

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1 ABSTRACT

Pre-Construct Archaeology Ltd (PCA) was appointed by Arcadis (UK) Ltd, on behalf of Rolls-Royce Motor Cars Ltd, to undertake an archaeological watching brief on land at the Rolls-Royce factory, The Drive, Westhampnett, West Sussex (NGR 488207 106557). The Site is the subject of a proposed employee car park.

The watching formed the final part of a staged approach to addressing the archaeological implications of the development and was informed by the results of an archaeological Desk-based Assessment prepared by Arcadis (2017) and a trial trench evaluation (PCA 2018).

The evaluation revealed a low level of archaeological potential, which was confined to two ditches, both in Trench 2, and similarly aligned north-east to south-west. A very small amount of possibly middle or late Iron Age pottery was recovered from the fill of each ditch. Apart from a third ditch in Trench 5 of probably modern date, no other archaeological features were recorded.

The watching brief was conducted during topsoil striping and related groundwork between the 18th of June and 11th July 2018. No significant archaeological remains were revealed.

2 INTRODUCTION

2.1 Project Background

- 2.1.1 Pre-Construct Archaeology Ltd (PCA) was appointed by Arcadis (UK) Ltd, on behalf of Rolls-Royce Motor Cars Ltd, to undertake an archaeological evaluation on land at the Rolls-Royce factory, The Drive, Westhampnett, West Sussex, (Figure 1), hereafter 'the Site' (centred at NGR 488207 106557). The Site is the subject of a proposed employee car park.
- 2.1.2 The watching brief forms the final part of a staged approach to addressing the archaeological implications of the development and was informed by the results of an archaeological Desk-based Assessment prepared by Arcadis (2017) and a trial trench evaluation (PCA 2018). The evaluation revealed a low level of archaeological potential, which was confined to two ditches, both in Trench 2, and similarly aligned north-east to south-west. A very small amount of possibly middle or late Iron Age pottery was recovered from the fill of each ditch. Apart from a third ditch in Trench 5 of probably modern date, no other archaeological features were recorded.
- 2.1.3 This document provides a report on the results of the watching brief, carried out between the 18th June and 11th July 2018 and has been prepared in accordance with the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists standard and guidance for archaeological watching briefs (CIfA 2014) and *Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment* (Historic England, 2015).

2.2 Location, Topography and Geology

- 2.2.1 The Site, an area of approximately 2.37ha, is located in the village of Westhampnett, West Sussex, west of the Rolls-Royce factory. It is bounded to the south by residential development and by Claypit Lane to the west and accessed from 'The Drive', the principal access to the Rolls-Royce factory.
- 2.2.2 The Site is presently grassed with the northern and eastern boundaries comprising shrub and woodland landscape planting associated with and screening the factory. The Site has a slight gradient sloping down from north-west to the south-east (towards Claypit Lane and lies at 25m above Ordnance Datum (aOD) at its highest point.
- 2.2.3 The bedrock geology of the Site is Lambeth Group which is a clay, silt and sand sedimentary rock. The Site has two types of superficial deposits of Raised Storm Beach Deposits (gravel) to the east and a Head deposit of gravel, sand, silt and clay to the west.

2.3 Archaeological and Historical Background

2.3.1 The Desk-based Assessment (Arcadis 2017) has provided a comprehensive study of the archaeological and historical background to the Site using information drawn from the Chichester Historic Environment Record. This was summarised in the Assessment as follows:

A cultural heritage desk-based assessment was undertaken at a Site to the west of Rolls Royce Motor Cars Limited manufacturing plant, Westhampnett (NGR 488207, 106557). The Site is 2.37ha in area, nearly triangular in shape, and is currently grassland. The proposed development is for a 500 spaced car park with drop off facilities for an adjacent school and pathways into the manufacturing plant.

