

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#### 1 ABSTRACT

Pre-Construct Archaeology Ltd (PCA) was appointed by Spencer Architecture on behalf of John Rayfield to undertake an archaeological evaluation at 135 Countess Road, Amesbury, Wiltshire. The Site is the subject of a development proposal to demolish existing dwellings at 135 and 135A Countess Road and construct a new dwelling and detached garage.

The archaeological evaluation was required by the Local Planning Authority Wiltshire County Council, acting on the advice of the Wiltshire Asst. County Archaeologist (ACA) and in keeping with NPPF Section 12 and Local Plan Policy. The requirement was made in order to inform a planning application for the proposed development and subsequent decisions regarding the potential for the development to impact archaeological remains.

The evaluation comprised 2no 10m X 1.8m trenches designed to determine the archaeological resource potential of the Site and in particular the eastern part of the Site affected by the proposed development.

No archaeological features were recorded in either Trench 1 or 2. The lack of archaeological evidence found in the evaluation is in contrast with evidence for large amounts of prehistoric activity in surrounding areas and the Site itself, in the form of the levelled round barrow NMN10434. However, the Site appears to have undergone several episodes of modern landscaping. It is concluded that the eastern part of the Site, where the proposed development will be sited, retains no significant archaeological potential.

#### 2 INTRODUCTION

#### 2.1 Project Background

- 2.1.1 Pre-Construct Archaeology Ltd (PCA) was appointed by Spencer Architecture on behalf of John Rayfield to undertake an archaeological evaluation at 135 Countess Road, Amesbury, Wiltshire, (NGR 415216 143103) hereafter 'the Site' (Figure 1). The Site is the subject of a development proposal to demolish existing dwellings at 135 and 135A Countess Road and construct a new dwelling and detached garage.
- 2.1.2 The archaeological evaluation was required by the Local Planning Authority Wiltshire County Council, acting on the advice of the Wiltshire Asst. County Archaeologist (ACA) and in keeping with NPPF Section 12 and Local Plan Policy. The requirement was made in order to inform a planning application for the proposed development and subsequent decisions regarding the potential for the development to impact archaeological remains.
- 2.1.3 The evaluation comprises 2 10m x 2m trenches and was completed in keeping with the Written Scheme of Investigation between 22<sup>nd</sup> 23<sup>rd</sup> November 2018. This document has been prepared in accordance with the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists standard and guidance for archaeological field evaluation (ClfA 2014) and *Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment* (Historic England, 2015).

#### 2.2 Location, Topography and Geology

- 2.2.1 The Site, an area of approximately 0.2ha, is located along the western side of Countess Road, Amesbury, and forms part of a row of properties extending from Countess Road roundabout north to Fargo Road. Countess Road links Amesbury and Durrington and runs west of the River Avon. The Site comprises a narrow property extending west from Countess Road, the eastern half of which is occupied by a single storey house and outbuildings all of which are currently dilapidated. The western half of the Site is enclosed by mature hedges and contains mature vegetation and a wood shed.
- 2.2.2 The Site, at approximately 90m above OD, lies on fairly level ground above the valley floor of the River Avon to the east
- 2.2.3 The Site lies on bedrock Chalk (Seaford Chalk Formation).

#### 2.3 Archaeological and Historical Background

2.3.1 The Site lies in an area rich in archaeological sites and monuments, which make up the well-known and internationally recognised prehistoric ceremonial and funerary landscape, the Stonehenge and Avebury World Heritage Site (WHS). The Site is located at the eastern extent of the Stonehenge part of the WHS. The Site lies close to a number of Scheduled Monuments including henge monuments at Durrington and Woodhenge, long barrows and round barrows. A bowl barrow (NMN 10434 'Bowl barrow 70m west of A345 on Countess Farm'), of which the surrounding ditch survives, extends beneath the western part of the Site.

#### 3 AIM

#### 3.1 Archaeological Evaluation

- 3.1.1 The aim of the archaeological evaluation was to establish, within the strategy of trenching that is proposed, the character, extent, date, condition and significance of archaeological remains within the Site, taking account of their potential to contain biological and palaeoenvironmental remains.
- 3.1.2 This report aims to provide sufficient information concerning the Site's archaeological potential in order that the need for any further archaeological work, in respect of the proposed development, can be determined.

#### 4 RESULTS

#### 4.1 Introduction

4.1.1 The following presents a summary of the evaluation results based upon the Site archive, which comprises a Site diary, trench recording sheets, drawings and digital photographs. A summary of recorded contexts is provided in a Trench Index in Appendix 1 and photographs of the trenches in Appendix 2. The archive is held at PCA's Winchester office under the site code CRAW18 and will in due course be deposited with Salisbury Museum.

#### 4.2 Methodology

- 4.2.1 The archaeological evaluation was undertaken following the methodology that was detailed in the Written Scheme of Investigation (PCA 2018), which was approved by Wiltshire County Council.
- 4.3 The evaluation was carried out between 22<sup>nd</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup> November 2018 and comprised the excavation of 2no 10m X 1.8m trenches. The trenches (**Figure 2 and Plate 1**) were set out using a GPS device to ensure their pre-determined location was achieved accurately. The trenches were then mechanically excavated using a wide toothless blade bucket. All mechanical excavation was supervised by a suitably qualified archaeologist familiar with the ground conditions anticipated on the Site.

#### 4.4 Summary of Deposition Sequence

4.4.1 The deposition sequence was consistent across the Site with topsoil appearing in both Trenches, However, Trench 1 was over lain with a modern garden soil and debris. The natural chalk geology was relatively high and was seen at a depth of 0.18-0.19m below ground level (Figure 3 and Plates 2 & 3).

#### 4.5 Archaeological Features

4.6 No archaeological features were seen in either trench. Small modern features were seen in both trenches, and all contained modern dating evidence.

#### 4.7 Conclusion

4.7.1 No archaeological features were recorded in either Trench 1 or 2. The lack of archaeological evidence found in the evaluation is in contrast with evidence for large amounts of prehistoric activity in surrounding areas and the Site itself, in the form of the levelled round barrow NMN10434. However, the Site appears to have undergone several episodes of modern landscaping. It is concluded that the eastern part of the Site, where the proposed development will be sited, retains no significant archaeological potential.

#### 5 ARCHIVE PREPARATION, DEPOSITION AND COPYRIGHT

#### 5.1 The Site Archive

- 5.1.1 The Site archive, to include all project records and cultural material produced by the project, is to be prepared in accordance with Guidelines for the Preparation of Excavation Archives for Long-term Storage (UKIC 1990). On completion of the project PCA will arrange for the archive to be deposited in accordance with the provisional arrangements made with a suitable museum or repository at the onset of fieldwork. Any alternative arrangements will be agreed with the ACA and the Local Planning Authority.
- 5.1.2 The designated receiving museum is Salisbury Museum. The Curator of Archaeology will be contacted in advance of the fieldwork for an accession number/Site code and to obtain information regarding the appropriate archive preparation standards.

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






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Figure 2 Trench Locations 1:800 at A4
