching brief on the below ground excavations to the south of the school buildings. The watching brief took place between the 21<sup>st</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup> of April 2015.

The service trench, which ran approximately east to west, revealed considerable disturbance represented by modern services and deposits of modern or relatively recent building debris and brick, flint and chalk rubble. However near the west end of the trench a north-south aligned wall was found made of mortared flint and sandstone. Its build and fabric appears to suggest a late medieval date and may therefore represent a building forming part of medieval Milton Abbey. Two fragments of decorated floor tile of similar date were also found. The wall was left *in situ*.

#### 2 INTRODUCTION

#### 2.1 Project Background

- 2.1.1 Pre-Construct Archaeology Ltd (PCA) was appointed by CgMs Consulting to undertake an archaeological watching brief during ground work for services associated with the installation of a heating facility at Milton Abbey School, Milton Abbas, nr Blandford Forum, Dorset (Figures 1 & 2), hereafter 'the site'. The watching brief was targeted on a section of new service trench excavated to the south of the school buildings and crossing a playing field.
- 2.1.2 The watching brief was carried out in accordance with of Condition 6 of planning permission for the installation of a Biomass Plant Room within an existing workshop. Planning permission was granted by the Local Planning Authority North Dorset District Council (Planning reference 2/2014/1172/FUL) in December 2014. Condition 6 requirements are based on the advice of the Council's archaeological advisor Steve Wallis, Dorset County Archaeological Officer (CAO). The condition states:

'No development shall take place until the applicant or their successors in title have made arrangements for archaeological observation and recording to take place during any period of demolition and/or development. Details of those arrangements shall be submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority, at least one month before any work commences on the development site. The observations and recording shall be carried out as approved'.

- 2.1.3 Reason To safeguard and/or record the archaeological interest on and around the site in accordance with North Dorset District Wide Local Plan (First Revision) Policies 1.1, 1.28, 1.29 and 1.30.
- 2.1.4 The required Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) (PCA 2015) was submitted in March 2015 and approved in advance of the commencement of works on site in April 2015.
- 2.1.5 This report presents the results of the watching brief and has been prepared in accordance with the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists standard and guidance for archaeological watching briefs (IfA 2008) and *Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment* (English Heritage, 2006).

## 2.2 Location, Topography and Geology

2.2.1 Milton Abbey School (NGR 379909 102341) (**Figure 1**) lies between Dorchester and Blandford Forum, and 1km west of the village of Milton Abbas, Dorset. The school occupies a historic setting, a Grade 1 former country house, a Grade 1 listed former Abbots Hall, a number of other Listed buildings and is set within a Grade II\* registered park and garden.

- 2.2.2 The immediate topography reflects significant landscaping associated with the emparkment of the site in the 18<sup>th</sup> century and the later creation of school playing fields. The site lies within an undulating and wooded landscape at approximately 118m above OD.
- 2.2.3 The site lies on Bedrock Chalk and superficial deposits of clay, silt, sand and gravel http://mapapps.bgs.ac.uk/geologyofbritain/home.html.

#### 2.3 Archaeological and Historical Background

- 2.3.1 The site lies in an area rich in monuments, sites and findspots. Of principle relevance, the site contains the remains of a Benedictine Abbey, founded in the 10<sup>th</sup> century, of which the 15<sup>th</sup> century Abbots Hall and restored 13th century abbey church survive. Following its Dissolution, the Abbey passed into private hands and eventually, in 1752, to Joseph Damer. Damer commissioned a new house to be built and for the land around the former abbey to be remodelled by Lancelot 'Capability' Brown to create a parkland. This entailed demolition of Middleton, a village that had developed to the south of the abbey, the site of which is a Scheduled Monument (the residents were moved to the planned settlement of Milton Abbas).
- 2.3.2 A number of the historic buildings that survive, and other structures, are listed (Milton, 2014). These include the Grade 1 listed Milton Abbey School, the Abbots Hall and Kitchen, the Abbey Church and the Chapel of St Catherine. Other listed structures include a Cross Base some 90m south-east of the abbey church, which has been identified as a Market Cross perhaps associated with the former village of Middleton and which stands within the Scheduled Monument. Along with the listed buildings, the parkland created by Brown is listed Grade II\* on the English Heritage Register of Historic Parks and Gardens.

