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	INTRODUCTION

ABSTRACT

This report describes the results of archaeological monitoring carried out by Pre-Construct Archaeology at All Saints Church, Huntingdon, Cambridgeshire (NGR TL 23775 71846) in March and June 2016. The archaeological monitoring was commissioned by Purcell UK. The aim of the monitoring was to record any archaeology revealed by the ground works.

The monitoring mainly identified disarticulated human remains within modern made ground which had previously been disturbed by earlier drains. An undisturbed layer was seen in the deeper drain trenches, containing a human skull and potentially articulated remains which were left in situ.

1 INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 Archaeological monitoring was undertaken by Pre-Construct Archaeology Ltd (PCA) at All Saints Church, Huntingdon, Cambridgeshire (centred on Ordnance Survey National Grid Reference (NGR) TL 23775 71846) in March and June 2016 (Figure 1).
- 1.2 The site was located in the northern side of All Saints churchyard, along with a small area of monitoring in the west tower and south aisle.
- 1.3 The aim of the archaeological monitoring was to determine the location, date, extent, character, condition and quality of any archaeological remains on the site, to assess the significance of any such remains in a local, regional, or national context, as appropriate, and to assess the potential impact of the development proposals on the site's archaeology.
- 1.4 Narrow trenches, measuring c.0.4m wide, for new drain pipes were monitored in the northern part of the churchyard. Ground between the buttresses of the northern bays was sloped to provide additional drainage. A small trench in the west tower and a soakaway for the font were also monitored.
- 1.5 This report describes the results of the monitoring. The site archive will be deposited at Cambridgeshire County Council Archaeology Store.

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2 GEOLOGY AND TOPOGRAPHY

- 2.1 The geology of the site is Oxford Clay Formation Mudstone (British Geological Survey; Website 1). In the trenches the natural geology was not reached.
- 2.2 The superficial deposits are River Terrace Deposits Sand and Gravel (BGS; Website 1). Formed up to two million years ago in the Quaternary Period when the environment was dominated by rivers.
- 2.3 The site is located in the Market Square and lies at an elevation of c. 18m above Ordnance Datum (AOD).

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3 ARCHAEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND

- 3.1 The following material has been derived from the Brief for Archaeological Monitoring and Record (Reynolds 2016) as well as a search of the Cambridgeshire HER.
- 3.2 The earliest part of All Saints Church is the south tower arch, which dates to the 13th century, and the tower dates to the late 14th century. The majority of the church dates from the late 15th and early 16th centuries. The tower was repaired in brick in the 17th century.
- 3.3 There is evidence of an earlier church in Huntingdon, with records stating that a church was given to Thorney Abbey in the late 10th century. 12th century fragments were also found during a restoration of All Saints Church in the 1950s. During this restoration the 19th century furnishings were removed and a concrete bed, damp proof course and concrete capping were laid.
- 3.4 Three test pits were excavated in 2013 to explore the depth of the concrete bed and survival of archaeological deposits. Both test pits 2 and 3 (located in the nave and north aisle) were excavated to a depth of 0.27m and did not go deeper than deposits associated with the 1950s works. Test pit 1 (in the south aisle) revealed the remains of a young child, comprising fragments of skull, ribs and long bone.

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4 METHODOLOGY

- 4.1 The archaeological monitoring observed the excavation of a shallow trench in the northern churchyard, measuring 0.4 to 0.5m wide and 0.4 to 0.7m deep (Figure 2; Plates 1-3). Six small spurs off the main trench, 0.4m wide, were monitored. Five additional areas of ground removal were monitored between the buttresses on the northern elevation. A small area of concrete removal was monitored in the tower and in the south aisle, but it did not impact on archaeological deposits.
- 4.2 Ground reduction was carried out under archaeological supervision using a 5tonne tracked mechanical excavator fitted with a 0.4m-wide bucket. Exposed surfaces were cleaned by trowel as appropriate and all further excavation was undertaken manually using hand tools.
- 4.3 Metal-detecting was carried out during the topsoil and subsoil stripping and throughout the excavation process. Archaeological features and spoil heaps were scanned by metal-detector.
- 4.4 High-resolution digital photographs were taken of all relevant features and deposits, and were used to keep a record of the excavation process.
- 4.5 Any human remains or coffin fittings disturbed during excavation were retained by All Saints Church for reburial.

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5 CONCLUSIONS

5.1 Archaeological monitoring mainly identified disarticulated human remains within modern made ground which had previously been disturbed by earlier drains. The trenches for the new drains generally followed the line of the old drains to minimise disturbing archaeological remains. An undisturbed layer was seen towards the west tower in which a potentially articulated skull was seen in the section of the trench (Plate 4). It was left in situ and covered up.




