THE ONE HUNDRED AND FOURTEENTH REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

FOR THE YEAR 1955

The Council has the honour to present its report for the year 1955.

During the year the Institute has lost nine members by death. Amongst its losses the Council records with especial regret the deaths of Dr. W. L. Hildburgh, Dr. V. E. Nash-Williams and Mr. W. V. Wade. Eight members have resigned, and four have been amoved for non-payment of subscriptions. Fifty-eight new members have been elected, and two have rejoined. Eleven new libraries have become regular subscribers to the Journal.