## 3 AIM

#### 3.1 Archaeological Watching Brief

- 3.1.1 The aim of the archaeological watching brief was to monitor all ground work for the presence of archaeological resources and, if present and where necessary, to investigate and record the resources and determine, as may be possible, their character, including their date, nature and extent.
- 3.1.2 This report aims to provide an assessment of significant archaeological resources that were recovered and in order to address Condition 6 of planning permission. Otherwise, the report will aim to be sufficient to demonstrate to the Local Planning Authority that the watching brief was carried out in accordance with the WSI document and the Condition.

#### 4 RESULTS

#### 4.1 Introduction

4.1.1 The following summary is based on the site archive, comprising written, drawn and photographic records, along with a small quantity of artefacts. The archive is held at PCA's Winchester office under the site code MASD15 and will ultimately be deposited with the Dorset County Archive, Dorchester. A table of contexts is provided in Appendix 1 and site photographs in Appendix 2.

#### 4.2 Service Trench

- 4.2.1 Mechanical excavation forming the length of the service trench crossing the playing field south of the school was monitored (**Figure 2**, **Plate 1**). It was excavated to a general depth of 1m below the ground surface and was 0.5m wide. The course of the trench followed the planned route. Arisings were heaped to the side and used to backfill the trench.
- 4.2.2 The trench revealed previous disturbance throughout of relatively modern date and including earlier service trenches and deposits of modern debris including brick rubble, sand, ceramic drain pipe, wood, modern glass and animal bone.

#### 4.3 General sequence

- 4.3.1 Natural deposits were not seen with certainty at any point along the trench. However, a small area of possibly natural chalk was observed at the east end of the trench and elsewhere the base of the trench was characterised by a re-deposited clayey deposit, possibly dirtied natural clay
- 4.3.2 The sections of the trench revealed, beneath topsoil [001], deposits of mainly modern date consisting of building debris but also bands of possibly earlier flint and chalk rubble, oyster shell and charcoal [005] & [006]. Some fragments of apparently moulded chalk and sandstone were observed but not retained.

## 4.4 Wall

4.4.1 A wall was revealed by the service trench toward its western end (**Figures 2 & 3**, **Plate 2**). The wall [002] ran north-south, on an alignment similar to the existing historic school buildings lying just 6m to the north (Mansion House), and appeared to consist of two courses, together some 0.3m thick and 0.5m wide. The upper part of the wall fabric [002] was mainly mortared flint rubble and included one dressed sandstone block. The mortar was whitish-yellow and included charcoal. The lower part of the wall [003] consisted of larger, coarser flint bonded by a more sandy mortar. The two elements of the wall may represent separate phases of construction or distinguish a foundation course from higher fabric.

4.4.2 Below the wall was a coarse sandy layer (Context 004), thought to be associated with the wall, perhaps having served as a bedding layer. No foundation 'cut' could be discerned and the relationship between the wall and adjacent deposits was not clear, although it is assumed the adjacent deposits ran up against it, suggesting the area of the trench has been heavily disturbed. The date of the wall is unclear although it seems likely that it formed part of a building within Milton Abbey and may be assumed to be late Medieval. The wall was left in situ and the new pipework laid beneath it.

#### 4.5 Finds

4.5.1 Two fragments of decorated floor tile were recovered from the arisings from the trench. One is a small fragment probably from the corner of a tile. It is grey-red in colour and has a green glaze with a pale inlay. It is possible that the tile originally showed a lion or griffin within a circle similar to one found in Winchester College (Norton, 1976). The other is red in colour and is nearly complete with just one side missing. It too has a green glaze with a pale inlay and shows a lattice design. Both are thought to date to the 13<sup>th</sup>- 14<sup>th</sup> Century and most likely derive from Milton Abbey.

#### 4.6 Conclusion

4.6.1 The watching brief results appear to indicate that the area south of the school buildings and within the existing playing field into which the service trench was excavated has the potential to contain archaeological resources most likely to date from the late medieval period and related to the precinct of Milton Abbey. However, the service trench revealed disturbance from relatively modern and perhaps older events that may be associated with the post-dissolution transformation of the Abbey site.