Cartographic analysis demonstrates that the Site has changed little since the 1700's while the immediate surrounding area has been developed both for residential and industrial purposes. Recently this industrial activity may have had an impact on any below ground archaeological features. The Site was used as a compound and a construction storage and route way area for the creation of the Rolls-Royce manufacturing plant. Once the construction was complete the Site was landscaped and turned into grassland.

There are no designated heritage assets, archaeological priority areas or archaeological notification areas on Site. There are 21 Listed Buildings within the 1km study area of which one is Grade II* Listed, the Parish Church of St Peter (LB1), and the remainder are Grade II Listed. The vegetation that surrounds the Site, in particular on the western side of Claypit Lane, screen the built heritage assets from the proposed development. If there is a loss of this vegetation surrounding the Site it is recommended that it is replaced with similar vegetation.

The data supplied by the Chichester District Historic Environment Record indicates that there was a concentration a Prehistoric, Roman, Saxon and Medieval activity surrounding the Site. The close proximity that some of these monuments to the Site indicates a high potential of archaeological features from multiple time periods to be represented on the Site.

2.3.2 The Assessment concluded with a recommendation for archaeological evaluation of the proposal Site. The evaluation, carried out in December 2017, comprised six 30m X 2m trenches (PCA 2018). The evaluation revealed two ditches, both in Trench 2, and similarly aligned north-east to south-west. A very small amount of possibly middle or late Iron Age pottery was recovered from the fill of each ditch. Apart from a third ditch in Trench 5 of probably modern date, no other archaeological features were recorded.

3 AIM

3.1 Archaeological Evaluation

- 3.1.1 The aim of the archaeological watching brief was to monitor groundwork for the development and investigate and record archaeological remains that are identified, taking account of the date, nature, extent, bio-archaeological and palaeo-environmental potential of the remains, such as access to the Site under construction will allow.
- 3.1.2 A further aim was to prepare an archive of the results of the investigations leading to the preparation of this final report, which is intended to satisfy the requirement of the CDAO that the watching brief was carried out.

4 RESULTS

4.1 Introduction

4.1.1 The following presents a summary of the watching brief results based upon the Site archive, which comprises a Site diary, digital photographs. Photographs of the site under groundwork appear in **Appendix 1**. The archive of all stages of the archaeological work is held at PCA's Winchester office under the site code **GEWS17** and will in due course be deposited with the Novium, Chichester.

4.2 Methodology

- 4.2.1 The archaeological watching was undertaken following the methodology detailed in the Written Scheme of Investigation (PCA 2018), which was approved by the Local Planning Authority in advance of the works and on the advice of their archaeological advisor James Kenny, Archaeology Officer, Chichester District Council.
- 4.2.2 The watching brief comprised monitoring topsoil stripping by the appointed main contractor Careys Civil Engineering ahead of the construction of the proposed car park.

4.3 Result

- 4.3.1 Following the mechanical raking i=of turf from the site for ecological purposes, topsoil stripping revealed the underlying natural to be the same as recorded in the evaluation, namely Head deposits of gravel with clay in places (**Appendix 1, Plates 1 & 2**); the natural was recorded at between 0.27 and 0.32m below ground level and was sealed by a thin layer of subsoil and topsoil.
- 4.3.2 No evidence of the possibly prehistoric ditches revealed by evaluation Trench 2 were revealed. No evidence of any other significant archaeological remains were revealed. However, a section of the modern ditch recorded in evaluation Trench 5 was revealed (Appendix 1, Plate 3).

5 ARCHIVE PRERARATION AND DEPOSITION

5.1 The Site Archive

5.1.1 The Site archive, to include all project records and cultural material produced by the project, will be prepared in accordance with 'Guidelines for the Preparation of Excavation Archives for Long-term Storage' (UKIC 1990) and the Institute for Archaeologists 'Standard and Guidance for the creation, compilation, transfer and deposition of archaeological archives' (ClfA 2014). On completion of the project PCA will arrange for the archive to be deposited with the Novium Museum, Chichester.

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
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
