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1 ABSTRACT

Pre-Construct Archaeology Ltd was appointed by Guy Logan Architects, to carry out an archaeological watching brief, at 45-47 Romsey Road, Winchester, Hampshire. The Site is the subject of a proposed change of use and development to form accommodation for 23 students.

The watching brief was conducted on the 11th, 12th & 13th June and 8th August 2018. Visits coincided with internal service trench excavations within 45 Romsey Road and with excavations for pad foundations for a new external stairway on the rear of 47 Romsey Road. It is understood that no other below-ground excavations were required

No archaeological deposits, features or finds were revealed in the limited excavations that were monitored. Both the internal service trenching and stairwell pad foundation pits suggest the Site lies partially on disturbed ground or *in situ* bedrock chalk, suggesting that existing below-ground impacts may have removed or severely impacted any potential archaeological remains. However, the below ground excavations that were monitored were limited in extent and close to or within the existing buildings and may not represent the Site's wider archaeological potential to the south.

2 INTRODUCTION

2.1 Project Background

- 2.1.1 Pre-Construct Archaeology Ltd (PCA) was appointed by Guy Logan Architects, to carry out an archaeological watching brief, at 45-47 Romsey Road, Winchester, Hampshire, hereafter 'the Site' (Figure 1). The Site is the subject of a proposed change of use and development to form accommodation for 23 students.
- 2.1.2 The archaeological watching brief and subsequent reporting were required as conditions 13 and 14 of planning permission for the development of the site granted by the Local Planning Authority Winchester City Council (planning ref. 17/00612/FUL). The conditions were based on the advice of the Council's Historic Environment Team Archaeologist (HETA) and reflect the potential of the Site to contain archaeological resources that may be put at risk by the development.
- 2.1.3 Planning condition 13 states: 'No development/demolition or site preparation shall take place until the applicant or their agents or successors in title has secured the implementation of a programme of archaeological mitigation work in accordance with a Written Scheme of Investigation that has been submitted to and approved by the Local Planning Authority in writing. The Written Scheme of Investigation shall include:
 - An assessment of significance and research questions
 - The programme and methodology of site investigation and recording
 - Provision for post investigation assessment, reporting and dissemination
 - Provision to be made for deposition of the analysis and records of the site investigation (archive)
- 2.1.4 Planning condition 14 states: 'Following completion of all archaeological fieldwork a report shall be produced in accordance with an approved programme including where appropriate post-excavation assessment, specialist analysis and reports and publication'. This document provides an outline for post-excavation assessment reporting, which would include proposals for subsequent specialist analysis reports and an appropriate level of publication.
- 2.1.5 This document addresses conditions 13 and 14 of planning permission and has been prepared in accordance with the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists standard and guidance for an archaeological watching brief (ClfA 2014) and *Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment* (English Heritage, 2006). PCA is a ClfA Registered Archaeological Organisation and is bound by its code of conduct.

2.2 Location, Topography and Geology

- 2.2.1 The proposed site is located to the south of Romsey Road, opposite HMP Winchester and West Hill.
- 2.2.2 The site is relatively level, located at approximately 91m aOD and lies at an elevated level in the local landscape, on the higher ground of the western side of the River Itchen valley and above the historic core of Winchester.

2.2.3 The Site's underlying geology is mapped a Lewes Nodular Chalk Formation (LECH). Although no superficial geology is mapped as being present on site, it is likely that the bedrock is overlain by clay and flint.

2.3 Archaeological and Historical Background

- 2.3.1 The site lies to the west of the historic core of Winchester, approximately 500m to the west of the line of the City walls. The site is adjacent to Romsey Road, a Roman road that would have led to Old Sarum. The wider area around the site has recorded several late Roman burials, associated to the western Roman suburban cemetery; this has included a burial from within the site itself. The LPA's HETA summarised the historical and archaeological background to the Site as follows:
 - The application site lies within an area of burials forming part of a late 4th early 5th cemetery area within the western Roman suburb, located to the south of the Roman road to Old Sarum (represented by the modern Romsey Road).
 - The cemetery was first identified during the construction of residential accommodation for the Royal Hampshire County Hospital in 1980-81; however several burials were also identified on the site in 1852 and in 1949.
 - During the 1980-81 archaeological work, 24 burials were recorded, two with grave goods, however construction personnel indicated at the end of the project that many more graves had been seen but were unreported. From this verbal information it seems that the density of burials decreased towards the south of the site. Based on the information received and the best recorded areas, it is estimated that the cemetery may have contained between 400-600 burials.
 - As many of the recorded burials (and presumably the unreported burials) were located within narrow foundation or service trenches, it is possible that burials may survive in open areas within the cemetery area and potentially beneath the existing buildings constructed in 1980-1 (depending on the extent of groundworks within the building footprints).
 - Several of the burials were located during groundworks in service areas / the access lane to the rear of properties (including No. 47) fronting onto Romsey Road. One burial was recorded within the current application site.'

3 AIM

3.1 Archaeological Watching Brief

- 3.1.1 The aim of the archaeological watching brief was to monitor all ground works for the presence of archaeological remains and, if present and where necessary, i.e. where the impact of the groundwork will impact those remains, to investigate and record the remains and determine, as may be possible, their character, including their date, nature and extent.
- 3.1.2 This report on the results of the watching brief aims to be sufficient to demonstrate to the LPA that the watching brief was carried out in accordance with this document and pursuant to the relevant planning requirements.

4 RESULTS

4.1 Introduction

4.1.1 The following sections summarise of the result of the watching brief and are based on the Site archive, which consists of written and photographic records. The Site archive is held by PCA's Winchester office under the WINCM site code **AY655**.

4.2 The Watching Brief

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


Figure 2 Detailed Site Location and Area of Watching Brief 1:500 at A4

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

- 4.2.1 The watching brief was conducted on the 11th, 12th & 13th June and 8th August 2018. Visits coincided with internal service trench excavations within 45 Romsey Road and with excavations for pad foundations for a new external stairway on the rear of 47 Romsey Road (**Figure 2**). It is understood that no other below-ground excavations were required.
- 4.2.2 Trench excavations within 45 Romsey Road were limited in extent but revealed redeposited chalk rubble at a maximum depth of 0.5m below the existing slab. In places the chalk rubble was sealed by heavily rooted soil, beneath modern make-up and the slab (Figure 2 & Plate 1).

4.2.3 At the rear of 47 Romsey Road the external stairway pad foundation pits measured approximately 1m by 0.5m and 0.5m deep. Two of these were observed and revealed bedrock chalk beneath modern make up and the existing surface concrete slab (**Figure 2 & Plate 2**).

4.3 Conclusion

4.3.1 No archaeological deposits, features or finds were revealed in the limited excavations that were monitored. Both the internal service trenching and stairwell pad foundation pits suggest the Site lies partially on disturbed ground or *in situ* bedrock chalk, suggesting that existing below-ground impacts may have removed or severely impacted any potential archaeological remains. However, the below ground excavations that were monitored were limited in extent and close to or within the existing buildings and may not represent the Site's wider archaeological potential to the south.
